MR. TOM BAKER

Mr. Tom Baker passed away in Clevedon on 22nd September 1990. Tom was a true countryman who lived and worked in Kenn for many years.

Before the war he worked at Kenn Court before leaving to work at Black Rock Quarry, until he was called up to serve in the Royal Artillery. He saw active service in Italy when he was in the battle of Monte Casino.

When Sir Allan Scott's air pageant was held in the thirties in Park at Kenn Court, Tom was one of the Kenn lads who became airborne and actually looped the loop - quite a feat in those days - the price is reported to have been five shillings, or 25 pence in today's money.

After active service Tom returned to work at Kenn Ccurt and he and Mrs. Baker settled into Court Cottage where Mervyn was born. Later they moved to their present home and Tom went to Yatton to work until he retired.

Tom was a keen pigeon fancier and had a great interest in bell-ringing, regularly ringing at Kingston Seymour as well as visiting other towers. He was a good neighbour - always alert and willing to help should anything be amiss in local fields.

We shall miss seeing Tom cycling around the village and send Mrs. Baker and Mervyn our sincere sympathy in their great loss. R.M.D.

POPULATION

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The population of Kenn doesn't seem to change much over the years. There are about 300 people here at present while the 1881 census tells us that there were 288 residents at that time. I have recently been lent a copy of the report of "The Board of Guardians" published in 1863. Of the Bedminster area of which Kenn was a part, this reported that there were 282 residents here that year. The representative for Kenn on the Board at that time was Mr. Samuel Dyer of Kenn Court.

The difference between the people of Kenn in 1863 and 1990 is that people today are well off. In 1863 there was one indoor pauper, i.e. in Bedminster Union; 6 men, 3 women and 2 children were classed as outdoor paupers, in other words receiving Parish Relief. In Kingston Seymour there was 1 man, 2 women and 2 children in the Union and 11 men, 12 women and 15 children classed as outdoor paupers, all receiving Parish Relief. Ray Naish


