The normal Parish Council meeting arranged at the last meeting for June 5th will still take place with normal business.

In the elction for District Councillors there was no change. Our Councillors are Mrs. I. CUMMINGS, Mr. A. JOPP and Mrs. G. LEWIS. With so much change in view it is fortunate for us that there will be continuity.

Sam DYER Lucy BAKER and Jean INGS did not seek re-election this time after many years of service to the people of Kenn. Sam first took a seat on the Council in February 1948, Jean in 1969

and Lucy in 1972. A total length of service of approaching 100 years with Sam's service unlikely to be equalled again. The people of Kenn should be extremely grateful to them all for serving the community in this way for such a long period.

BIRD NEWS

The dry spring has (excepting May 17th) continued and the parties of northbound wimbrel seem to have been smaller and more isolated this year. Most flocks have been of less than ten birds and numbers on the mid Somerset levels are well down.

Cuckoos have also been noticable by their absence, I have heard just one in this locality and one reason may be a reduction in the number of skylarks and meadow pipits who's nests are utilised by cuckoos.

Sadly the Somerset marsh harriers have deserted the area and it is beginning to look as if 1995 will be the first year since

1986 when these birds have not nested.

On a more upbeat note, no fewer than three ospreys have visited Chew Valley Lake during the first half of May. Two these fine raptors showed well to appreciative onlookers regularly plunging into Herriotts Pool (next to the main road) to take fish. Since their recolonisation of Scotland in 1954 numbers have slowly increased and there are now over 100 breeding pairs, plus a good number of unmated and immature birds. It is these non-breeding birds that spend time in late spring at waters in England.

Finally look out for little owls on warm(!) June evenings. I think there are fewer in the area now but no doubt many may nest in areas not visited by me (or other birdwatchers) and I shall be glad to have any reports please.

MORE BIRD NEWS

Brian and Teresa WATERS of Watermead Nailsea Wall have had the pleasure of two wild ducks residing in their garden. One under the sitting room window and the other in a clump of pampas grass on the lawn. Watermead is on the banks of the river Kenn and sadly when their mother takes the young ducklings into the water many are eaten by large resident pike.

Nailsea Wall Farm at West End Nailsea runs down into the moor and is a great place for birds because human access is so limited. I heard a cuckoo calling there on 1st May, the only one that I have heard this year. Two pairs of swans have built huge nests in the ditches and are sitting on eggs. Little owls have nested in a hollow willow tree and nearbye there are young woodpeckers inside a poplar tree. I cannot tell if they are the green or spotted variety because the adults are too clever to let me see them. A pair of mistle thrushes are frequently in the same area

but as yet I have not found their nest. Three pairs of sheld or barrow ducks were noted in a field near Kingston Bridge.

Ten wimbrels were seen one morning in May on Nailsea Moor and a pair of grebes were spotted on the Blind Yeo at Clevedon on 23rd May which I think were the red necked variety.

KENN HISTORY GROUP - RUSS & BULLOCKS FARM

As the hazy evening sunshine sulked behind grey cloud 40 assorted persons from Kenn and Kingston Seymour met at Bullocks Farm to learn more about this area called Russ, straddling the boundaries of these two villages. This beautiful farm belongs to Olive SIMMONS who graciously guided our motley group around this interesting piece of ground. We gathered at the centre point of the

farm amidst hedges laden with cream blossom of fragrant May and Elderflower, with squawking magpies, flapping woodpigeons and the stillness of impending summer.

This was the farm which Ray NAISH's grandfather rented in 1909 and bought for his family in 1920 and it has remained in the family ever since. There are only a few original buildings remaining - today Bullocks Farm comprises modern well-built homesteads, barns and out-buildings.

As Ray spoke, he brought to life the country characters who lived and worked on the land - Teddy GRIFFEN who started the day with a pint of cider, tucked his gun under his arm and made his way to Bullocks Farm for lunchtime when he helped himself to bread, cheese and cider, arriving home in the evening with a rabbit or two, in time for supper and more cider!

Then there was William SCRIBBINS, remembered with great affection, taking on so many roles - sexton for 40 years, captain of the tower bellringing, singing in the choir and also the gravedigger. He worked as a lad of 7, bird scaring from early morning to late at night around Horseleaze Lane.

While we walked Ray told us the name of each field with some prompting from Olive! Kenn Nine which used to be in Kenn but now borders the M5 Motorway, Long Nine and Crooked Nine - all of which were showing the first tender green shoots of newly sprouting maize the modern ingredient of silage, very nutritious and greatly favoured by the livestock.

In 1975 the boundaries between the villages were changed. First North Grove field was in Kenn but given over to Kingston Seymour while Kenn's boundaries came up to the water course - Russ Rhyne and extended into Yatton, to Wal-

nut Tree Farm and northwards to Clevedon as far as the Blind Yeo River. The size of Kenn is approx. 900 acres with that of Kingston somewhat larger at 3000.

