

SARAH GRIFFIN RUNS IN THE NEW YORK MARATHON "Brave efforts on a beastly day" New York Times.

I set out from my friend's apartment in Manhattan on foot at 6.00am Sunday, 2nd November clutching my carrier bag containing snacks and extra clothes - after 5 months of training I was about in the New York City Marathon.

The streets of central New York were deserted apart from a few yellow cabs and the ever present police car siren.

The 30,500 runners were shipped out to Staten Island by the bus load. I realised after approximately one hour on the bus that the next time I made that journey would be on foot!

The start area resembled a refugee camp with bodies huddled under canopies, some curled up in sleeping bags, others wrapped in plastic sheets.

At 10.35am the start cannon sounded on the Verranzano Bridge, the cheers went up - we were off! We soon entered Brooklyn with its 2,300,000 population, and spent 12 miles of the race there. The atmosphere was quite incredible. We were spurred on by reggae bands, gospel choirs, children holding out their hands to be slapped, banners waving in the wind, and a huge cheering crowd of all nationalities.

The weather forecast had predicted a 70% chance of rain and as I reached the 13 mile mark, the heavens opened. As a fellow runner said at this point "OK, let's wrap this one up".

Leaving Brooklyn we passed through Williamsburg with the world's largest Hasidic Jew population, a total contrast to the earlier scene. The spectators watched us in stoney-faced silence and bewilderment - a sea of bowler hats and long frock coats. After Queen's we entered Manhattan, through Spanish Harlem and then into the Bronx.

I was fascinated by all the different communities and realised the privilege of safely entering areas of New York that few would dare venture into. However, today the streets of New York were crime free and united in the celebration of this wonderful event. As the course neared its end we pounded down Fifth Avenue surrounded by the skyscraper buildings that this city is so famous for.

My boyfriend and New York living girlfriend were standing at miles 17 and 24 which gave me a huge boost.

However, having written my name on the front of my T-shit I had no shortage of words of encouragement a dollar for every "Go Sarah" and I'd be a very rich woman!

I crossed the finish line in Central Park 4 hours, 2 minutes and 32 seconds, and 26.2 miles later. The winning runner was a Kenyan who sprinted across the finish in 2 hours, 8 minutes and 12 seconds.

Abraham Weintroub, aged 87 crossed the line in 6 hours, 20 minutes and 5 seconds, and the list goes on.

I will never forget the 2nd November 1997 - the people in wheelchairs, the person on crutches with only one leg. 30,500 people from all corners of the world achieving a personal goal, and not forgetting all those who turned out in the awful weather conditions to spur us on.

The winner of the women's 70 - 79 age group was Angela Twigg, aged 79 from England in 3 hours, 50 minutes now there's a challenge for you one day Sarah!

I am delighted to say that I have raised £1,700 for "Whizz Kidz" a charity for immobilised children - this money will buy a wheelchair.

If you've ever dreamed of running a marathon - Go For It!!!!!

Remembrance Sunday

As has been the custom on Remembrance Sunday at Kenn Church for many years there has been an act of remembrance held during the morning service.

The names of the three men from Kenn who gave their lives in the Great War 1914-1918 were read out and two minutes of silence observed. They were Arthur Gale, Anthony Marchant and William Vickery. Thanksgiving that all the men from Kenn who served in the Second World War 1939-1945 returned home safely was expressed.

Lance Corporal Arthur Gale lost his life in the Middle East in 1917. He was the eldest son of Mr and Mrs Archie Gale of Russ Farm, Kenn (now The Orchards). He like many other young men at that time had put on his age to join the army. He had been reported missing for a very long time before being presumed dead.

His family could never find out the exact circumstances of his death until the war finished, when an army colleague of his came of see Mr and Mrs. Gale. He was Victor (Doller) Coles of Clevedon, he told them that he was with Arthur when he was killed. They were in the Gloster Regiment.

Anthony Marchant had been brought up by Miss Aggie Bailey and her father George, they lived in "Church Path Cottage". Miss Bailey had travelled to Bristol about a 100 years ago, she went to an orphanage and offered Anthony a home which people could do in those days.

He attended Kenn School and was a member of the Church Choir. The late Wally Moore had a photo of the members of Kenn Church Choir taken in the early years of this century. In the front row was a small very fair haired boy, Wally told me that he was Anthony Marchant.

It is thought that Anthony was a soldier in the Somerset Light Infantry and was killed in France, probably only a teenager. There are still a few of us in Kenn who can remember Aggie Bailey and her father George. Unfortunately, I can find nothing about William Vickery - are they any readers of this magazine who can tell me anything about him.

Kenn History Group

The Kenn History group were treated to a delightful nostalgic evening given by Mary McEwen-Smith, a retired Tickenham farmer.

Mary, however, originated from Bootle near Liverpool and came to the area as a Land Girl. Her talk of her earlier life was fascinating, but all the more enjoyable by the shared reminiscences of some of the members of the group.

Mary took 10 hours to travel from Bootle to Steamboat Farm near Pilton to learn the skills of a land girl. On her arrival she had chosen to be a dairymaid, but she soon realised that cows were not much fun.

With a 5.30 am start and very poor instruction, milking was no easy task. She did however develop an excellent skill at being at the wrong end of the cow at the wrong time.

After one month of trying to milk these 25 cows she know this was not for her, but as for sterilizing the milking bit, she was brilliant!

Having completed her training she was a fully qualified dairymaid - officially!

and was sent to work at Lady Wraxall's farm. Tyntesfield.

In 1942, this farm was one of the most modern where money was no object. Mary, as a townie, did not appreciate this fully until much later.

Mary was collected from Flax Bourton station by a chauffeur driven car, the car was amazing, speaking tube, drop down trays, flowers in a vase.

She arrived at Home Farm, to start her life as a dairymaid. This farm had a milking machine - Great, thought Mary, they don't need to know I can't milk - Technology in those days did not take account of the huge variations of cow size, therefore Mary had to show her skills - or lack of them. After a few days the exasperated farmer Mr. Brimble ordered her to work with the pigs. Mary ran most distressed to the farmers wife crying "He wants me to milk the pigs"

Mary loved the pigs, she also had responsibility for feeding the bull. He was meant to eat mangolds whilst she cleaned the pen. He escaped, trotted off down the road, careering into the egg house, sending eggs everywhere.

Mary learned many farm skills, many forgotten in today's modern farming world. However she never really got to grips with sheep. On her first day working with sheep, Mary was meant to walk up the field and round them up. Instead, full of enthusiasm and energy she sent them running in every direction, taking most of the day to collect them.

Mary met her husband Eric at the Young Farmers' Club, they settled in Tickenham and became cattle farmers!

Mary's talk was imaginative, funny and delivered with such enthusiasm that her final passing comment was tinged with sadness. The land girls and indeed the Bevan boys, were the forgotten people from the war, given no recognition, no medal and just a few coupons for the returned uniform.

It seems sad to me that the government could not give these people the status they richly deserved. All people were affected by the war, few people had a "good war" but that the memory of no recognition and no thanks should still affect land girls and Bevan boys some 50 years later is a terrible and cruel oversight.

The Kenn History Group would very much like to thank Mary McEwen-Smith for a fun and informative evening.
