HISTORY GROUP (September)

A smaller number than usual gathered at Stonehouse Farm to visit the ancient church at Puxton. As we drove along the narrow winding lanes and across the Moors the sun was already setting in the west and I thought how lucky we are in this part of the country having these wonderful and picturesque sunsets.

On arrival at Puxton we were joined by some friends from Kingston making our numbers up to about fifteen. We also met Mr JAMES, a very kind local gentleman who was to conduct us around the church. Although the church dates back to the 14th century the site goes back much further. Archaeologists from reading university who have dug here say that there were settlements her in Roman and pre-Roman times.

The tower of the church dates from the 15th century and is almost unbelievable to behold. It best be described as the Leaning Tower of Puxton. I couldn't judge how many degrees it is out of line but incredibly it leans in two directions both forward and sideways.

The tilt is probably due to the type of foundation laid and also the combination of the peaty soil and the level of the water table. It is known that the foundations consist of alternate layers of timber and stone and that together with the low lying nature of the land caused slippage. Flooding hereabouts used to occur regularly but modern drainage has eliminated further problems.

Over the years cracks appear both in the tower and in the main body of the church and people like Mr JAMES with a diminishing band of helpers have always managed to get running repairs done. Steeplejacks, stonemasons and other journeymen have been both patient and generous in helping to keep this wonderful building in repair. Recently some of the outside rendering began to peel and 500.00 was required to make good. Somehow though, through an unknown benefactor the money just appeared and some of the maintenance bills always seem to get to the bottom of the pile.

The Parish records date back to the 1400's and the older ones are written in a kind of Anglo-latin not easily deciphered. These records when found in the church were taken to Taunton for safe-keeping although copies are still held in Puxton. The churchyard and burial grounds are also very ancient having been used for burials long before gravestones or other permanent gravemarks were used.

Over the entrance door to the church is a coat of arms in stone of the St LOWE family from Bath who at one time owned the land. On entering the church itself it is difficult to find words to describe your first impressions. Sheer amazement is all I can think of for it is truly medieval. The pews are 14th century and of very old rough sawn oak sometimes held together with ancient iron staples and even the original saw marks are visible. Then, your eyes fall upon the equally ancient "horse box" type pews which are Jacobean in origin. These again are of dark rough wood, shoulder high with doors to enter and hard wooden bench seats inside. The priest from his vantage point can see inside these boxes and often scolded anyone falling asleep or children skylarking. In this part of the church it really is like being in a time capsule of more than a century ago.

The Chancel was "modernised" in Victorian times and it is there that the small congregation now hold their services. The average congregation now numbers between 5 to 8 and on one recent Sunday it was down to 2. Mr JAMES told us many interesting, and humorous facts and anecdotes relating to the church, for example it is a Grade I listed building and although now in need of major repair because of rotten beams, English Heritage will not allow anything to be changed. It is classic "Catch 22" situation - to save the building repairs must be done BUT repairs are not being allowed because of the buildings age and listing.

Another potential hazard is the proposed Leisure Park complex on Puxton Moor. So many buildings and so much activity would almost certainly alter the delicate balance of the water table which at the moment seems to be keeping the tower stable. Local people are doing all they can to resist the park's intrusion into their preferred lifestyle.

Mr JAMES spoke of a special warmth that

the church gave him when he was alone in its cloistered quietness. I think we felt that too. As we emerged into the darkness of the Autumn night further lines of poetry entered my head no doubt from my schooldays of long ago. These from Gray's Elegy I think:

Now fades the glimmering landscape on the sight

And all the air a solemn stillness holds Save where the beetle wheels his droning flight

And drowsy tinklings lull in the distant folds.

Perhaps in this neglected spot is laid

Some heart pregnant with celestial fire

Hands, that the rod of empire might have swayed

Or waked to ecstasy the living lyre.

Finally Mr JAMES was thanked for spending time with us. He also should be warmly congratulated for helping to keep this church alive. Our thanks also to Grace GRIFFIN who organised the visit.

Once in our cars and on the main road again I think we all felt we were back in the 20th century, for better or for worse.

BIRD NEWS - SEPTEMBER

September is a peak time for bird migration and early in the month I was pleased to see a whinchat on the local moors. Whinchats breed mainly in upland areas or marginal land. They winter in Africa so "my" bird had a long journey in front of it.

Goldfinches seem to be thriving probably helped by the good feeding that the set-aside schemes bring. There are good numbers of young birds this year in the flocks (or charms as they are properly called) which I have seen recently.

My wife Jill saw a kingfisher speeding along the River Kenn near Nailsea Court. She actually saw this bird from the train, its wonderful colours showing clearly. Generally kingfishers seem to have suffered a decline, no doubt due to the severe winter -have there been other sightings locally?

Finally I was surprised to be told of two seals in the estuary just off the sea wall during the very high tides. I have never heard of any similar sightings but would be only too glad to know of a previous occurrence.
