#### **BIRD NEWS**

A Barn Owl has been a welcome visitor to Kenn Moor with it or possibly a second bird in the Nailsea Wall area. I saw the owl at dusk along Claverham Drove, my first sighting in the area in 16 years! A few days later Rob Treble phoned me to say that he had seen the bird on a recent evening fly past his house at a few feet range!

It then proceeded to perch on a neighbour's chimney for some minutes. I am always very pleased to hear of any unusual bird sightings (01934 835208)

Along the sea wall a very rare bird, a Desert Wheatear turned up but for just one day. Slightly less rare but longer staying on the sea wall are three Shorelarks refugees from the east coast and the first I can ever remember in our area.

The cold and snow in mid-December made the birds more visible and I noted a Water Rail along the Cheddar Valley Railway Local Nature Reserve in Yatton. It was feeding unconcernedly in a shallow ditch just a few feet away. During a recent survey walk Reed Buntings were

noticeable by their absence - they really do seem to be declining in many of our local areas now.

A recent visit to Nailsea Moor produced no less than four Short Eared Owls leaving their daytime roost and a (captive) Golden Eagle being exercised. Standard gates do appear very small when a Golden Eagle is sitting on them. There was also a very large covey of Grey Partridge, obviously reared birds but very wary and unapproachable nevertheless.

Emily Hobbs was a great character and very knowledgable on local history. She had left school and started her first job when only 12 years old. This was as live-in housemaid at "Bizley Farm" for the Grey family.

She married Matt when only 19 and they lived at Rose Cottage, West End. Both Matt and Emm were extremely hard workers; during the war Emm worked on farms and did housework at "Nailsea Court".

Their very large garden at Rose Cottage, something like a half acre in size was a picture to see. They had every sort of fruit and vegetable available growing there and all sorts of hens, bantams, ducks, rabbits and guinea pigs running around. They were true country people the sort that are fast disappearing from this area.
