

There were several apologies for the April meeting of the Kenn W.I., a lot of members being away. Heartfelt sympathy was sent to Mrs. Ford on the death of her daughter. Miss Dorothy Weaver was welcomed as a new member.

Reports were given of the Spring Council Meeting held in Bath and the Group Meeting at Congresbury. Members had been to several day meetings arranged by the Federation and had much enjoyed them. The team which tok part in the Village Quiz came ninth. Sadly Kenn was unsuccessful in the Group skittles tournament.

Mrs. Mann asked members to think about the Birthday Party and consider whether we should have outside caterers or not. It is felt by some that self catering means such a lot of work for the caterers that neither they nor their guests are able to fully enjoy the party.

PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

We were delighted to welcome Community Constable, P.C. Harris to the Annual Parish Meeting. He spoke to the

meeting about Neighbourhood Watch schemes. It is hoped that the whole of the village will soon be covered by a scheme and that notices to this effect will be put up at the approaches to the village. P.C. Harris also answered questions. He hopes to attend two Parish Council meeting per year. It will be very good to see him.

The village is again entering the Best Kept Village and the Britain in Bloom Competitions. Several people have volunteered to organise parts of the village so please approach them if you can help. They are Mr. J. Griffin, Duck Lane, Mr. H. Staples, Mr. & Mrs. Dyer and Mrs. Harrison for the Main Road and Mrs. Olsen at Kenn Pier.

Of course it is early days yet and there will be more details later on. There will not be a poster competition for the children this year.

There are ten nominations for the seven seats at the Parish Council Election on 4th May. They are Mrs. R. Dyer, Mr. C. Edwards, Mr. M. Ford, Mrs. M. George, Mr. D. Goldsworthy, Mr. J. Griffin, Mrs. S. Naish, Mr. R. Naish, Mrs. C. Quinn and Mr. R. Stowell. At the time of writing I do not know who the candidates for the District Elections are. Several councillors have taken the opportunity to retire and are not putting themselves forward this time. We thank them for all they have done in the past.

KENN HISTORY GROUP

At our March meeting we enjoyed a talk by Mr Alan BLACKMORE of Clevedon; his subject "The history of the North Somerset Agricultural Society Show." We had a good number for this interesting evening including Sam DYER who is the current President of the show.

The North Somerset held its first show in the early 1840s and continues on an annual basis, the only misses being the war years 1914-18 and 1939-45. So it has approximately 140 years of history.

During its long life the venues have moved around, often onto estate land owned by the President for the year. Sites named by Alan BLACKMORE were Leigh Court, Barrow Gurney, Tyntesfield, Yatton, Clevedon Court and Long Ashton Court where it has settled.

Before the Bath and West made its permanent home at Shepton Mallet they would sometimes use Ashton Court, in these years the North Somerset would not hold a show.

One of the North Somerset's greatest shows, which many Kenn folk would have attended, was held at Clevedon Court in 1884 when victorian Britain was full of optimism and vigour and victorian Clevedon was booming. Sir Edmund ELTON was President, the show being held in the Court grounds.

From the GWR station in the Triangle, around the Triangle, along Old Church Road, on the beach, around the pier and out to Clevedon Court via Old Street and East Clevedon Triangle, Clevedon was decked out and dressed all over with bunting, flowers and triumphal arches 27 x 30 feet hung with slogans like "God speed the plough", "Good luck to the Show", "Adams bread is the staff of life", "Buy your meat from Stuckey and be well, strong and plucky".

The whole involved local craftsmen and friends working for a week or more to erect

The weather was, as reported by the Mercury "extremely fine". With attendance of between 4 and 5 thousand people, the morning gate yielded £133-16-0 @ 1s each. In the pm the "horny handed sons of toil" ie the workers were admitted for 6d each - some 2,500 passing through the gates. They came by train, horse & cart as well as on foot.

During the day, many took advantage of

the shady parks trees to enjoy a family picnic. A great day out for Clevedon and the show.

Alan's talk finished at 9-30, coffee was served and he was thanked for giving a most pleasant evening.

We have now completed our winter programme and look forward to May when Ray NAISH will take us on our first summer walk. We will meet at Stonehouse Farm on Monday May 22nd at 7pm. anyone is welcome to come along, any age.

APRIL BIRD NEWS

Migration is intrinsically linked with the weather and after a record wet winter we seem to be heading into a record dry spring. Swallows were seen (not by me) in Kenn very early in April and reported on Radio Bristol. Generally migrants have arrived earlier this year than last and today (21st) "our" house martins arrived back. They were inspecting last year's nest indicating that they were almost certainly last year's birds; not bad for birds which weigh less than one ounce to navigate back from Africa so accurately!

The missing migrant (for me) is the cuckoo which to date I have not heard or seen. There are fewer around these days of course and it will be interesting to see if numbers do build up during May.

On a happier note, the pair of marsh harriers that nest on the Somerset Levels had arrived back by mid-month - these are celebrity birds - the only ones in South West England.

Finally, in May look out for parties of whimbrel on the moors. These are small "curlews" and will be re-fuelling en route from Africa to Iceland.

TOM HAZELL

Tom HAZELL has died recently in Van-

couver aged 90. He was the second son of George and Agnes HAZELL of Manor Farm, Kenn and one of eight children. He had been married sixty six and a half years to Inez and they had one son, Thomas Roland George, his own name and the name of his two brothers. Roland of Kenn Moor Road is the last survivor of that family.

During the 1920s, Tom with his friend Jim STAPLES left Kenn to start a new life in Canada. They followed another Kenn man, Jim STOWELL, who had already settled in Canada.

Jim STAPLES was the son of Sidney who was featured in Kenn news and Views two months ago and brother of Donald, Sam and Winnie and the late Eileen and Veronica. He died in 1981 aged 76. He lived near Calgary.

Jim STOWELL when living in Kenn had run with his two brothers his own cheese and bacon factory at Moorgates, Kenn Street and later became a fruit farmer in Vancouver. His mother and sister joined him in Canada later. Jim STOWELL was 38 years old when he married Velma SIMPSON but still lived long enough to become a great grandfather. He died when 98 years old.

All three had visited Kenn to see friends and families at various times.

MRS BARBARA EDWARDS

Friends and neighbours were shaken and saddened to hear of the sudden death of Barbara EDWARDS of Tramar, Kenn Street. With her husband Cliff she had lived in Kenn for 7 years.

Barbara was born in Glasgow, one of a family of 10 children. 6 of her brothers served in the armed forces during the last war and all returned home safely.

Barbara and Cliff met when he was a patient in the Royal Naval Hospital, Glasgow. It was a meeting with almost a fairy tale ending. Barbara was in the hospital to visit her brother who already had two visitors so he told Barbara to go and talk to the chap in the next bed who didn't get any visitors as his family lived in London. Barbara moved over to Cliff's bed and spoke to him. From that meeting they got married. Had Barbara lived until August they would have been married 50 years.

Barbara was a quiet reserved lady whose chief interests were her home and family. She enjoyed helping with sales in the village hall and enjoyed being a guest at the Christmas Senior Citizens' Party which she never missed.

At her funeral service at Weston Crematorium there was a large congregation of family and many friends and neighbours from the village.

Our sympathy is extended to Cliff, his son and daughter and their families and Barbara's brother Richard who came down from Glasgow to stay with Cliff during this very sad time.
