At other times during the week we send each other text messages on our mobiles and occasionally speak on the phone.

Sometimes what we have to discuss is a matter of great importance demanding difficult decisions, on occasions we ask each other for advice, from time to time we share our problems and our joys.

Most of the time though we just indulge in pointless chit-chat enjoying being together.

Just a normal Father-Son relationship, I suppose.

If we stopped seeing each other, if we stopped chatting and exchanging news and views, if we stopped making time for each other the relationship would change.

He'd still be my son and I'd still be his dad – but our relationship would deteriorate, we'd lose the closeness we enjoy, and the trust we've built up over the years would dissipate.

So we make time for each other even if doing something else has to be sacrificed. Shouldn't we take at least as much care over our relationship with God – the God who created us and loves us, who longs for us to be his friends, the God who offers us the gift of eternal life if only we will accept it, the God who guides us, helps us and strengthens us, the God who enables us to cope with whatever life may throw at us.

I saw a notice outside a Church which proclaimed:

"God is always at your service

When were you last at his?"

The Church in Kenn has been at the heart of the community for hundreds of years and for many generations – it is there to help you now.

It may not offer snooker – but it offers many ways for you to form a loving, close and creative relationship with God and looks forward to welcoming you.

Kenn Windmill latest

At the time of writing 20th May, two thirds of the round building, is standing approximately 6 ft. high.

On behalf of the village, I have had a meeting with the developers early in May. They confirm it will be necessary to dismantle, down to ground level, the remaining stonework, before reconstructing the mill as part of the office building.

The mill will stand two storeys high, conical in shape with hexagon type roof. The walls must, the planners insist, be rendered, also it has been agreed between the Office of Conservation and Developer, that as much as possible of the original stone will be incorporated into the new building.

I am advised that the whole scheme is contracted to be completed by the end of September 2003 and handed over to the purchaser.

I intend to seek an invitation, from either the owners or developer, for villagers of Kenn to visit the site and inspect the completed project around this time.

Kenn Women's Institute

On the 14th May we welcomed Mr Peter Lamb of Bristol Arnateur Operatic Society. Mr Lamb gave us an entertaining and very informative talk about the Society which was founded in 1894 by Bruce Bedells, a local businessman, and members of the choir of Holy Nativity Church, Knowle, principally to raise money for charity.

In 1896 the annual subscription was 10s 6d! Their first production was "The Sorcerer" by Gilbert and Sullivan, performed at Alexandra Hall, Clifton, where they remained for five years with Mr Bedells working as Chairman and Musical Director; he was involved with the Society for 33 years.

They moved to the Victoria Rooms in 1899 and produced mostly Gilbert and Sullivan operettas; as a result they developed a close association with the D'Oyly Carte Opera Company.

In the early 1900's they moved away from Gilbert and Sullivan but after scathing press reports they returned to the old formula and did many productions of "The Mikado", and other favourites such as "The Gondollers", "HMS Pinafore", "Iolanthe", "The Yeornan of the Guard" etc. They occasionally digressed to stage "Merrie England", "Tom Jones", and "A Princess of Kensington" but their main forte was Gilbert and Sullivan.

Since 1950 they have produced such shows as "No, No, Nanette", "Half A Sixpence", "Kiss Me Kate", "Fiddler on the Roof", and many others.

The production team has been, and still is, very family orientated with Mothers. Fathers, Sons, Daughters, and Grandparents being involved. The Society has been very much the spawning ground for the professional stage for many members.

After several moves it has now settled in an industrial unit in Feeder Road, supplied by a long-standing member, there is a studio where they can perform frequent supper shows, mainly for members. An absorbing and fact packed evening!

The competition was a fan and Rose Jeffrey won gold with Marlene Arney and Madeleine Crawley being awarded silver and green respectively.

May has been a very busy month. We held a friendly skittles evening at The Ring O' Bells on the 20th, and a Jumble Sale (attendance to which was slighted bighted by the weather) on the 21st.

On the 11th June we are deserting Kenn Village Hall for an evening 'Down on the Farm' at Mr Baker's in Wrington.

BIRD NEWS

A pair of Canada Geese have hatched five goslings on the River Kenn near "Moat Cottage". These geese are comparative new-comers to this area. When they have goslings they are very clever at camouflaging themselves when on the river. When someone approaches they swim underneath the water with only their eyes and nostrils showing, making themselves look like hits of driftwood.

