

At the April meeting of the Kenn Women's Institute Mrs DYER congratulated members on various successes. PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

Following another accident on the main road the Parish Council will again tell the County Council that there is a need for a speed limit through the village. We understand that there is to be a 40mph limit at North End Yatton, so the County Council may be persuaded to extend it to Kenn.

We congratulate our District Councillor, Mrs Greta LEWIS, on her election as Chair of the District Council. She works extremely hard for us all and deserves the honour.

The Parish Council continues to fight against the short-listing of Kenn Moor as a travellers' site. If anyone still has not written to the authorities we would be glad if they could find the time to do so. It is a very important matter.

As people living at the Kenn Pier end of the village feel themselves to be isolated from the rest of the village one person there will be told of any developments likely to affect them. It must be pointed

out that the Parish Council is only permitted to offer observations to the Planning Committee, it has no power to decide whether an application is allowed or not, and all applications are decided by the authorities within strict legal guidelines.

The County Council is proposing to put a weight restriction on Yatton High Street. This will affect Kenn. Discussions are being held to decide what our viewpoint should be.

Dog owners are asked to keep them under control and not to let them foul Kenn Street and Duck Lane.

The daffodils on the green, which have been lovely this year, are to be thinned out and bulbs planted in other parts of the village. Volunteers please. We shall again be entering the Best Kept Village Competition. More news of this will appear later.

The celebration for the Queen's Jubilee will be on 6th June. Details will be later in the magazine.

RUBY JUBILEE CELEBRATION

As you will know 1992 sees the 40th Anniversary of our Queen's accession to the throne. The accession was in February 1952 and although the Coronation was not until June 1953 you will remember that the Silver Jubilee celebrations took place in June 1977. Although there is no official day of celebration this year we feel that it would be a good opportunity for the village to get together. To this end the Parish Council has kindly accepted our suggestion of a Village Tea Party on Saturday 6th June. This will take place in the grounds of the village hall - or in the hall if wet. Some of the details are still to be confirmed and we will publish a separate leaflet in due course.

The details we know of so far are:-

TEA will commence at 4pm although the

event itself will begin at 3pm. Tea will be served at tables and we hope to be able to seat as many as possible. There will most likely be a shortfall in the number of chairs and we would ask you to bring any garden chairs that you have available. Patio chairs would be most acceptable and could be collected if necessary. We hope that everyone will be kind enough to bring a plate of sandwiches or cakes, sausage rolls, crisps, biscuits. We will contact everyone in due course. Tea and squash will be served and beer and wine available for purchase.

If the weather is agreeable we hope to hold sports or rounders for the more energetic amongst us. Skittles will be going on in the hall into the evening. Roger WILCOX is organising entertainment of a more cerebral kind with a Treasure Hunt/Quiz. There will be a raffle for which the proceeds will go towards the purchase of a Commemorative tree for the village green which would be planted by the winner of the Fancy Dress Competition for the under 16's. The theme is Red, White and Blue.

Mr John RICKARD, professional photographer and friend of Roger WILCOX has been asked and kindly agreed to take a village photograph of the kind taken at the Silver Jubilee and already in the hall. Obviously this means we want ALL villagers present. Indeed we hope ALL villagers will want to join in this happy celebration.

We are looking into the possibility of giving a commemorative mug to each child in the village, details later.

THE NITTY GRITTY.

This is a non-profit making event but of course there will be expenses incurred. For instance, tea, squash, table covers, prizes for games, commemorative mugs to mention but a few. To meet some of these expenses it has been suggested we ask every household for a VOLUNTARY donation, perhaps £1. Any monies left over at the end will be given to charity.

This event is for Kenn residents and their families and we very much hope that everyone will contribute to make this a family and village day to remember.

Two final pleas; we would obviously like to decorate the Hall and grounds in red, white and blue for the day, so if anyone has any bunting or the like that they could lend we would be grateful.

Help on the day is vital. We have already had 3 volunteers come forward but more would be great. Let's all get together for a really smashing day.

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

The Annual Parish Meeting was held on April 8th. In over thirty years as a Parish Coincillor this was the worst year for criticism of the elected Parish Council members I can remember.

I would like to deal with some of the points raised more fully than was possible at the meeting.

Firstly I thought our Chairman, Mr Sam DYER, was (to use a modern phrase) given a hard time. I thought that this was in very bad taste when you consider the lifetimes voluntary service he has given to this village. To people's amazement the questions involving most debate were not current ones but decisions that had been made in the past. Some of these were brought forward, unfortunately, in rather agressive tones.

The phrase "we didn't know about it" was often used referring to planning applications in the Kenn Pier area. My answer to that is people who read local newspapers and take part in village activities generally know what is going on. All notices that have to be displayed by law are posted in the two places required by law, i.e. the Parish Council notice board by the Post Office and on the notice board on the western wall of the Church porch.

One suggestion put forward was that the Parish Councillors were inclined to encourage all recreational facilities to be

located in the Kenn Pier area and so disturbing local residents. The reply to that is what about Kenn Valley Social Club which is located at the opposite end of the village? Also anyone with the smallest knowledge of the geography of Kenn knows that the Equestrian Centre and Clevedon Football Club ground are as near to residents in Kenn Street, if not nearer as the crow flies, than they are to residents in Moor Road and Nailsea Wall. I have yet to hear any complaints from Kenn Street people.

When the meeting came to current problems i.e. the proposed travellers' site at Moorside Farm this was discussed very quietly and constructively giving the feeling that some people had run out of steam.

It must be said that the criticism of the local councillors actions in the past didn't come from long time residents but in some cases from people who have lived in Kenn a comparatively short time.

It was pointed out that when it is time for new councillors to be elected the silence from fresh people willing to stand is deafening.

Several people present were disappointed that no-one from the Parish Council was able to attend the meetings at Avon House regarding the proposed travellers' Site.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

From time to time newsletters are sent to Dennis GOLDSWORTHY who feels they would be of interest to our readers. The March 1992 letter is reprinted below.

Dear Members,

Firstly I must apologise for the time lapse since my last letter. This is mainly due to the fact that I have been busy starting up new schemes in the area, now numbering 34. This, in turn, has also presented problems in that it has been difficult to provide adequate information to the Watches regarding local crimes etc. Efforts to improve this will be mentioned further on in this letter.

CRIME FIGURES

Crime figures for January-December 1991 clearly show an increase of 50%, in the main being burglaries, theft of pedal cycles and criminal damage. With the summer months approaching, always ensure that your property is totally secure at all times, even for short periods and alarm systems used it you have one.

BURGLARIES

Several house burglaries have been committed in the first quarter of the year the majority happen between Friday Sunday, during the day or early evening. The trend is to call at the front door to see if anyone is at home, if you answer then an excuse is given and they go down the road to another house. If no reply, entry is normally gained by forcing a rear window or patio door. If you have a suspicious caller, make a note of the time, a description of vehicle etc. Several houses that have been attacked have had dogs, so don't assume that a dog is a deterrent.

PEDAL CYCLES

These days pedal cycles are not cheap to buy and yet many people still leave their bikes unlocked, either outside shops or in their gardens. For the sake of a padlock, this particular crime could be vastly decreased. Always lock your bike even if it's in a garage or shed.

As from March 16th, Police Constable HARRIS will be joined by Police Constable CAMERON who will be working full time in the village.


MRS ROSALIND WILLIAMS
