

RIRD NEWS

The recent North Somerset Levels and Moors Open Day at Cadbury Farm Yatton attracted a good many visitors. Guided walks were arranged with various themes and I wondered if I would find any birds during mid afternoon early in July. However the reed warblers and sedge warblers were still singing and with a couple of lapwings and a passing kestrel everyone seemed well satisfied.

Having yet to see barn owl this year an evening visit to the mid Somerset levels was called for. At ten to ten we were rewarded with a fine view of a barn owl carrying a vole - no doubt to his young family.

The marsh harriers are still in residence but the male seems to be letting his mate do all the hunting - I expect our lady readers will draw a human analogy there!! They seem very secretive this year so I cannot at present confirm breeding success or otherwise but I hope to be able to report positively next month.

August sees the Real start of return migration and there will be various waders along the estuary refuelling on their long journey south.

KENN HISTORY GROUP

We could not have wished for a more lovely evening as we gathered at Stonehouse Farm for the second outdoor history walk of the season. Mischievously Ray told us only thatwe were to go to Nannybucks - it sounded so mysterious.

We drove towards Kingston Seymour and by the bridge turned right into Accommodation Lane. Here we we met with friends from Kingston swelling our number to about 35. Accommodation Lane is so called because at the time of putting in the old Clevedon Light Railway quite a lot of land was purchased by the company, sometimes bisecting farmers fields. To allow farmers to get to their fields a lane was built to accommodate them, it is still called Accommodation Lane.

The area is known as Russ, spelt with double 's' not as some would have it, Rust. The ownership of the land we were walking on has been in the Naish family for over a hundred years and some of the hedges have been left untouched for possibly 200 years. The meadow itself is interesting too because it has never been ploughed and in Spring and early Summer this results in it becoming a blaze of colour with wild flowers, some quite rare. We were about a month too late to see this but there were still some flowers to be seen

Ancient fields often have ancient names and Ray noted that in the deeds of his two adjoining fields are written Inner Oures and Outer Oures. Hereabouts were some very old Oak Trees and very sturdy they looked in spite of their age, but then Oaks don't deteriorate until coming up for 150 years or more.

Just after the war cows were often milked loose in the fields and Ray showed us an old photograph of himself and two of his sisters milking cows under the very Oak below which we were standing. Nothing had changed at all. At that time too (1949) there was a cattle market in Yatton and often farmers from Ireland were able to bring cattle over, sell them quite cheaply and still make a bit of money.

Moving on we were now at Nannybucks. The origin of the name is not known even to the locals so we'll leave it shrouded in mystery. Here our number was doubled by some lovely cross-bred cattle, mostly with calves who surveyed us with curiosity. The calves were beautiful animals delicately marked and it was a picture to see them running so freely.

Crossing a stream known as Russ Rhyne the level of the field changed abruptly and we had to climb a steep escarpment of some 15ft to a different plane. The higher level was brought about by the building of the M-Way. Many

thousands of tons of rubbish, rocks and general spoilage had to be dumped and many acres of local fields were used for this purpose. Amongst this buried debris there are even some old lorries. During the building too, many local businesses did quite well supplying the work force with their many wants. Now though after the years, the surface of the 'tip' is clothed in many types of grasses and flowers and animals graze happily on it

On the lower level of the field, by the rhyne, the old Bulbeck Manor can still be seen going towards Lampley. The ground here id very open and has a sameness to it, such that in thick fog it is quite easy to lose a sense of direction and get lost.

By now we were beginning to return to our starting point and noticed how the fields were cross-crossed with gripes. Gripes are man made, wide deep furrows put into assist in the drainage of this low lying land. Their disadvantage is that they make it very difficult to till the ground with modern machinery and that is one reason why the land is so virgin here. In passing, Ray pointed out another interesting tree. It was a very old and wild variety of crab-apple, with fruits no bigger than a gooseberry and very dry to the taste.

Back at the starting point Ray was thanked in the usual way for an interesting and informative evening. On the way home just before the main road we passed Russ Pond which is a protected area because of its rare wild-life. Finally in passing Ray showed us a few of his mares and foals frisking about in the field, many have never been saddled or shod.

In the gathering dusk we returned home suitably tired and ready for a cup of tea and bed.

Our Barbara had a good time Altho' she lives in Clevedon. The Kennites had a knees up As did the ones from Yatton.


"How can you leave this?" You may ask. It's that dog - him next door,

It is only with such gifts shall we ever achieve our aims and objectives and we are most grateful to you and all who donated in her memory and for the interest you have shown in our cause


We are very anxious to reach our target of one million pounds so as the patients may benefit from this scanner which will pin point with such accuracy any tumour or affected tissue, this will lead to more effective treatment and so save lives. This is our major objective. We have now to raise just over another quarter of a million by November and hope that the building side to house the scanner will soon commence in readiness for the machine within the next few weeks.

It is quite a sobering thought to think that one in three of us will develop cancer during our life time and so when we were asked to help raise this amount we had no hesitation in taking it on. Bristol experts are planning to research a new way of using the MRI scanners and are beginning with breast cancer and its special technical problems. This will just be the start, the same methods will be extended to treating other cancer sites in the body.
