

As you are all no doubt aware the Community Charge will be replaced from 1st April by the new Council Tax. For the purposes of this tax each domestic property will be valued within one of eight bands as follows:

- ⇒ BAND A £0 £40 000
- ⇒ BAND B £40 000 £52 000
- ⇒ BAND C £52 000 £68 000
- ⇒ BAND D £68 000 £88 000
- ⇒ BAND E £88 000 £120 000
- ⇒ BAND F £120 000 £160 000
- ⇒ BAND G £160 000 £320 000
- ⇒ BAND H £320 000+

The valuation exercise will be complete by the Autumn of this year and will be open to public inspection at the Town Hall and Area Offices in due course.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT REOR-GANISATION

At a special meeting of the Woodspring Group of the Avon Local Councils Association held at the Town Hall in Weston-super-Mare, Mr STEPHENS, the Chief Executive, gave an update on the progress of Woodspring's bid to become a unitary authority.

The Local Government Commission has published a timetable which could mean the end of the County of Avon by April 1995. Woodspring's submission has to be made to the Commission by 1st September. The Commission will make its recommendations to the Secretary of State within the six months following that.

A full report of the meeting will be made at the next Parish Council Meeting on Monday 3rd August in the Village Hall at 7.30pm. All electors in the parish are welcome to attend.

KENN WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

The President, Mrs DYER, welcomed visitors from Banwell WI to the July meeting of Kenn WI. Mrs WILSON, a

new member, was also welcomed. Mrs ALDRICK was presented with the Rose Bowl which was won at the last Group Meeting. An acknowledgment of the card sent to the Queen has been received from Buckingham Palace.

AN OPEN LETTER TO "REPORTER"

Kenn has been very fortunate in having a postmistress and shopkeeper who tirelessly and cheerfully caters for the needs of the village. Someone who cannot afford to be ill, or to take time off. Someone who has been strongly resolute in ensuring the shop has continued to run for the village's benefit, despite wishing to sell and settle for a quieter and less stressful lifestyle.

The village for its part has been equally good in supporting and using the shop appreciatively, and for that I would thank you. However, I cannot let the actions of whoever reported my mother to the Public Health Department for

having a dog in the shop, pass without comment.

Since dad died, Blackie has been both companion and protection for mum. This has now been denied her during shop opening hours. For those people who genuinely use and appreciate having a village shop, you will know Blackie has always kept a low profile and has not posed a threat from the point of view of health or hygiene.

The actions of this "good samaritan" have already caused upset (to both mum and Blackie), loss of sleep, and much distress. I believe mum would be justified in "shutting up shop" regardless, and choosing to convert and live in the property as a private house, if she were able to afford that luxury.

So, to that nameless, faceless individual I would like to say this;

I cannot pretend to begin to understand your reasons, but whatever your motives were, I trust you feel justified in what you have done. And if that prickly little thing called conscience keeps you awake, just a little, tonight, then perhaps you'll have a little sympathy with my mother. And who knows, it may help you to think before you act in future!?



ALBANIA

A few weeks ago I went to Albania on business; this gave me the chance to travel around a country that until recently was closed to all outsiders and had no British diplomatic representative. It now has a democratic government but they have a major task to repair the ravages from 50 years of communist mis-rule. In their latter years they became so paranoid they thought the



West would invade Albania and built over a million concrete bunkers guarding such important things as telegraph poles, an unbelievable waste of effort in a country with food shortages! They looked like so many mushrooms dotted about the countryside.

Today Albania is only three hours flying time from Heathrow but a world away in living standards. It was quite a shock to find Europeans living and working in the second half of the 20th century in conditions I'd only seen in black and white photographs from a hundred years ago.

Towards the end of the communist rule there was widespread disruption as the people struggled for democracy and as I travelled around the country it became increasingly depressing to find that most of the factories and farms had stopped working and everywhere had an uncared for look. Shortages of basic foodstuffs were widespread and even visiting businessmen, with our large (by Albanian standards) supplies of dollars, suffered inconveniences. Minor I admit by the local standards but having fig jam and dry bread for breakfast every day gets a little wearing, although the custom

of giving visitors a large brandy (cost 30p a bottle) mid morning does help one forget breakfast and provides some encouragement to keep going until the evening meal. The Albanians do not eat a mid-day meal, quite a trial for my GAUNT frame.

