KENN WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

Mrs. Mann, the President welcomed members to the March meeting of Kenn W.I. on what was an unusually dry evening. She also welcomed Mrs. Middleton as a visitor to the meeting.

Names were taken for the Group Meeting at Congresbury later in the month and the superb patchwork cushion made by Mrs. Blake for the competition was on display. A Jumble Sale in aid of funds will be held on 26th April in the Village Hall at 7 p.m. It has been suggested that there should be a summer outing to Burford with a stop at Cirencester for lunch on Wednesday 19th July. remain in a Federation of the new unitary authorities. The matter will be discussed at the next meeting when a decision on what action to take will be made.

Our speaker, Mr. Pallent, outlined the work of the Royal National Lifeboat Institution and showed a splendid action-packed film of rescues at sea. Some members confessed to having felt seasick. The competition for a picture of a sea rescue was won by Mrs. R. Jeffrey, gold, and Mrs. J. Harris, silver.

The talk at the April meeting will be on the National Trust and the competition will be for an Easter bonnet.

VE DAY COMMEMORATION

A public meeting was held on March 13th to consider whether the suggestions made at the January meeting were viable or not. Some 11 people were present and progress on the arrangements was reported.

A church service will be held on Sunday May 7th at 6pm to give thanks for continuing peace and to remember those who sacrificed everything so that we could enjoy that peace.

There may be some people who, because of what they suffered during the war feel that this occasion should not be marked in any way. However, it is being commemorated in gratitude for their sacrifice and to tell people too young to remember it what happened so that it is never allowed to happen sgain.

PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

The Annual Parish Meeting will take place on Monday 3rd April at 8pm. It will be proceded by a short Parish Council Meeting at 7-15. All electors in the Parish are welcome to attend.

We very much hope to be able to welcome our Community Policeman who will talk about Neighbourhood Watch. He will probably be willing to answer questions too.

The present councillors are due to retire in May. Nominations for the new Council have to be at the Town Hall in Westons-Mare by noon on the 4th April. If there are more than 7 nominations an election will take place on May 4th. District Councillors will be elected on the same day. The new District Council will oversee the transition to the new unitary authority which comes into being on 1st April 1996.

Q: What was Cassius Clay's middle name?


A: Marcellus (correct) but Aloyious and he didn't have one were also popular.

BIRD NEWS - MARCH

The main spectacle this month has been the large flocks of fieldfares and redwings feeding on the moor. These birds are migrants heading north to their breeding areas and are all the more welcome as they were distinctly scarce this last winter.

Lapwings were displaying early in the month despite the inclement weather. With the large numbers of carrion crows around I am not optimistic for their breeding success.



By mid month, a couple of chiffchaffs were singing, as was a skylark, a species currently in decline. I was absolutely delighted to see a kingfisher speed along the rhyne by Claverham Drove, perhaps a young bird trying to establish a nesting territory.

Many of the birds are now coming into their best plumage. A couple of reed buntings were particularly pristine.

April is the month when most of our summer visitors arrive. Swallows and house martins should be seen in the second half of the month, willow warbler and blackcap perhaps a little earlier. Keep a note of when you hear a cuckoo for the first time, usually around the 22nd.

Finally thanks to landowners who cooperated with the winter bird survey. Preliminary results are not too surprising, but encouraging numbers of snipe and stonechat were recorded. I shall endeavour to provide more detail in a future issue of KN&V.

Cedela passed away recently after being in poor health for some time.

Born in Kenn, she lived in the village all her life until the last ten years or so when she and her husband Wilf moved to Clevedon.

Cedela was a former Kenn School pupil and could remember many poems etc she was taught over 60 years ago.

In her early days she and her mother and father, Billy and Daisy HORSEINGTON, were great supporters of the Congregational Chapel in Kenn Street, always taking a lead in the services there. Cedela was organist for many years until it closed in the 1950s. Mrs HORSEINGTON was caretaker and also ran with Cedela's help a children's meeting on Wednesday evening. Her nickname when we were at

Kenn School was Dolly. In the days when children spoke more local dialect than they do today, Cedela was known as Dolly HOSSINGTON.

After the closing of the Chapel, the HORSEINGTON family started attending Kenn Church and ran the Sunday School there for many years. Later Cedela became Enrolling Member of the Mother's Union.

Cedela was a very kind and pleasant person, very contented with life and a lover of the countryside.

Her funeral at Weston Crematorium was attended by a large number of people. It was conducted by Mr John CLARKE of Claverham Free Church who knew Cedela well. The Readings and hymns were chosen by herself and reflected her great faith.

Her many friends in Kenn were very saddened to hear of her death. The last time many of them had seen her was at the Senior Citizen's Party last December.
