BIRD NEWS

The first half of January has been characterised by rain and gales and the severe storms of the first weekend blew a few seabirds up the estuary.

However, in mid-winter most are miles out to sea and are not seen from land. Now the forecast is for cold and frosty weather, so maybe we shall see more Redwings and Fieldfares as a result.

Our garden has been very quiet birdwise, but a neighbour has reported Siskins regularly visiting her nut feeder, and maybe a cold snap will bring more into gardens.

The Short Eared Owls have been seen again on Nailsea Moor after a gap of 3 weeks, so it is likely that they will now stay until the end of February.

Yesterday Jill and I paid our annual visit to Slimbridge. Apart from the captive birds, many wild birds are enticed to the surrounding fields and no less than 2,000 White Fronted Geese were present. Some birdwatchers (more ardent than me) were trying to pick out 2 (very similar) Been Goose from the flock.

Jill and I just enjoyed the sight of a swirl of ten thousand birds (Dunlins,

Golden Plover, Lapwings and Geese) when a Peregrine Falcon passed over.



Dear Mrs Naish

Thank you for your generous donation of £517.10 from your fun run in aid of BIBIC - the British Institute for Brain Injured Children.

As I expect you will recall, BIBIC is a small national registered charity helping blind, deaf, and immobile youngsters to have lasting improvements in their quality of life. We currently help 250+ children in their own homes. We also have a waiting list of children as a result of the recent press coverage (enclosed) of our success.

We do not aim to teach parents to become health professionals. We distil items from different areas into a simple format that parents can usefully carry out at home. We accept that as in many things - from riding a bike to learning a language - practice improves performance.

There is no miracle cure for brain injury but if you could meet little Lauren - whose mother was told she could take her off to die - standing, talking, playing and laughing like other children of her age you would agree that dramatic progress is possible.

We receive no Government or Lottery funding and rely entirely on voluntary donations. Because our programme is home-based, it costs less than £3,000 a year to support each child on our programme of therapy. Your donation will help us to offer hope for a fuller life for a brain injured child. We all thank you for your support.
