KENN HISTORY GROUP

Did you enjoy the beautiful costume drama The House of Elliott?

Well the Kenn History Group can't offer you the costumes but we did have a look at the fabulous cars used. Joining forces with the Kingston Seymour History Group we visited Roger TRIGGOL'S Tickenham Farm to discover a wonderful display of cars,tractors, farm machinery and artefacts. The 1921 Model T Ford and model T Truck were used cleverly in the House of Elliott series by changing their outer logos so you thought you saw the butcher, the baker and candlestick maker but in fact it was Mr TRIGGOL'S two cars. Additionally supplied for the series was the 1921 Austin and the 1931 Morris 16, both in immaculate condition.

Mr TRIGGOL'S current claim to fame is an amazing car designed especially for Toad of Toad Hall, he and his team have the responsibility of driving this around the UK for film promotions. Other cars include a 1924 Nash, in fact the only right hand drive remaining in the world (14 left hand drives still remain) and a 1929 Studibaker President. If Hollywood ever wants to do a gangster Al CAPONE movie the Kenn History Group knows a man who has the cars!! You can of course hire these beautiful cars for special events.

The lovely collection also includes the most amazing agricultural and domestic tools and appliances for example a "baby daisy hand

pump vacuum cleaner", an 1864 cheese press, a 1923 Lister engine with belts driving a corn threshing machine, a stone roller apple mill and a corn grinder, butter churns, milk bottles, milk churns, ploughs and a hay tedder(a machine that looks like a mechanical line dancer for hay turning.)

Lined up in the field was the last 3 wheeled 1934 Stevens delivery van and four old tractors including a 1919 International Titan tractor. The tractor was started with a cranking handle and when it was going the group was invited to drive it around the field. Although deafening and with a bone shaking suspension it was actually very responsive with a surprisingly small turning circle. Grace GRIFFIN was trying her Damon HILL impression when Concorde crossed the sky just to remind us as to how technology has moved on.

If you watched Ruth MOTTS Victorian Country Kitchen and enjoyed how all those amazing and ingenious devices were used then watch out for the TV series about to hit our screens called "Land Girls". Again Mr TRIGGOL'S collection figures and he showed us some amazing items including a "water pump flange mender", a portable contraption to fit every push-bike - a must for 20th century living!!

It was a fascinating evening, not just to see an interesting collection of times past but for Mr TRIGGOL'S boundless enthusiasm and energy. We all look forward to see in a few years time his 1932 Sunbeam, presently a wreck in many pieces, restored to its former glory as we left in the sure knowledge that he and his team have the technology and can rebuild it.

The Group would like to thank Mr TRIG-GOL for a very informative and interesting evening.

A Miss Annie Staples was monitress and presumably looked after the 'babies'. In 1905 she resigned and Margaret Bacon succeeded her at the generous salary of £4 a year. In 1909 she resigned and Gladys Hazel took her place. In 1910 Irene Hazel, Gladys' sister took over until 1912 when Hilda Wyatt became monitress at a salary of £5.4.0. which was considered by the school managers to be too little.

I have not got any further yet but would be very glad to have any information on these ladies.

BIRD NEWS -May

Early in the month my survey walk in the field by the old railway Gang Wall south of Yatton produced a whinchat and a wheatear. These birds are both migrants from Africa and had arrived on a light south easterly wind. They would be nesting before moving on to their upland breeding haunts. On the same walk I recorded a satisfying large number of singing warblers: sedge, whitethroat and chiffchaff.

Our house martins arrived on May 2nd and on the same day two swifts flew over. I have a breeding bird survey to carry out in Kenn so if you spot me around you know what I am up to! Results will be published in KN&V first.

The Kenn red legged partridge seems to be something of a celebrity -I have never heard of one harassing a cockerel before, in fact they are usually very shy. I wonder if it is a tame bird that has escaped or been freed?

I read that the song-thrush populations are stable in "suburban gardens" (they are still declining in other habitats) and whilst I would not risk controversy by describing Kenn as suburban, no doubt your gardens are similar to those on the edge of conurbations.
