ROBBEN ISLAND

Many of you will have heard of Robben Island (Robben is the Dutch for Seal). It was the place where Nelson MANDELA was held for 19 of his 30 years in prison. During our recent trip to South Africa we were able to visit the Island which was recently opened to the public, although the numbers are strictly limited.

The Island sits in the middle of Table bay and is provided with the most spectacular views of Cape Town. It is flat featureless lump of rock which housed its first political prisoner in 1658. It was used during the next 300 years as a prison, leper colony and a whaling station, until 1961 when the Government of South Africa decided to house its maximum security black political prisoners there.

We were shown around the prison by a former inmate - Elias. He was jailed for being a member of the ANC, then a prohibited party. He described in harrowing detail the conditions under which prisoners were kept. Mandela and the other ANC and PAC leaders were housed in cell 8' by 6'. Sanitation was a bucket in the corner of the cell. At weekends they were locked in their cells from Saturday 1.00pm to Sunday 8.00pm Work consisted of quarrying limestone and breaking it into teaspoon size pieces. The rock is very white and the glare has resulted in major eye problems for all ex-inmates

Some of the punishments for failing to reach targets or minor misdemeanours were horrific. Being buried up to the neck for a whole day in sand and left in the burning sun (I will not describe the rest of what happened) is one example. Mental torture consisted of deprivation of books and paper for many years at a time. For writing about some of his experiences MANDELA was deprived of all books for 3 years. Try to imagine being kept in a cell 8' by 6' with no TV, no radio, no books, no magazines, no pen or paper for 3 years.

Yet at the end of all this harrowing description Elias spoke of the need for reconciliation. It was one of the most moving moments I have ever experienced. Here was a man who had suffered all the worst excesses of an evil white government, having had all of his dignity stripped away by white people yet he could talk to us about the necessity of people working together, of forgiveness yet never forgetting the past. He is part of a team working on the Island that consists of former prisoners and wardens, white and black working together.

South Africa can be grateful that the man who became the first Black President was Nelson MANDELA - let us hope his vision of a rainbow nation prevails and that the spirit of forgiveness continues to grow.

BIRD NEWS - APRIL

It was good to read the notes from David GLASSON and Ray last month and especially pleasing to see that there is further evidence of the Song Thrush recovery. However the most interesting note related to the Red Legged Partridge. These have become very scarce or at least rarely recorded) and is the first sighting I am aware of for some years.

The unseasonably warm weather early in April brought good numbers of summer migrants and as I write (20th) there seem to be quite a few Swallows around but "our" House martins have not yet returned.

Jill and I paid an evening visit to Aschoott near to Glastonbury on the 16th in an unsuccessful attempt to hear a Nightingale - we did hear two Cuckoos however - quite an early date.

A male Marsh Harrier has returned to the Brue valley but he is neither frequenting the usual area nor has he apparently joined up with the wintering female bird. so we are anxiously awaiting the outcome. A Little Bittern was a very rare visitor to the Apex Pools at Burnham and this drew twitchers from all over the country (including Yatton!!)

By May Cuckoos and House Martins should be with us along with perhaps the odd Spotted Flycatcher

BIRD NEWS II

The two song thrushes that were singing so strongly earlier in the spring at the top of Kenn Street have now both disappeared, victims of the sparrow-hawk I expect. Their places have been taken by several black birds which are now singing strongly. A pair of blackbirds hatched a brood of young somewhere near the Old Chapel, very early, some of the young are already flying.

On April 10th the first swallow arrived around Stonehouse Farm but it was several days before any others arrived. On the same day I saw and heard a skylark singing above Coxhay Orchard behind the Village hall. I cant remember seeing one right in the village before. On April 16th I heard the first cuckoo of the year down towards Meadmoor. It must have been passing through as I not heard it since.

Unusual visitors flying around the village in mid April for two days were a pair of ravens, they had several fights with the resident carrion crows.

Two pairs of sheld or burrow ducks are nesting somewhere near the bottom of the orchard behind Stonehouse Farm and there are a number of rookeries appearing around the village.

One morning I had a telephone call from Jenny PASCOE who lives near the Village Hall and she asked me to come and rescue one of my cockerels from a strange bird which was attacking it.

(TYPIST NOTE - there may be some about the village who might have thought that I had been suffering from drink or hallucinations had I reported seeing a cockerel on a garden fence early in the morning being chased and pecked by a strange bird that even I knew was not of the same species !!! - honestly though that was the reality of the scene)

I thought it must have been a sparrow hawk and when I walked across the field to Jenny's house they had both disappeared but then we noticed that the strange bird had driven the cockerel behind the greenhouse. On looking closer I was able to tell Jenny and Simon that the attacker was a red-legged partridge and luckily the cockerel was not one of mine. The chase went on most of the morning the partridge driving the cockerel around between the gardens and across the garage roof before both disappeared down the road.

Later I mentioned about the partridge to Jo BATTEN who lives at the Old Ox House in Kenn Street and she told me that it must have been the red-legged partridge that had been living in and around her garden for about 12 months. Joyce KENT who lives further down the street had also seen it in her garden several times - where he has come from and why he has stayed around for so long remains a mystery - as does the owner and the whereabouts of the poor cockerel.

We existed before house-husbands, computer-dating, dual careers and when a meaningful relationship meant getting along with cousins, sheltered accommodation was where you waited for a bus. We were before day care centres, group homes and disposable nappies. We never heard of FM radio, tape decks electric typewriters, artificial hearts, word processors, yoghurts and young men wearing ear-rings. For us time-sharing meant togetherness, a chip was a piece of wood or a fried potato, hardware was pots and pans and software wasn't a word.

Before 1940 'Made in Japan' meant junk, making out referred to how you did in your exams. A stud was something that fastened a collar to a shirt and 'going all the way' meant staying on a double decker bus to the bus

depot.Pizzas, McDonalds and instant coffee were unheard of. In our day cigarette smoking was fashionable, 'grass' was mown, coke was kept in a coal shed and a 'joint' was a piece of meat you had on a Sunday and 'pot' was something you cooked in. Eldorado was ice cream and a gay person was the life and soul of a party and nothing more. 'Aids' meant a beauty treatment or a help for somebody in trouble.

So, we who were born before 1940 must be a hardy bunch when you think of the way in which the world has changed and the adjustments we have had to make. No wonder we are sometimes confused.
