FROM THE POND

We still have some taddies which do not appear to be developing at all - strange. Happily though, we do have a number of toads and frogs of varying sizes. We don't see a lot of them but early in the morning and at dusk they sometimes show.

This week, the kind friend who originally supplied the toads brought me another creature under the mistaken impression that I would know what it was. It was the largest caterpillar I have ever seen. Unstretched it was $2\frac{1}{2}-3$ " long, stretched it was about 5" and as thick round as my finger. It had a white line each side of its body forming two diamond shapes. Within the diamonds it was a silvery plum-red and outside it was deep plum. At one end it had a large, rather fierce mask and at the other, two large prongs. Unfortunately it has now pupated so we must writ until Nay or June to see what happens next. I have tried hard to get it identified properly and the City Inserum think it may be a Puss Moth although the colour is not right. Are there any lepidopterists in the village the can help?

UPDATE ON "THE TRAVELLERS" JAMES AND ROBERT

Since our last report they have really been on the move. Among their experiences, grape picking in Tasmania in great heat of 39C!! Their employer was an Italian immigrant who had just got his vineyard going and coping with the problem of intense heat, which this year had caused about one third of the grapes to melt on the vine at 50C!! A hard place to be farming. James had his 20th birthday while there and the wife baked him a birthday cake and gave him a party.

R & J had met a lad from Hereford on their travels and they now worked and travelled together. These three lived on the vineyard sleeping three in a two-man tent! James had a problem here when he undercooked some chicken on the barbecue and ended up in hospital not very well for four days with food poisoning. His employers, again with great kindness, took him into their home to recuperate. (He managed to delay his full recovery a few days as a bedroom of his own was to be preferred to sharing the tent with R & R.) They worked in the most mind- and body-sapping heat gathering the grape crop in from a large area. The fruit was then spread over racks to dry out and become sultanas.

From Tassie (which they loved) back to Sydney, then R & R took their trip up the east coast to the Great Barrier Reef (James having done this trip in January). Meanwhile J travelled up to Cairns looking for work which he could not get, but he did find Alison Fenwick in a bar and stayed with her until he met up with R & R. Robert and James took and passed a diving test here which they enjoyed although it was quite tough. By now they had met up with some girls and they all travelled out to Ayres Rock and Alice Springs. Ayres Rock was quite breath taking and really hard work to climb. James tells us twenty people have died making the climb. The Rock, while being in the centre of Australia, is so high that it is cold at the top so you need to carry warm clothes with you.

Among their hitch-hiking experiences was one on a car transporter for a distance of approximately 3,000 miles; not enough room in the cab so they were given a seat in one of the cars on the top tier of the transporter! James says from this position they watched the dawn flood the Outback ahead of them, a fantastic experience. There was a problem with the driver, who at one time got himself drunk, so R & J decided to take turns at the wheel of this huge road train. (Something else to remember for the rest of their lives.)

Their next place to visit was Darwin and from there they went down the west coast, passed the Great Western Desert and Sandy Desert, a VAST area. Through a mining town called Hedland Port where they saw trains about two miles long with six locos coupled in for the drag down to Perth. The tracks are so straight they can use these long trains. Hedland is the centre of a great mining area which includes most minerals from iron to gold; but again no work. Things are very tough in Oz just like the U.K. Sc on they went to the beautiful city of Perth.

From Perth to Sydney via one of the great train journeys in the world, the Indian Pacific Railway, which took three days and two nights. One stretch was 500 miles without a single bend!; imagine, a straight line the length of Britain! They stopped at Adelaide for a few hours en route.

In Sydney they hoped to meet up with Emma Fenvick and Treena Willoughby who were due in from the J.K. about the same time, but as R & J had spend a lot of time in Sydney and could not get any work they decided to leave for Fiji in the Pacific. They had hoped to have shown the girls the sights, but only missed them by twenty-four hours which was a disappointment to them.

From Fiji they moved out to a remote island off the mainland, where it was cheaper to live - no TV, no electricity, no running water only a salt water shower and only a radio telephone, from which James phoned us one day. A totally unspoilt paradise right out of an adventure story placed in the time of the great sailing ships of hundreds of years ago; palm trees, white sand beaches with clear blue seas, rollers coming in over the coral reefs. These reefs were to give them a nasty fright. Warned that surfing was for the experts only as the coral was dangerous, they nevertheless took the boards out for a run. Robert went first and was dragged over the coral which cut him about the face. End of surfing experiment. As there was no hospital to stitch him up the cut healed naturally, but he will have a scar or two to remind him for life of the event.

On 17th July they flew to Auckland, New Zealand, for a two-and-a-half week visit, then on to Honolulu and then Canada for their homeward bound flight returning to England on 31st August. John & Grace Griffin