Around the 15th May hundreds of young birds appeared in the hedgerows, the first of this year's hatchings. Unfortunately they had to put up with several days of heavy rain, some of them must have failed to survive.

In last months News and Views, I mentioned that a small group of Whimbrels had been seen at "Decoy Pool Farm". It is a month later and they are still there, I wonder why? They generally disappear within a few days; there are reports that small groups are hanging around in different parts of the moor. I wonder if they have decided to stay in this area to nest instead of travelling to Iceland.

Stella Naish has had a one legged Great Tit feeding at her bird table for several weeks at "Nailsea Wall Farm". Miles Naish has seen a pair of Greylag Geese with five goslings in Puxton Moor.

A Walk in Kingston Seymour -Monday 12th May

Ray Naish welcomed around 20 people, and a dog, at Tutshill Farm, Kingston Seymour, the home of Jackie and Tim Harris on a chilly, damp evening. This was the first of Ray's Summer Evening Walks and Norman Harris was our guide.

We soon reached the bank, which was part of the Portishead to Weston-super-Mare Light Railway, which was disbanded in 1940. We stopped at "Mud Lane Halt" and learned about Donald Griffin, a local farmer who brought his milk to Mud Lane Halt daily for collection. However, on Sundays the train did not run, so as there was no refrigeration he used to 'pump a hand-cart' on the track to take the milk to Weston under his own power.

As we walked along the route of the old railway, we heard that each farm kept its own milk cow, and there were very few milking cows in Yatton. It was said that the people in Yatton were so poor that they gave their children cider or beer because it was cheaper than milk.

Many people from Kenn worked at the Wake & Dean furniture factory in Yatton. This company had relocated from London around 1900.

Leaving the railway track, we diverted to "Tutshill" where we inspected "Tutshill Ear" – this is

a stone tunnel under the bank, a branch of the River Yeo. Until the Motorway was built the Yeo River was tidal to this point and Kingston Seymour was protected from flooding by a Tide Flap at Tutshill. We were fortunate to have with us Vernon Culmstock who around 5 years ago made a new wooden Tide Flap, which Norman Harris fitted to continue the protection of Kingston Seymour from flooding when the River Yeo becomes overfull. Before the building of the sluice at Phipps Bridge the tidal Yeo allowed the sea to reach Congresbury.

We crossed Tutshill Sluice towards the river where we could see the river crossing closest to the sea. This is private land and not a public right of way – from here we could clearly see the remains of the railway crossing 4 upright columns with ironwork and several columns in the mud, nearby were the remains of the pier, which must have been quite impressive.

We could imagine the concrete jetty over 200 feet long, on sturdy wooden props, with a railway track linking it to the main line – here barges to coal from South Wales were unloaded and the coal loaded onto railway trucks bound for the Gasworks at Weston. Edmund (Pilot) Eglington with his barge The Lily carrying 60 tonnes each load – two men shovelling off the load and the barge returning to Wales on the next tide.

Stone also came in from Uphill Quarry and steel from Krupps Factory in Germany. Ironically, in 1942 the railway tracks were pulled up to provide around 16,000 tonnes of steel for the war effort. Part of Kingcott's barn is built with masts from the barges, and the Great Western Railway would have taken on the rolling stock and the steam crane.

We learned that Ray's father-inlaw Fred Fortune was a fireman on the railway.

Moving away from the railway track we noted a scaffolding lookout where foxes are spotted as they approach the nearby free-range chicken farm. It was said that they come from Wick St. Lawrence. Tim and Jackie have 8000 hens and in the past 8 months 80 foxes have been disposed of as they prepared to attack the flock. Nearby is the site where a bomb landed. attempts were made to dig it out, but these failed as the bomb kept sinking deeper into the mud. This is now a bonfire site! Also nearby is a fenced duck pond, which used to be a drinking pond with a stone ramp. This was important as fresh water is essential for stock.

We heard that in the flood of 1605 the water was 5 ft. high in All Saints Church and at that time several residents of Kingston Seymour were buried in Kenn, as the flooded churchyard could not be used.

