BIRD NEWS

As I write this most of our swallows and house martins have now left with just a few late migrants passing through. The House Martins left us around the 20th September quite an early date. Following the cold spring nesting was much delayed and probably accounted for the late brood at Stonehouse Farm reported last month in N & V.

During the second half of September water levels at the local reservoirs dropped considerably, encouraging many passing wading birds to stop over. This coincided with a run of Easterly winds and produced a record count of Little Stints, tiny sparrow sized

waders en route from Northern Europe to Africa. I had never seen more than half a dozen together before but there was a flock of 108 at Cheddar Reservoir.

The same climatic conditions brought a very rare visitor to Blagdon Lake in the form of a Red Necked Phalarope, the first record in the old county of Avon since 1979. Like many waders this species breeds in the far north the nearest to us nest in the Shetland Isles, but after egg-laying the male raises the family. The Blagdon bird was a juvenile, racing around in the mud amongst the other birds rather like a Gurkha marching with other soldiers.

At the end of the month a Grey Phalarope arrived at Cheddar reservoir. This individual was feeding in a shallow pool by swimming in circles and picking insects from the surface, a diagnostic action for Phalarope species.

On the moors small parties of Goldfinches are beginning to gather and the Buzzard is to be seen perched on the pylon by the railway. Next will be Redwings and Fieldfares, a few of the former having already been reported from Mendip.

SIDNEY GEORGE GALE

Toby as he was always known has passed away aged 85 after being in poor health and living in a Clevedon nursing home for about 4 years.

Toby was born at Horsecastle Yatton the youngest of the six children of Mr and Mrs Archie GALE but he had lived in Kenn Street most of his life. Like many children of his time he started work when very young, he got his first job with STOWELLS dairies at Moorgates Kenn Street when only six years old. This involved fetching the cows for milking in the afternoons and helping milk them as this was in the days of hand milking. He continued with this job until he was nine, when he got the sack for doing a job for another farmer one evening (he and his brother Pat had undertaken to spread a field of manure by hand for neighbour Harry BARNETT)

On leaving Kenn School he was persuaded by his father to join him working at WAKE and DEAN furniture factory at Yatton, much against his will. As soon as he had served his apprenticeship he left the factory and returned to farming, closed his toolbag and claimed never to have opened it again. Toby got a job with Harry BARNETT who did contract farm work with a very good pair of working farm horses that he owned. Toby took charge of the horses and did a tremendous amount of work with them, in the summer this was chiefly grass cutting for hay He told me that during one spell of very good hay making

weather they were inundated with requests from farmers to cut grass for them. One evening after a very busy day he rested on a sofa without undressing ready for an early start. He awoke about three in the morning to get ready to harness the horses to the mower at daybreak. He then set off and mowed seven fields that day finishing at midnight its hard to imagine what a day like that must have been for both horses and men.

Toby started farming on his own about 1930 which was in the depth of the farming depression first with a few breeding sows then buying a few cows. The first milk he sold from these cows realised five-pence farthing a gallon, he later sold his milk around the village door to door.

In 1932 Toby married Brenda HAZELL from Manor Farm, their first home was Meadow-side Kenn Street. A few years later they managed to gain the tenancy of Stonehouse also in Kenn Street. This was a small farm of about 10 acres and the rent was 1.50 per week and he was told by older farmers that it was impossible to make that amount of money and that he would never be able to pay it. By sheer hard work Toby and Brenda gradually increased the size of their farm and built up a lovely herd of Ayrshire cows and won awards for high milk yields.

The GALES ere the first farmers in Kenn to own a tractor, they bought a second hand Fordson in about 1940 and did a tremendous amount of work with it, Toby was kept so busy that he often only had about four hours sleep each night. During this time Toby supplemented his farming income by duck-shooting on the Moors in the wintertime. There was a ready market for ducks in and around Clevedon when food was rationed during the War. Later in their lives the GALES sold their cows and concentrated on market gardening growing wonderful crops of vegetables which were sold in the Clevedon

and Bristol markets. On Sunday mornings Toby would drive around Kenn with his car full of vegetables distributing them free of charge to those he thought were unable to grow their own.

When his friends and neighbours were ill he would go to great lengths to do what he could for them visiting them daily over long periods or taking relatives to visit them in hospitals. Toby and Brenda knew great sadness when their nephew John died aged 22 for with no children of their own they regarded him as their own son.

Toby was buried in his wife's grave in Kenn churchyard, he had been a choirboy in his young days and in his later years attended Evensong on a regular basis.

Toby and Brenda were very hard workers and seldom took any time off and never had holidays.
