KENN WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

The June meeting was well attended. President Miss Holtham welcomed everyone, especially Mrs Lamb and Mrs Rose Jeffrey who have been unwell and Mrs. Withers; the first we hope, of further visits.

Mrs Bubb was thanked for her very summery flower arrangement.

Mrs. Denmead is leaving the village to live in Clevedon but we hope we shall be seeing her just as often. She is a long-time member of the Institute and is very much involved, dealing with the diaries and calendars every year as well as helping with raffles etc.

Mrs. Ball from Clevedon WI came to give her report on the IGM at Brighton and also gave us a lovely fuchsia plant named after Adelaide Hoodlass, the founder of the WI. The plant was raffled later in the evening.

Mrs. Ball reported that child carers (Resolution 1) have an average age of twelve years, the youngest known being an unbelievable four years old. School nurses are now being trained to look for these children. It was felt that practical hep is needed without there being too much interference in the

family. the resolution was carried by 99.8% in favour.

The second Resolution, the using of brownfield sites for building was carried by a vote of 98% in favour.

The Speaker at the IGM was a farmer who urged members to buy organically-grown foods. Not only is it more economical by using less chemicals and having healthier animals, it could prevent another crisis such as BSE.

It was also urged that more information is needed by the public on genetically altered food.

Denman College is doing well, having had 6,000 members take courses during the last year. We were assured the food is much improved and we can now buy chocolate there.

There is also now a gold version of the WI tree brooch available for £145!

"Where did you get that name?" was the question asked by Mrs. Amesbury, our speaker. He gave a very entertaining talk on surnames - the main sources of these being location (Hill), employment (Tanner, Weaver) looks (Long, Redhead) and it was amazing the number of strange names Mr. Amesbury had extracted form the Bristol telephone directiory. One of the shortest is By and the longest Featherstonehaugh. And yes, Smith is the most common.

The competition for three roses was won by Mrs. Dyer, second was Mrs. Bubb and third Mrs. Prew

Next month's speaker will be Mr. Davey on the History of HM Customs

and Excise and the competition is for an animal teapot.

The Denmeads

We are very sorry that Gladys Denmead has left Kenn. She has gone to be near her son in Clevedon and we wish her well in her new home. When Gladys left Kenn at the end of June, after living in Duck Lane for around fifty years, it meant that there are now no Denmeads living in Kenn. This is for the first time for at least two hundred years. They had probably lived here longer than any other family in the history of this village.

By sheer coincidence when I was thinking about writing these notes, I received a letter from Australia from Mrs. W. Baker who lives in the town of Dapto, New South Wales who is a descendant of the members of the Denmead family whose lines came from Kingston Seymour, Kenn, Yatton and Hutton who emigrated to Australia in 1856 on the ship "Escort" - a voyage of 100 days.

They were James and Elizabeth Denmead. On arrival James got a farm job in Geelong, Victoria for £33 a year, plus three months rations and accommodation for twelve months.

There is far too much information in the letter to print in News and Views. If anyone would like to look through it feel free.

Our Church records at Kenn tell us that the Denmeads were here in the 1700's.

The next longest family to have continuously lived in Kenn and are still here are probably the Bakers, of which Lucy Baker and Cyril Willcox are members. The Bakers have probably lived here for the best part of 200 years. Robert Willcox, who now farms "Yew Tree Farm" is at least the sixth generation of the family to have done so.

BIRD NEWS I

Not very much Kenn news this month I'm afraid, as we have been away on holiday.

However, I have noted both a Buzzard and a Kestrel close to Kenn Church when I have been passing through the village. However. Ray Naish told me of a much more exciting sighting - a Red Kite - over Southfield Farm. These birds are slowly being reintroduced in England and Scotland, so it may have been one of these, or a bird from the increasing Welsh Population.

Red Kites feed mainly on carrion and indeed, scavenged in and kept clean the streets of London 300 years ago.

They are about the same size as a Buzzard, but are more slender, with longer wings and of course a forked tail. They seem to thrive quite happily alongside Buzzards and I predict that they will be regularly seen in our area within the next ten years.

There seem to be very few Skylarks around in the moor this year. I was pleased to hear one singing out there this morning the 20th June.

The very heavy rain we have had lately, (in early June) has probably killed a very large number of young birds, especially of the ground nesting varieties.

The Song Thrushes around Kenn are still singing their hearts out. What a tremendous amount of noise they can make for such a small bird.

I have been asking people how long it takes them to get to Bristol in the morning, some say half an hour, others say, if you are unlucky and get caught up in the rush hour it may take an hour.

I have been thinking about that great character Charlie Staples who lived in Kenn all his life, dying here in about 1944 aged 86 years.

Charlie with his family lived here, at Stonehouse Farm, from about 1892 until 1912. While he was living here he built up a large cider making business and had customers around the area including Bristol.

I have been told that he supplied a pub called the "Hen and Chicken" in Bedminster and he delivered the cider there himself. At that time he owned a wonderful mare, a very fast trotter. It has been said that she could trot from Kenn to the "Hen and Chicken" in fifty minutes. I expect when her head was facing home she could go even faster.

So much for modern transport when it takes just as long eighty years later.

Eighty years ago the roads were much rougher than they are today, no tarmacadam in those days!!
