

## FROM THE POTTING SHED

Dear Kate - First let me say that cactus are definitely not my personal 'thing'. Having said that, this is what you are supposed to do to get the Christmas cactus in bloom each year.

From now until April keep it cool and dry. In April and May water thoroughly when compost begins to dry. From June until mid-September keep it out of doors in a shady spot - but beware of the dreaded slug. From mid-September to mid-November keep dryish and cool until flower buds appear, then increase water and warmth. November and December water normally and keep in temperature of about 55 and once the buds appear DO NOT MOVE.

Now we are just starting the busy time in the garden, especially this year as weeds have continued to grow (at least in my garden) all winter. I really must go out with the weeding and feeding the ground with a fertiliser low in nitrogen but high in potash and phosphates before all the new plants go in.

# TRY THIS RECIPE - SPAGHETTI BOLONAISE (JIM'S STYLE)

Serves two - for a larger party increase the ingredients proportionally.

6 ozs long spaghetti, 1 tablespoon salt.

Sauce: 8	3	ozs .	leanest	minced	beef;
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1 large onion;

l large tomato;

l large carrot;

2 tablespoons tomato puree;

2 ozs mushrooms;

1 tablespoon olive oil; 1 oz butter;

quarter teasp. black pepper; half pint beef stock;

1 bay leaf;

1 tablespoon Worcester sauce; Parmesan or Cheddar cheese to garnish (to taste)

### Method

Start by preparing the Sauce. Put on a kettle of water to boil. Place the tomato in a 1 pint basin. To make the stock - break an OXO or Bovril Beef Cube into a basin and add the tomato puree and bay leaf. When the kettle boils, pour water over the tomato and leave for about 5 minutes. Add half a pint of the boiling water to the stock cube and tomato puree and stir thoroughly - set aside.

Peel and finely chop the onion. Peel or thoroughly scrub the carrot. Grate or very finely chop the carrot. Skin and finely chop the mushrooms. Take the tomato from the water, remove the skin and cut into small pieces.

Into a large frying pan - melt the oil and butter together, reduce heat to about half, add the onion, carrot, tomato and mushrooms and stir-fry until the vegetables begin to turn colour. Remove from the heat and take the vegetables out of the pan and place into a medium sized casserole dish.

Put the minced beef into the frying pan, turn up the heat and stir continuously until the meat is sealed but not cooked. Remove from heat and add to the vegetables - stir well until the meat and veg are thoroughly mixed. Add the Worcester Sauce to the stock and pour over the meat and veg, sprinkle the pepper over the top, stir to mix, cover and cook as under:-

Cooking

Oven method:- When using this method preheat the oven to  $375^{\circ}F$ , or  $190^{\circ}C$  during the preparation period so that it is ready when the mixing of the ingredients is completed. Place the dish in the hottest part of the oven and cook for 45 - 50 mins.

Microwave method:- Place dish in the micro and cook at maximum power for 5 minutes or until the stock begins to boil. Allow to stand for 2 - 3 minutes, stir, return to micro and cook at half power for 20 - 25 minutes.

The spaghetti: This will take about 20 minutes to cook in boiling water. Organise its cooking so that both the spaghetti and the sauce cooking periods end at the same time. Boil at least two-and-a-half pints of water to which has been added a tablespoon of salt and add the spaghetti. Cover, bring back to boiling, reduce heat and cook for about 20 minutes. Strain.

To serve - Divide the spaghetti into equal portions onto dinner plates and arrange in a ring round the outer edge of the plate. Spoon the sauce into the centre. Sprinkle or grate the cheese (if used) over the sauce, and serve immediately. "Chef"
