## KENN KIDS ON WHEELS

On Sunday 13th October, 13 bikes were packed into the back of a horsebox (with one or two extras in the boots of mums' and Dads' cars) and many of the village children set off to Bath to do a sponsored bike ride along the Avon Cycle Way to Bristol  $-13\frac{1}{2}$  miles.

The ride was the idea of Daniel Quinn and Ian Pascoe and a school chum, who are encouraged at Backwell School to raise money for the school charity - The Kidney Fund at Southmead Hosptital.

We also got <u>lots</u> of extra help from the village by way of support, especially with photocopying and transportation - even though Daniel's dad didn't realise he'd been volunteered to drive the horsebox until a few days beforehand! The day was a <u>great</u> success. The kids set off at a great pace - the mum who hadn't ridden a bike for 20years and her young son were given a head start! Stops were available en route for refreshments and the chance to give up if necessary. All those who were doubtful if they could make the first pit stop without giving up, were determined to keep going to the end. Our woungest rider, on a bike rather two small for him, so that he had to pedal twice as much as everyone else, was most put out at his enforced rest period due to parental intervention, but was back in the saddle 3 miles further on, to complete the course having done about 10 miles.

Our other'hero' was a schoolfriend of Daniels' and Ians', who having suffered a nasty fall, went back to where he fell off 2 hours later and completed the course on his own, so as to be able to say he had finished. It proved a great afternoon out with <u>safe</u> cycling for kids - so what about it

Kennites ? Can we do it as a village next year ? A family day out with the

kids - What about it ? (start training now Sheila!)
And who knows where we can borrow a cattle truck for the bikes ?....
At the end of the day the ride raised £145.

## PROPOSED NEW VILLAGE HALL

Most people have now heard that my sisters, Margaret Crossman, Daphne Veale and myself would like to present to the village, an area of land in Coxhay Orchard for the purpose of building a new village hall, plus an area for parking - play space. If this offer is accepted by the residents, we would have to ask that the present village hall, which stands on our property, be dismantled and removed, and any claim that the present Hall committee may have on the land it stands on be rescinded.

If I can explain to our readers that the present village hall stands on land that is within the village fence - in other words is eligible for housing development so therefore is quite valuable - I don't consider that we are acting in an unreasonable way by trying to obtain complete possession of this land, taking into account the fact that we are offering land for a new hall to be built. As long as the present village hall stands on our land, in real terms it is costing us upwards of £150 per week in lost income - a state of affairs that I don't consider we should be expected to carry for much longer. Do people realise that our family has allowed the hall to stand on our property for 66 years for a peppercorn rent of £1 per Year !!

On Saturday 10th November an open meeting was held in the Kenn Village Hall to which all Kenn residents were invited by Messrs John Griffin and Roger Wilcox. The purpose of this meeting was to inform those in attendance of Mr Ray Naish's offer and to gauge the popularity or otherwise of the IDEA of a new village hall.

Copies of the plan of the proposed building were distributed and everyone was shown around the site behind the existing hall - access via a drive way from the field gate next to the existing hall entrance.

On returning to the meeting, Mr Wilcox pointed out that the exercise was dependent on three factors:-

- a) That full co-operation of all existing shareholders was required before any decision was taken.
- b) That all claims by the present Hall Committee be rescinded.
- c) That Planning Permission would be granted for the building on the existing hall site.

He then went on to point out the benefits of a new hall :-

for example : off road parking large play area

noise reduction modern facilities

and the fact that the existing hall would possibly last until the year 2000. He also told the meeting that although the proposed site is beyond the village fence, this does not present a problem with planning as the building would not be a dwelling.

Supposing the proposal was accepted, Mr Wilcox pointed out that finance was the major aspect and went on to suggest some of the ways funds may be raised : for example:

new shareholders grant Brewery sponsorship Sports Council Grant John James Trust fundraising events

The meeting closed after a show of hands of those in favour of a feasibility

study being carried out by a working party of 5 volunteers. Another meeting will be arranged in January for up to date information.

It will become necessary to contact, at some point in time, all the present Hall's shareholders. Unfortunately a complete list is not available. If you are a shareholder or know of someone who holds shares, please could you make them know to Ray Naish. Kate or Sheila will also pass names on to the relevant people. Kate Denmead.

