

A crowd of around 40 supporters gathered to watch this local derby on a dry but rather chilly Sunday lunch-time. I was positioned just behind the Kenn bench where Little Ed had set herself up as team doctor equipped with a large sponge ready to rub down any player who needed it - or who SHE thought needed or deserved her attention. Thankfully for

the players injuries were minimal although Julian WILCOX found he had one knee STAR-CHED in absence in the Kenn doc's cupboard of the tin of Ralgex!

Kick-off was at 1pm and after a spirited opening Kenn's first goal came after 8 minutes courtesy of Julian OSBOURNE. The second came after 11 minutes (Julian WILCOX) but was unfortunately given off-side after Kingston players shouted at the ref. A Kingston player should have received a red card after 12 minutes for foul language (it really shocked Little Ed) but unfortunately we didn't have any cards. Their first goal came after 15 minutes and was allowed even though it went straight through the hole in the net! Julian WILCOX produced an excellent shot after 26 minutes before James GRIFFIN gained just reward for his hard work and scored goal number 3 - only to have it disallowed for handball (No hand of God from the vicar). So at the end of the first half the score was Kenn 2 Kingston 1.

New players were brought on for the second jalf - Mark PUGH, Robert BES-

SANT, Dave GRAY and Roger WILCOX with Richard GAUNT taking over in goal. Kingston scored their equalising goal in the 1st minute - this was originally caught by our goalie but he then got his foot trapped in the net and was powerless! He recovered however to execute a stunning save in the 5th minute. Play was held up briefly on several occasions when the ball went off the pitch and into the brambles. It befell the MEN of the Kenn team to brave the undergrowth!

Kingston took the lead in the 11th minute courtesy of an own goal by Kenn

Kenn fought back in a spirited fashion and equalised within 2 minutes

What wonderful weather we have had over the Christmas holiday, I don't remember when the land has been so nice and dry at this time of the year.

Personally I have had the easiest Christmas on the farm ever, all the cattle here at Stonehouse Farm are still in the fields. I purposely saved three fields of grass and let the cattle into them a few days before Christmas and I haven't had to carry any hay to them. They are still living on the grass just like summer time. Another advantage with keeping them out is that there is no manure to be

carted out of the sheds. Whatever happens from now on the winter won't be as long.

WINTER KENN VISITORS

The third week of December saw a big freeze up with record low temperatures (for December) being measured in Bristol. Very cold weather is generally rewarding for the birdwatcher as birds are usually more active and therefore visible and birds are driven south from more inhospitable climes in northern Britain and Scandinavia.

A pair of STONECHATS were the first true winter birds recorded - they are insectivores and I wonder if they have survived the cold snap. There have been good numbers of FIELDFARES and a few REDWINGS on the Moor but not in the numbers reported from Hilsea in last month's magazine. Star bird so far is a SHORT EARED OWL watched at dusk near Lilypool Drove. It was being mobbed CROWS. by the resident CARRION Apparently Lemmings were in plague numbers in arctic Scandinavia this summer and consequently OWLS enjoyed a very fruitful breeding season. Now that food supplies are diminished in their summer territory there has been a marked influx into Britain, some apparently joining a ship in the North Sea and taking a ride to the River Humber!

A small party of five WIGEON were present near Moor Street Bow but Ray NAISH tells me that before the Moor was drained hundreds were shot annually by wildfowlers.

The TREE SPARROW may not sound too exotic a bird but the two I watched during the worst of the cold spell were my first for the area. TREE SPARROWS are seed eaters and generally distributed to the (drier) east of us.

SNIPE are always present but are more readily seen when the ground is frozen

but a WOODCOCK (a species truly indicative of cold weather) was a wee surprise.

A flock of 32 GOLDEN PLOVERS flew over on the 15th and a charm of 19 GOLDFINCHES was feeding on thistles. This latter species has been adversely affected by modern farming practices and it is good to see that the RSPB, having concentrated on rare and endangered species in the past, is now looking at ways of reversing the fall in the population of farmland birds.