Returning to Tutshill Farm at 8.30, we noted the spot where the old railway bank saved the farm from flooding in 1981 – many other farms in Kingston Seymour were not so lucky and were damaged by the water, silt and mud.

Our next walk will start at the same spot and Norman will guide is in another direction on Tuesday 10th June, meeting around 7.00 pm.

Children at School

I have recently watched a programme on T.V. about the stress and pressure that children and young people are under to pass exams and get good results at school. Some are almost driven to the point of suicide.

My grandchildren tell me that some of their friends are made to stay in their rooms every evening by their parents to get their homework done with the result that they get very little social life and are very miserable.

When I hear things like that I can't help thinking what a wonderful, carefree life we children who lived in Kenn had during the 1930's. At that time the word homework had not

been invented. When we came out of Kenn School at 3.30 that was it, all the rest of the time was our own.

At that time, every child in Kenn, without exception attended the local school until they were eleven years old. Then they went to either Clevedon or Weston schools.

This meant that all the children in the Village knew one another. That a difference today, when the few children in Kenn attend about ten different schools. The result is very few of them know one another. What a tremendous loss to Village Life

Going back to the 1930's, people had very little money. Few people earned two pounds per week. If a child had a penny they were rich. But all were happy. All the children in Kenn Street, the Griggs, the Moores, the Stowells, the Naishes congregated at "The Barton" which was a grassy area beside "White Cottage" now the roadway into "New House Farm" each evening.

The girls often played hopscotch in the road, there was no motor traffic then. There were only about three cars in the village.

The boys often went for walks across the fields, sometimes down as far as Mead Moor.

In those days the children who did not have to go to Clevedon schools seldom left the Village. A trip to Clevedon or Yatton was a big event.

Those of my age group were only asked to take one school exam in all their school life. This was called "The Scholarship" and taken at ten years of age. If they had poor results no one said a word. All left school at fourteen. This small amount of education did not stop many young people from Kenn becoming very successful business people.

Textbook: Good Wives Guide

Have dinner ready. Plan ahead, even the night before, to have a delicious meal ready on time for his return. This is a way of letting him know that you have been thinking about him and are concerned about his needs.

Most men are hungry when they come home and the prospect of a good meal (especially his favourite dish) is part of the warm welcome needed.

Prepare yourself. Take 15 minutes to rest so you'll be refreshed when he arrives. Touch-up your make-up, put a ribbon in your hair and be fresh-looking. He has just been with a lot of work-weary people.

Be a little gay and a little more interesting for him. His boring day may need a lift and one of your duties is to provide it.

Clear away the clutter. Make one last trip through the main part of the house just before your husband arrives. Gather up schoolbooks, toys, paper, etc. and then run a dustcloth over the tables.

Over the cooler months of the year you should prepare and light a fire for him to unwind to. Your husband will feel he has reached a haven of rest and order, it will give you a lift too. After all, catering for his comfort will provide you with immense personal satisfaction.

Prepare the children. Take a few minutes to wash the children's hands and faces (if they are small), comb their hair, and if necessary, change their clothes. They are little treasures and he would like to see them playing the part.

Minimise all noise. At the time of his arrival, eliminate all noise of the washer, dryer or vacuum. Try to encourage the children to be quite. Be happy to see them.

Greet him with a warm smile and show sincerity in your desire to please him.

Listen to him. You may have a dozen important things to tell him, but the moment of his arrival is not the time. Let him talk first - remember, his topics of conversation are more important than yours.


Make the evening his. Never complain if he comes home late or goes out to dinner or other places of entertainment without you. Instead, try to understand his world of strain and pressure, and his very real need to be at home and relax.

Your goal. Try to make sure your home is a place of peace, order and tranquillity where your husband can renew himself in body and spirit.

Don't greet him with complaints and problems. Don't complain if he is late home for dinner or even if he stays out all night. Count this as minor compared to what he might have gone through that day.

Make him comfortable. Have him lean back in a comfortable chair or have him lie down in the bedroom. Have a cool or warm drink ready for him. Arrange his pillow and offer to take off his shoes. Speak in a low soothing and pleasant voice.

Don't ask him questions about his actions or question his judgement or integrity. Remember, he is the master of the house and as such will always exercise his fairness and truthfulness. You have no right to question him. A good wife always knows her place.
