Kathleen passed away recently after several months of poor health.

Although Kath never lived in Kenn, she had lived nearby for a large part of her life; she was born and lived most of her life in Lower Strode Road, Clevedon.

From a very early age she with members of her family, had attended many social events that were held in Kenn and was often asked to take part. Kath was brilliant at reciting poems when quite a young girl, later attending all the many dances and socials that were held in Kenn Hall on a regular basis. Kath was a wonderful ballroom dancer and very much in demand as a dancing partner.

After her marriage to Jeffrey Bush together they built a brand new farm from a greenfield site called "Southfield Farm" and lived there until handing the farm over to their family a few years ago.

When living at "Southfield Farm"
Kath was a member of Kenn Women's
Institute and took part in the plays and
dramas groups that took place at that
time.

Kath came from the famous Staples family who have lived in Kenn since at least the 1850's and have been great supporters of the church here from that time. The church records tell us that her great grandfather William Staples undertook to haul all the stones required for the rebuilding of the church from the windowsills up in 1860.

Her other great grandfather William Dyer was sexton of the church for a great many years. He with his wife ran the first Post Office in Kenn, now "Corner Cottage".

Members of Kath's family including her grandchildren are some of the most regular attendees at Church here in Kenn week by week. Kath was a member of Kenn Red Cross during the war and did nursing work in Clevedon Hospital.

Kath Bush was an extremely good natured and friendly person, in fact she was a friend to everyone who knew her and will be sadly missed by a great many people.

Our sympathy is extended to Jeff her husband, Tim, Roger and Deborah her children, her seven grandchildren and all her extended family.

There was a Thanksgiving Service for Kath's life held at Kingston Seymour Church, such was her popularity that around two hundred and fifty people attended to pay their respects to a good friend.

Very sadly Kathleen's brother Percy Parker died five days earlier at his home near Taunton.

From there the town grew to 10,000 people in 1381 with the influence of the docks making Bristol the second largest city in the UK after London

Fieldfare and Redwing numbers have started to build up with the onset of some northerly winds and there are some very large flocks in mid Somerset - 1,500 on Chilton Moor.

On a couple of clear evenings I have heard Redwings calling as they pass over, probably heading for the warmer climes of Southern France.

Birds are coming more into gardens as we move into winter (temperature wise rather than rain wise!) and a Reed Bunting has been a visitor to a neighbour's garden. We even managed a brief visit from a party of Long Tailed Tits to our garden.

Yesterday (21st November) we went to see a starling roost at Shapwick Heath estimated to hold a million birds. It was a truly amazing spectacle with flocks arriving from every direction and then masses wheeling and turning against a splendid sunset.

We saw a lone Sparrowhawk patrolling the roost and a Marsh Harrier (probably one of "superdad's offspring) disturbed from a reed bed by the starlings.