Across the Second North Grove field we saw the 8 acre area known/as Russ. Also in this field, the ancient property known Bulbeck Manor was built, it is thought, sometime in the 15th century. Little is known as to how the stones were brought to this isolated spot to be constructed into a large dwelling, or how the BULBECKS entered their home. Was it by barge on the River Kenn, or along the ancient pathway from Weston-super-Mare to Clevedon or along the lane off Lampley Bow? In the churchyard of All Saints in Kingston Seymour, the BUL-BECKS have a tomb but any mention of them seems to imply that they were undesirables, rustlers, highwaymen or bandits. Today there is no trace of Bulbeck Manor except for a large clearing by Russ Hatch. In 1860, when St John's Church at Kenn was restored William STAPLES carted all the stones from this ancient ruin either by barge along the River Kenn, or by a two-horse cart, to rebuild the Church from the windowsills upward to look as it does today. A long, hard dedicated piece of recycling!

Then in 1911 there was a long serious drought which caused great hardship to farmers and animals in these parts. Herdsmen around Kenn Court had to fill barrels with water from Russ Pond twice a day - other ponds and rhynes being dry. Those in Kingston Seymour had to trek their animals to Ham Bow at North End Yatton. Here at Bullocks Farm the River Kenn still flowed and was the lifeline during this trying time. With no keetching to do to maintain the river and its banks, (other farms having that responsibility) with a lighter soil and a stable water supply it became a valuable farm. In fact during this drought, Ray's grandfather gave his cattle elm branches

to eat, the farm having an abundance of these trees to the point of being a nuisance factor. With Dutch Elm disease more land was released to the plough. Another problem was rabbits. Olive told us that in exchange for shooting rights given to two Hale's workmen she was able to have the ingredients for her wedding cake when she married Tom SIMMONS!

We had now reached the farthest point of Bullocks Farm and were walking through the fields called First Horseleaze and Second Horseleaze - the first time ray had been here for 50 years. We were a field away from Clevedon and could see across the river, Southfield Farm, belonging to Tim and Julia BUSH. Here in 1940 Arthur PARKER who kept his cows in the shed, found them to be quite poorly one morning. He called the vet who pronounced that the animals had Foot and Mouth disease and all livestock with cloven hoof had to be destroyed. They were buried by that shed, the work being done by prisoners of war and the burial mound can still be made out although now covered with a thick mantle of lush pasture. In all 3 farms caught the disease and had to have all of their animals destroyed - Riverside Colehouse and Dowlais. Oceans of vets inspected every animal on every farm every day but to everyone's relief the disease was contained within a small area.

Passing the farm's ancient watering place on the River Kenn we walked up to the edge of Riverside Farm - the ancestral home of the Griffen family. This beautiful homestead is bearing the ravages of time as are other stone buildings in these parts, they are sad sights as our heritage is being destroyed with them. This farm, along with several others in Kingston Seymour was owned by the Smyth-Piggotts but sold in in 1914 at pre war prices.

Now we came to Horseleaze Lane part of

the ancient track from Weston-super-Mare, passing Phipps Bridge, Richard and Anita SIMMONS' farm, through the churchyard, along Back Lane and on into Clevedon. Harold SIMMONS, Ray's uncle had 50 cows on 150 acres at Bullocks Farm, more than most farmers kept on their farms, and in March 60 years ago was milking cows in the orchard as there was not enough stalls to tie up all the animals. Milking by hand was a very slow business taking an hour to milk 8 cows. Ladies from Wedmore were paid 3d a day to do the job in grandmother's day when the average speed was 4 cows per milking.

By now it was time for us to wend our way home but Olive invited us all back to her house for coffee and biscuits. Ray told us many interesting stories that night but space is limited - write down all of your memories Ray, they are treasures not to be lost.

Thank you Olive and Ray for such an enjoyable evening.

MOTORWAY MADNESS

As you are probably aware it is proposed that the M5 will be widened to 8 lanes from junctions 17 to 21. Many people are concerned about this scheme which seems to be for the sake of holidaymakers on perhaps six weekends per year.

There are many objections but I have listed some below:

- 1 Motorway widening has been identified as a major cause of traffic growth and the pollution and noise associated with this will increase.
- 2 More of the countryside will be destroyed as well as the destruction of the Mendips through quarrying.

- 3 Bottlenecks will be merely shifted to the end of the climbing lanes.
- 4 The vast sums of money proposed could be better spent on public and freight transport.

Friends of the Earth are co-ordinating a campaign to try to halt the proposals. The first stage will be a public meeting on 8th June at the Methodist Hall, Linden Road, Clevedon at 8pm. If you are unable to attend please write to Jerry WIGGIN (while he is still our MP)

This scheme will have a major effect on our village, the increase in heavy lorries, noise pollution and general mess will hurt us all. It is no good moaning about it - we must protest before it is too late.