Finally it is of course impossible to find and see all of the species present on the Moor and the writer is always most interested to hear of unusual sightings.

KENN IN 1965.

Mrs Gladys DENMEAD has recently been looking through some old papers and found the following 3 pieces she wrote in 1965, and which I persuaded her to allow us to publish in Kenn News and Views.

Although only 26 years ago it is interesting to see what was happening in the village at that time.

KENN IN 1965

Our village in nineteen sixty five, Is very, very much alive, New houses built, ideally placed Its populations been increased.

Each day starts with the morning post, The milkman calls, one we like most, We also have a Post Office Store Quite ably run by Mrs Moore.

The morning papers arrive by midday
Which most of us peruse without delay;
Wonderloaf and Mothers Pride is our daily bread,
They make calls every other day instead.

Our village hall where people meet,
Has now installed electric heat,
Its walls could tell many good tales
Of Whist Drives, dances and Jumble Sales.

The small parish church is standing there, For all who want to meet in prayer.

Our preacher now is the Reverend Wright.

I'm sure we feel he's quite alright.

KENN VILLAGE HALL 1965

The hall is in very good condition for its age (some 40 years or more) with its wood and galvanized structure. The committee comprises of shareholders who raised money to buy the hall in 1922. Today there are about 45 of these people living but only about 12 regularly in attendance in meetings. These namely being: Mr S.G. DYER (chairman), Mr S.G. DENMEAD (sec). Mr W GRIGG, Mr R BYE, Mr R NAISH, Mr J GRIFFIN, Mr J INGS, Miss L BAKER (treasurer), Mrs R DYER, Mrs W HAZELL and Mrs G.N. NAISH.

This year of 1965 the committee met twice to discuss maintenance and other business. During the year, electric heating was installed at a cost of £150 by Mr S.G. DENMEAD - thus doing away completely with paraffin heaters.

The cost of hiring the Hall is approximately 7/- (ed note, shillings = 35p) per hour, this includes the use of everything contained within the hall and the cost of cleaning up after an event. The expenses are rates, water rate, 3rd party insurance, worker's insurance and fire insurance.

Our village in nineteen sixty five Saw many activities of different kinds First, A grand affair, a wedding reception Wendy Gulvin was the bride in question.

The same month the farmers gathered Talked of animals fur and feathered; A few days after a teenage party Arranged by Heather and Rosemary.

A session of sewing classes newly commence, Mrs Shearer, our tutor, has good sense, Through the year there were eighteen of these Quite pleasant evenings sure to please.

The Women's Institute meetings, eleven all told Brought new ideas for young and old. Membership was high in this year of grace, Sixty six is grand for this small place.

In February Mrs Morris held a Whist Drive, The W.I. Group Meeting was like a bee-hive. Another Whist Drive by one we know well, For charity, Mrs Irene Stowell.

On April 12th eighty old people given tea By the Women's Institute hospitality. Later this month flora art started A session of six for those interested.

Now into June, one sunny day All sorts of items were brought I'd say, One could see at a glance what was in store, A Jumble Sale - W.I. funds - more and more.

In July on such a wet day, oh my! A square dance in progrees, yippee ay! The hall was full to capacity Good for the cause - charity

We must not forget the Village Social Club, Who meet on Thursdays by paying a sub, Of thirty six bookings I can tell, Under the Chairman, Ray Chappell.

Then there were eight copper classes
To entertain quite a few lasses.
They hammer and fashion plates and jewels
And sometimes enter them in shows.

Wedding reception number two in September Branda Russell, the bride to remember. September also brought thw W.I. Show All day the ladies go to and fro.

On into October, the last Wednesday The hall is dressed, a special array, A party arranged, grand occasion, The Women's Institute celebration.

The Social Club held a Whist Drive for funds, A pleasant evening for everyone. Later on the same again for W.I. Master of ceremonies being Mr Bye.

Eight times in the year the M.U. met And gave a Christmas party for the younger set, Our church social will be memorised To end this year of nineteen sixty five.
