KENN HISTORY GROUP

On Monday evening the 16th November we met at "The Granary" when our guest speaker was Mr Richard BROOMHEAD who gave us a most fascinating talk, supported by slides, on local history.

Mr BROOMHEAD, a full time professional archaeologist, has worked closely with the Congresbury history group. He played a very active part in their production of leaflets on Congresbury's past. We learnt much about the Roman settlements at Brinsea and Honey Hall, Congresbury and Wemberham, Yatton. Apparently the Roman's had a thriving pottery industry at Congresbury.

On Kenn, our particular interest, he advised us on ways and means of tracing the history of our older properties and of finding out information on the village settlement.

Our speaker reported that in 1947 the RAF completed a total aerial survey of Britain and that we could probably, by making application to them, obtain copies of the Kenn area photographs. These will be most informative, showing features unseen at ground level. For instance, one can spot the sites of former properties, buildings, ponds, etc long ago covered by the passage of time but still showing up as markings, shadows or

scars from the air.

Mr BROOMHEAD kindly offered to give us any help he could as we try to build up and record our knowledge of the village.

Our Next meeting will be in January, date to be advised.

WAYSIDE

Wayside Garage Filling Station or Peter NEILL's, whichever you like to call it, is in the news due to plans being considered to convert the original dwelling at the rear into a car showroom.

"Wayside" as it was originally called was built as a private house on what was a small orchard in the late 1920's by a Mr BROWN who lived there for several years. The BROWN's sold it to another family - I can't remember their name who later sold it to a great character called Mr PEARSON.

Mr PEARSON, his wife and two children, sister-in-law and mother-in-law came from Lancashire. Soon after arriving he had petrol pumps erected of the old type where you pumped up the petrol by using a handle which filled gallon jars in full view of the customer. No chance of giving short measure because you could see if the jar was full. The handle was then turned backwards which forced the petrol into the car or can as required. The type of petrol sold was R.O.P., short for Russian Oil Products. When it started it was priced at tenpence halfpenny per gallon, or just less than 5p in today's money.

Mr PEARSON was a very enterprising man who ran several businesses other than the petrol pumps. He was a beach photographer operating on a pitch at Clevedon and also at Severn Beach. He had a sign up which said "YOUR POR-TRAIT IN TWO MINUTES". His camera was fixed on a tripod covered by a black cloth. When taking the snap he hid his head under the cloth, then he took the slide out and dipped it into some liquid, held it out to dry for a few seconds, then slipped it into a small cardboard surround. Your portrait was ready in two

minutes for sixpence.

Another business he practised was as a polish salesman, stating he was the only representative for 'Scott's Polish' in the area. He travelled all around this district, right up to the Mendips selling from door to door. He had a notice in the back window of his van saying his polish was "Buv all others".

Later in his life Mr PEARSON took a great interest in Kenn church and became Ray NAISH. a choir member. He also acted as unpaid sexton. He took charge of the very temperamental coal-fired boiler, much to relief of other people who had tried to keep it going on a rota basis.

After Mr PEARSON's death, his son David ran the filling station. He also sold shoes from the shop. Unfortunately David died when only a young man. The business then passed out of the Pearson family's hands.

Outside Wayside on the Clevedon side is the boundary stone marking the edges of Kenn and Clevedon with K on one side and C on the other.
