

KENN CHURCH RESTORATION

The restoration work has proceeded well helped by an initial spell of good weather.

Locals will recall repairs to the north side of the roof in the early 1950s but at that time roof battens were not replaced. Recent inspections found these to be rotten and the iron nails used at the time now badly rusted. The current work has involved new battening with the tiles to the south side being replaced with new hand crafted tiles and the north side being re-covered with the best of the old.

The builders found it necessary to cut back the old chimney over the boiler house in order to replace the tiles properly and it is expected that this will cure the damp patches which appear from time to time.

The existing ceiling to the main building comprises laths fixed to the backs of the rafters and is plastered between the rafters.Unfortunately, in the case of the porch the construction was integral and the whole lot had to be removed and restored with due recognition to the correct method of conservation. The specifications of such restoration are particularly stringent requiring the use of high quality stainless steel nails at £30 per box, new cast-iron guttering and down pipes to replace the previous PVC and asbestos rainwater goods. There is even a particularly high grade of horsehair specified in the plaster mix (I can almost see the "pound signs" appearing in the eyes of Kenn based equestrian entrepreneurs!!!). Indeed the total cost of tiles battens and felting was in excess of £6000.

The work is being carried out by local builders, Messrs Parsons and Watkins under the watchful eyes of Mr GRIFFIN and the church architect Mr Alan THO-MAS both of whom consider the roof will be good for another 100 years.

We are very grateful to everyone who has contributed in any way to Village fund raising efforts that has enabled Kenn to pass on a cheque for £8500 to the PCC to go towards the restoration costs

of this lovely old building.

We should all be proud for it seems that "If there is a need Kenn responds"

Thirdly I understand there was a good "turn-out" of Duck Lane residents when our house alarm went off last month. May I take this opportunity to thank those concerned for a most impressive response.

NOVEMBER BIRD NEWS

At the end of the fine spell in October 4 stonechats were present on the moor - it will be interesting to see if any overwinter.

A few skylarks were also evident probably including some migrants passing through. The mute swans have enjoyed a good year as I saw 9 youngsters together.

Following the torrential rain at the end of October a wet field held 15 lapwing and remarkably 18 snipe being the highest number I have ever recorded here. 100 wood pigeons and several hundred starlings were feeding on the wet fields whilst a single stonechat remained.

By mid November around 60 chaffinches were seeking seed from a cut maize field. A handful of redwings and fieldfares were present and a grey wagtail was sighted. 10 mallard were on Blackditch rhyne together with the usual buzzard. By the 19th the fields were saturated,

fieldfares numbered around 50 with a couple of hundred starlings and 60 black headed gulls and our buzzard was seen being "mobbed" by a crow.

Winter visitors seem to be slow in arriving, probably as a result of the lack of cold weather so far but there are numbers of snipe and rough legged buzzards in Eastern England which may herald the arrival other Scandinavian visitors later. Watch this space!