Albania is the poorest country in Europe. The typical worker is paid about £2 per week and lives in a jerry-built one bedroomed flat. In the factory manager's house I visited conditions were similar and two children shared a single bed in the kitchen. However, they were fortunate because children are still being treated in hospital for starvation - it comes as quite a shock to discover that three hours away children are starving. The hospitals are desperately short of equipment and medicines, syringes are shared and as a result hepatitis is rampant although the closed nature of the country has kept AIDS out (so far!).

The Albanians need help urgently. The major help is coming from Italy (food) and Hungary (medical care for children); the British Government has done, and shows every sign of continuing to do, very little. Some British charities are

working in the country including Action Albania, an Anglican charity, which is providing food and medical equipment to the Elbasan area. I visited this area, the site of a large factory which has polluted the surrounding land and caused much illness in the population, and can vouch for the appaling conditions.

Kenn has a proud history of charitable giving. The Albanians need help; initially food and medicine to see them through the winter but in the longer term they need new equipment to produce their own food and training in modern industrial and farming techniques. The industrial training is beginning to arrive but agriculture remains backward. I think it would be a nice idea if we twinned with an Albanian rural village and tried to help. Is anyone interested? If you are please call me on 875992.

After her marriage to Mr Sidney COX she lived at The Limes, then the cottage now disused in Kenn Street, then to Nailsea before returning to Kenn to live in the old milk factory, now Moorgates, before moving to Clevedon Farm some forty years ago to continue dairy farming.

Twelve years ago she moved to Fairways, Kenn where she created a beautiful garden. Mrs COX derived great pleasure from growing her flowers which she took to Winford Market and also supplied shops in Clevedon. Often a queue was ready outside Martin's in Hill Road to await her arrival with fresh flowers from her garden.

Mrs COX loved the country way of life taking long walks in the Moors, was a staunch member of Kenn Church and supporter of Whist Drives, Jumble Sales and other local activities.

The respect for Mrs COX was shown on July 1st when there was a large attendance at her funeral at Kenn Church when the service was conducted by the Reverend John RUFFLE.

To all her family we extend our sincere sympathy in their loss. Mrs COX during her life gave people a lot of pleasure with her flowers. We shall miss her.

Our flag was flown at half mast on June 25th and July 1st.

The "quota" mentioned above expenses is our proportion of diocesan expenses used to pay clergy and to provide, amongst other things, for their training, housing and pensions.

The electoral roll consists of the names of those people who have committed themselves to support the Christian work of the Church and the quota is based partly on these members. The diocese has recently considered ways of making more economical use of the manpower and resources available and there has been a suggestion that the small or underused churches could be closed. KENN HISTORY GROUP

On June 29th about twenty of us visited Mr Alfred Gay's farm at "Eastwood Manor" East Harptree, to enjoy a guided tour by My GAY of his famous Victorian

agricultural farm buildings.

This amazing one roof structure covering about one and a third acres, provided for all the needs of a large mixed farm, accomodating the year round all the livestock, together with their fodder. One can best convey the scale of the building and its facilities by reporting that the cost of the construction in 1856 was no less than £15,000 (by the value of today, millions of pounds)

We saw and heard about a lot of the GAY family history and farm equipment used by them for several generations. We found the whole evening quite fascinating and it ended with us gathered round a wagon drinking coffee and eating biscuits talking with the GAY family while browsing through the old farm records, and account books from the first world war. Wages 2/- to 2/4 (ie 10/12 new pence) per day, with milk being sold for tuppence halfpenny (ie 1 new pence) per gallon! Yet a horse, the tractor of the day, could cost £30+

An event like this makes you realize just what a century of great change has taken place for the farming world and is now drawing to a close. One hundred wonderful and remarkable years, with progress and change the scale of which surely can never be repeated in any similar future time span.


