

You don't have to cycle or walk in it as most people can cycle or walk round it, unless they are blind. 

Dear Editors,

In response to last month's letter on horse riders using grass verges and horses fouling Kenn Street and Duck Lane, I found the comments on horse riders using a pooper-scooper to remove horse manure from the pavement very disturbing.

I am a regular horse rider along Kenn Street and holder of the British Horse Society Riding/Road Safety Certificate and am in full agreement not to use ornamental grass verges, but it would prove extremely dangerous for a rider to dismount to remove droppings from the road. Holding your horse and trying to pick up the droppings with a pooper-scooper would be a vey unsafe practice and I'm sure some fatal accidents would occur as a result of uncontrolled loose horses along the street if this was to be seriously considered.

I feel that it is more important that your horse is kept under control along the street to prevent injury to other road users, than to have a few horse droppings which are very good fertilizers for roses etc. and it surely is nothing in comparison to the pollution caused by