## TRAVELLER'S TALE

At the end of April Rosemary left the Caribbean on the liner, Regent Sea, to sail to Alaska for the Alaskan - Vancouver fortnightly run. The journey took about a month, going through the Panama Canal and calling at various ports for sightseeing trips - Acapulco, San Diego, Los Angeles, San Francisco, Portland and Vancouver before arriving at Whittier , near Anchorage. It was bitterly cold and there was plenty of snow about. Whittier is a very small town with only 350 inhabitants, one store, a launderette and 2 pubs. They spent many happy weekends exploring the wilderness and woods, trudging through snow, seeing many abandoned cabins and the occasional bear. The next port of call was Ketchikan, the Salmom capital of Alaska, where they went on a canoe adventure tour on a mountain lake in the Tongass National Forest. They also visited The Totem Heritage and Rain Forest in the Totem State Park which is a former Indian Campsite. The totems wre rather awesome standing among hemlock trees, they also saw the world's largest pulp mill and a salmon hatchery. They then called in at Junean where they went on a helicopter flight to the Mendenhall Glacier, landing on the glacier floor - the silence and views were breathtaking with the massive rock sentinels towering 3,000ft above. They were all provided with moon boots and champagne and all wore evening dress ! They also visited The Gold Creek Salmon Bake where they could see the salmon being barbecued and had a delicious picnic. A gold mine was the next stop where they all had a go at gold panning. At Skagway they went on the White Pass Railway Tour. This is now used for tourists but years ago was used by the Yukon goldmines, the Alaskan construction and mining developments. journey took them to the international boundary between Canada and the U.S.A. They also visited the Gold Rush Cemetery, museums and an Orthodox Cathedral before arriving at Vancouver. In August they sailed back to the Caribbean and did fortnightly trips to Los Angeles. ## FROM THE POTTING SHED

Dear Kate - In your letter last month you asked about plants for a north-facing fence. You said that grass is reluctant to grow; does the grass go right up to the fence? If so I would have it up and compost the grass and roots, then, if I were patient, I would cover the entire surface of what was to be a new bed withblack plastic, well anchored with stones and this I would leave for a year. However, I have never been accused of being over-patient so I would in fact dig and weed it well, adding plenty of compost, peat and farmyard muck together with blood, fish and bone meal. After all that hard work, the fun begins. I gather from your letter of September that you have removed the dreaded Rusian Vine and also Honeysuckle. Dose this mean that you do not want anything on the fence? If not, how about Clematis? Orientalis Bill Mackenzie is lovely with yellow lantern shaped flowers and shining seed heads in Autumn. In fact there are a lot of Clematis which would be suitable for this aspect and they are not too rampant but would require wires to cling to.

The montanas are also suitable but much more rampant. If not climbers, how about pyracanthas to hide tha fence and back the bed ? There are various coloured berries and they could be trained to grow along sideways along the fence. Then there are Camellias - providing they don't get too much sun in the morning which would spoil their bloom - this should be ideal. Also Garrya Eliptica, Euonymous Fortunei, Jasmine Nudiflorum, Choysia though not I think 'Sundance' which like most golden leaved plants needs sunshine to keep its colour. Having said this, the Lemon Balm Officinalis Aurea would be good and bright gold. Hydrangeas, Arum Lilies, Iris Foetidissma - the one with insignificant flowers but lovely berries in the Autumn, also Dwarf Bearded Iris, Ladies Mantle, Astrantia, Bergenia, Solomon Seal including the one with variegated leaves, some of the Perennial Geranium, Hostas and Hellebores should also be good there and how about ferns? There are some lovely shapes, quite easy and not fussy about soil. Foxgloves and Hollyhocks and many annuals, these could be underplanted with bulbs and Lily of the Valley. Enough my pen is running away with me and you are really spoilt for choice especially starting from scratch. I have an apology to make to our 'Cherry Sad Gardener'. Please forgive me for not replying last month - put it done to anno-domini. Now it is a little difficult to diagnose what ails your Weeping Cherry without

seeing the patient. It could, of course, be too dry at the roots due to two very dry summers - on the other hand it could sadly be Honey Fungus which is fatal! Has there been any yellow brown toadstools at the base of the tree ?. Are there any small orangey spots on the bark ? Is the bark loose and are you able to pull it away from the trunk ? If so, and there is a white mould with a distinct smell of mushroom, then I am afraid this is the trouble. There is no cure and the tree should be removed with as many roots as possible and everything should be burnt, together with as many of the long black strands underground as you can find, since these will spread the disease to other trees and bushes. You can try drenching the ground with Phenalic Emulsion to prevent the spread but it would not be a good idea to replant. If on the other hand, it is too dry and the grass grows right up the tree, I would try digging up the grass for say, two or three feets all round, gently open the soil, feed with some blood fish and bonemeal and a little of the good stuff never goes amiss, and plenty of water. Good Lmck ! and a Happy Christmas and Healthy New Year to you all !

You will recall I spent an afternoon in August replanting my hanging baskets with winter-flowering Pansies. Two and a half months on they are absolutely super, having filled all the gaps to capacity and even started to 'trail'. The ones on the front of the house get the morning sun - such as there is in Winter and have done much better than those at the back which get very little - proof positive of the benefit of those precious rays. 


