### THE JOULES FAMILY

The Joules family were gypsies, they lived or camped in the Kenn-moor Yatton/Kingston Seymour area for at least 100 years until about 1930. After that time most of them had settled down to home dwelling chiefly working on farms.

After looking at their family graves in Yatton Churchyard (the graves are on your right hand as you enter the Churchyard gates) the first ones I am able to trace are Isaic and Merily Joules who lived around here in the early eighteen hundreds. Legend has it that Isaic was a travelling knife grinder, when he plied his trade from door to door he was never refused food or drink because people were afraid he possessed mysterious powers and might be able to cast spells on them.

In 1837 Merily died, on her gravestone Isaic had the following inscription carved in the stone -

"Here lie Merily Joules a beauty bright, that left Isaic Joules her hearts delight". 1837.

It has been said that Isaic was so heartbroken on her death that in the summer time he slept by her grave.

On the adjoining stone it reads-

"Also in memory Isaic Joules 1841 aged 70.

Their son was probably Richard Joules who died in 1867 aged 56. His wife Jane lived until 1898 when she was 92 years old. On her headstone it reads -

"A mother from our household gone, a voice we loved is stilled, a chair is vacant in our home, that never can be filled".

Druscilla a daughter of Richard and Jane died in 1929 aged 94 years. Henry son of Richard and Jane died also in 1929 aged 96 years.

In the years towards the end of the last century Henry Joules and his wife and family lived a large part of their time camped at the end of Meadmoor Lane near "Ham Farm" at North End, Yatton, or in Horseley Lane, Kingston Seymour. They had a very large family of about ten children, nearly all of them were boys. Sadly one of the boys was severely mentally handicapped and had to be kept restrained, in fact he had to be tied to the caravan wheel to stop him running away and

injuring himself. Father Henry was a traditional gypsy horse dealer while his wife and family made and sold clothes-pegs. How did they make enough money to feed such a large family?, and, even more remarkable, how did they all sleep in an ordinary barrel topped caravan? In the summertime some of them probably slept underneath the caravan.

The Naish family lived at North End Yatton from about 1850 until 1922. When my grandfather and great grandfather were haymaking the Joules boys always came along to lend a hand. All they asked for in payment was some bread and cheese and some cider at the end of the evening. When the family were camped at Kingston they helped my other grandfather John Simmons with his haymaking.

When the Joules boys grew up they nearly all left the travelling way of life and got jobs as farm workers.

Abraham, the eldest, moved to Banwell and started market gardening, and specialised in growing standard apple trees, which he sold to farmers all around this area.

Isaic and Robert worked for the Cook family at "Rolston Court Farm" near

Hewish

Walter and his sister Eadie lived in caravans until their deaths. They were camped at Box Bush Lane near Puxton. Long time residents of this area will remember Walter riding around here on his bay mare going from door to door selling clothes pegs he had made. He died in 1970

What I find amazing is that so many of the family lived until they were in their nineties. When you consider that they lived almost all their lives outdoors, their only comfort was the campfire, they only went in the caravans to sleep. There are a few members of the Joules family still around. They live in houses around Hewish, they have all now given up living out in the wind and rain as their

ancestors have for centuries.

### **BIRD NEWS 1**

#### OCTOBER

The mild weather at the end of September and beginning of October persuaded many Swallows and House martins to delay their Southward migration. The local House Martins left during the first days of October, quite a late date!

Robins who are singing now do so to establish their winter (feeding) territories. The Autumn song is more melancholic than their spring courtship song.

Northerly winds on the 12th October produced the first Redwings and Fieldfares of the Winter. These may be birds stopping briefly before heading further South. A Water Rail was present along the Cheddar

Valley Railway Walk, Yatton, on the same day, also no doubt a recent arrival. This bird announced its presence by its call, a loud squeal like a pig being slaughtered!

A new pond has been constructed by Mark Britten, the farmer, close to the railway walk, and a healthy patch of phragmites reed has been developed, which is obviously much to the liking of the Rail.

Siskins are beginning to appear in our area, and are part of what seems to be an invasion of seed eating birds from Northern Europe. Crossbills arrived in large numbers in July. Siskins from August onwards, followed by lots of Jays. Our RSPB group

saw a brambling on Brean Down (a quite

unusual record) so garden nut feeders should be busy and interesting this year. Remember though, Siskins like their nuts in red or orange bags!

#### STOP PRESS -
