REMEMBERED

As most people already know Mrs Lillian COX recently passed away in Australia. I think I am right in saying she was born in this village 90 years ago. Her father was, in years gone by, the coachman to the Rev. Walter PERKS who was vicar here in the early years of the century. Before her marriage Mrs COX worked at Stowell's Dairy at "Moorgates". Most of her 8 children were born here and educated in the village school. Unfortunately of these only Ivor still lives in the village.

KENN PAST AND PRESENT

Do readers realise how little Kenn has changed in the last 200 years or so? If people came back who lived here say 150 years ago they would still recognize the village. Obviously many new houses have been built and many old ones pulled down but the roads are still the same as they were at that time.
