


KENN HISTORY GROUP (I)

At our November meeting we studied a file and notes created by our one-time village archivist, the late David CHAMBERS. We have also received a letter from a local historian, Matt. WEAS from Yatton, together with a family tree on the KENN family which he has compiled. Copies have been made of this family tree and given to members of the History Group for their personal records.

There are several unanswered queries, so if anyone has any knowledge of the KENN family they may have the answers.

We plan to leave a questionnaire with the owners of the older properties in the village asking them to record for us all the details of interest about their homes and its history. One feature we are particularly interested in is those properties which had their own wells.

Kay and Charles HARRIS brought along the extensive titles and deeds of Orchard House, which made interesting reading.

Mrs Christine MALET (Miss BOND) one time school teacher at Kenn school, 1937 to 42, heard about an article in Kenn News on Kenn School through Joyce KENT. We have been in touch with her to arrange that she comes to our MARCH meeting to talk on the school and bring photographs. She is particularly keen to

The folk who lived here then and now and how they made their livings, which homes they lived in. Some still living here, some moved away by their work, many now memories their journey now completed.

We recalled that Kenn was mainly a milk producing farming community, about 15 working farms all putting out churns of milk each morning or selling locally. Most farmers grew a lot of fodder for their stock, also vegetables for their own tables, indeed most homes then had kitchen gardens and were pretty well self sufficient.

Very few cars were owned (we think about 2 or 3). Farms were worked by men and horses, the first tractors arrived at the end of the 1930s.

Trades carried on in this small community were: candle making, sausage making, cider making on most farms, slaughter house, village shop and Post Office, pub, wheelwright, carpenter, the vicar living in the village and the Chapel in operation too. The village hall with all sorts of functions and the children walking to their own village school.

Another good evening of pleasant fellowship and chat.

We missed Charles and Kay HARRIS as Charles was in hospital after his unfortunate accident. We sent him a get well card.

The questionnaire has now gone out regarding the older properties and some interesting facts are being reported, which we will write about later.

Our next meeting will be on Monday 14th February at 7-30pm at The Granary.

FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL MINUTES

You will recall from the last issue of this magazine that on May 1st 1941 it was decided to fit-up and maintain a cottage in Kenn Street as a First Aid Post and ARP Station at an annual cost of £6-10. The story continues:

"May 21st 1941. A very large parish meeting assembled in the school to decide whether the monies voted at the last meeting i.e. on May 1st should be paid over.

The chairman who was holding the fund in the Post Office decided that he was not prepared to do so without further advice because it would almost extinguish the fund and he believed there was a good deal of opinion in the parish that had not been expressed at the former meeting.

It soon became evident that this was the case and after much discussion it became clear that a solution could only be found by dividing the fund.

This was at length arrived at by agreement. Eight pounds being allocated to those who wished to maintain the old casualty post and ten pounds nine to those who were forming a new one with the ARP in Kenn Street.

In accordance with this decision Mrs Lee having already received a draft of £6-10

on May 17 received a further draft of £3-19 on May 21.

June 23 [no year] A meeting was held in the school at 8pm on Monday June 23 to consider the scheme of the County Council for assisting distressed people from bombed areas in Bristol on occasion of air raids.

The chairman explained the scheme as given to a meeting held at Long Ashton on the previous Friday. Mr Farmer who had also been present then spoke inviting support. A schedule of duties was considered and volunteers appointed for each of them. 3 of our buildings were found to have been scheduled as possible shelters. The school, the church and the chapel. It was decided to arrange for feeding in the school and sleeping in the chapel and church. All the 14 persons present were allotted a duty. But this number not being considered sufficient it was decided to hold a meeting the following Friday.

A meeting was held on Friday June 27 which was attended by most of those present on the previous Monday and several others. The scheme of the County Council was explained again and many others allotted duties under it.

Recognising the value that the small building in the school playground might be should the emergency arrive it was agreed to clean it and sort and replace the contents.

This was carried out the following Monday evening.

In celebration of victory and the end of the war two meetings were called to make plans which resulted in a tea given to the children in the village hall with games afterwards and later a cinematograph and a conjuring entertainment.

This was given on Sat Oct 6 and on the following Monday a Meat Tea was given to the old people to which all over 65 were invited. Not many came but those

who did enjoyed an excellent repast. After due thanks had been paid to those who had taken such pains in preparing it the children of the school came in and gave a capital version of the Sleeping Beauty on the stage and afterwards some country dancing on the floor of the hall. Later came the band and the rest of the evening was given to dancing. Some capital songs and recitals were given during the evening and some vigorous community singing."

TO WITHYWOOD

As part of my training for the Church Ministry I am spending 3 months working in the Withywood area attached to the ecumenical church there, instead of to our churches in Yatton Moor. As a result local church goers will not be seeing me in church here until after Easter. I miss seeing all of my friends in Kenn Church but working in an urban area is very valuable experience and I am finding it very interesting and stimulating.
