UK PHENOLOGY NETWORK

The local area appears to have an abundance of knowledgeable people with an interest in natural history and birds in particular.

I have a younger brother who is working for the Centre for Ecology and Hydrology based in the Cambridgeshire area.

An important part of C.E.H. work is the U.K. Phenology Network. (Phenology being the study of the times of recurrence of natural phenomena especially of the influence of climate on plants and animals.

For the past two or three years, interested people, nationwide, have been recording data in respect of nature's calendar. This consists of noting arrival and departure dates of migratory birds, recording changes in leaf tints and leaf fall from deciduous trees and also the dates of fruits ripening and the abundance of fruit.

The purpose of this notice is to ask if anyone has kept or has access to historic records of such events as they would be of great interest to the U.K. Phenology Network as they build up a data base of information as an indicator of climate change which could affect future generations.

If anyone has such information, or would like to become involved in becoming a Recorder (which is not at all complicated or scientific!) please contact me—

The Parish Council is busy raising the matter at every opportunity and hopes that in the manner of water wearing a stone it may eventually prevail.

There has been no news about the best Kept Village Competition. Judging has probably been completed but it would not do to relax the litter picking in case the judges return. Parish Councillors continue to liase with the management at The Hand Stadium. Any complaints or comments will be passed on, so please inform any Councillor if you are worried about any aspect of the undertaking.

It is hoped that there have been no flies this summer. Please let us know if you have an infestation.

You may be interested to know that a lady came all the way from Essex to look at the Mill - apparently it was a rare example of its type - only to find it gone. She has taken the matter up with the Council for the Protections of Rural England who are busy asking the Planning Department some very awkward questions.

BIRD NEWS 1

It was very interesting to read the note by Margaret concerning a (presumably juvenile) Little Owl being captured by a Sparrowhawk.

The definitive book on the Sparrowhawk records some 5,200 prey items taken by Sparrowhawks, not one of which was a Little Owl.

However as Kestrel and other Sparrowhawks were recorded as being predated perhaps it was a highly unusual incident but not totally surprising.

Sparrowhawks themselves are predated, principally by Goshawks (= Goose Hawks) but also by Peregrines and Tawny Owls.

In parts of the Forest of Dean and the extensive woodlands in South and Mid Wales, Sparrowhawks have become noticeably scarcer as it seems they find it difficult to live alongside their larger and much more powerful relative.

Goshawks are much better adapted to the large forests where they take Pheasants, Crows and Grey Squirrels. Indeed an increase in their numbers may reduce the Grey Squirrel population to a more acceptable level.

Whilst on the topic of birds of prey, the parish of Kenn was host to all four of our falcon species in August. In addition to the resident Kestrels, a friend saw a young Marlin on the Kenn side of Clevedon Pill. John Croxton watched a Hobby capture a House Martin over the village and I notched up a Peregrine Falcon on Kenn Moor. The presence of these birds does indicate a healthy diversity of species in and around Kenn.

A little further away a Black Kite was seen over Brean Down heading for Wales. This is weather related – presumably this warm weather species found our record temperatures to its liking or perhaps it was too hot for it in Europe.

By the middle of the month migration was well underway. After a night with a northerly wind there were lots of Swallows around, probably birds from Scotland or Scandinavia. Wheatears were dotted along the sea wall where there were a couple of Yellow Wagtails. There are not the canary yellow birds of spring (as reported by Jeff Naish at Castle Farm) but a duller greener yellow in their autumn plumage.

There were also a few returning Whimbrell – we get large numbers on the moors in spring and just odd ones on the estuary in autumn. No doubt their return passage is spread over a much longer period and by different routes.

Congresbury Moor had a nice Whinchat and remarkably a Sedge Warbler still singing on the 15th – a very late date.

September should see the main migration – anything could turn up, especially if there is unsettled weather.

The highest price for ewes that I saw was £89.50 per head. They were sold by a lady from the Priddy area and

bought by a young farmer from Wedmore. They were of the Suffolk breed. This is probably the highest price for ewes ever realised at Priddy Fair in its six hundred and fifty year history.

I didn't manage to get around to the Horse Sale area, but I have been told that there were more horses on show than ever before. Being bought and sold by people from all parts of this country and Ireland.

There were the usual roundabouts and fun fair and many dozens of stalls selling all kinds of goods imaginable.

In a separate area there was an auction of all sorts of tools "bygones", bric-abrac. This also attracted a very large crowd of people.

Zambia in the Sixties

It has been suggested that I write a little more about life in ZAMBIA forty years ago.

Those readers old enough to remember the fifties and sixties will recall that the white population still had a prejudice against black people. In the USA top black entertainers such as Sammy Davis junior, whilst performing in hotels in Las Vegas, were not allowed in the public areas of the hotel but were expected to enter by the rear door and afterwards find accommodation in the black neighbourhood.

Those readers who think this is harsh would do well to remember the demonstrations in Bristol against the employment of black people on the buses.

In Zambia, after Independence in 1964, local people found that they could now enter hotels and shops previously barred to them. In colonial times the African could not enter a white owned butchers shop, instead he must go to a side window and ask for "boys meat" which was usually poor quality and of a type not wanted by the regular customers.

Although, by the time I arrived Zambia had been "free" for two years there was still a lot of racial prejudice mainly by Afrikaners.

There was a strong drive to replace white employees with local labour and, in their haste to pursue this policy; people were placed in banks, the post office and government departments before they were qualified. One example being a colleague who sent his African "house boy" to get a one-pound postal order returned with the postal order and the pound. When asked to explain proudly said that his brother

worked in the post office so he didn't take the money.

It is worth noting that the term "brother" meant someone of the same tribe!

Margaret, who ran the accounts department, was asked to recommend someone to take over from her and was pleased to put forward the name of a Zambian clerk who went by the name of McKenzie. Later she learned that as soon as he got the keys he made off with the contents of the safe. I must say that these were isolated cases and that the clerks, drivers and mechanics that I had to deal with were, in the main, excellent, loyal and friendly people.

Zambia was formerly Northern
Rhodesia and across the Zambesi, to the
south, lay Southern Rhodesia, which,
under Ian Smith maintained a white
dominated country. It did however
offer a western lifestyle that some
people missed in Zambia following
restrictions I mentioned in the previous
article, so sometimes we would set off at
about three o'clock in the morning,
cross the Zambesi at Chirundo, just as
the sun was rising and be in Salisbury
for about 9 a.m.

The 300-mile journey was on good tarmac roads and seldom another vehicle seen until the outskirts of Salisbury. Then it was into Meikees Hotel for coffee and cakes of a quality not available in Lusaka. We would leave about 4 pm for our return, remembering to fill our tank at the last petrol station to help out with fuel rationing in Zambia. The 600 miles round trip would be difficult to do in this country in one day.

I'll stop now before you become bored. Maurice Ford.
