#### **BIRD NEWS I**

Bird News II is always interesting and following on from last month's note I can confirm that it is unusual for Bullfinches to feed at a bird table. Bullfinches are regularly in the trees and shrubs at the back of our house but rarely come into the garden and never to our bird table or feeders.

John Hayden reported a Kingfisher near Moor Street Bow on two consecutive mornings, adding to my impression that this species has survived the winter pretty well. A small party of Waxwings has been seen occasionally in the Queens Road area of Nailsea (but not when I am there!)

Three Pintail were very unusual visitors to the Sea Wall area on the 13<sup>th</sup> and on the same day three Sand Martins flew past. There were two more Sand Martins in Clevedon on the 19<sup>th</sup>.

A Blackcap was singing in Wemberham Lane, Yatton on the 9<sup>th</sup>, an early date and possibly an over-wintering bird. The first Chiffchaff was heard on the 15<sup>th</sup> and by the 20<sup>th</sup> several were singing along the Strawberry Line.

John Croxton reported Littlewood 'alive with birds' on the 14<sup>th</sup> with Great Spotted Woodpeckers, Treecreepers, Goldcrests and Goldfinches very active and the Rookery in full cry.

John and I cleaned out the bird boxes at St. Andrew's School, Congresbury and found that all six had been used, an excellent record. Later we found a Tawny Owl in a box near the Strawberry Line with her mate roosting nearby.

Snipe had decreased to nine on the YACWAG Congresbury Moor site; these birds will soon be heading north whilst we can look forward to the Swallows, House Martins and Warbler species arriving in April.

#### **BIRD NEWS II**

The large number of Swans, well over thirty, that were mentioned in last month's News & Views that congregated in a field at the top of Nailsea Wall have now all dispersed; probably paired up ready for nesting.

I have spoken to Michelle Hill, who I reported last month had rescued a female Kestrel and nursed it back to health at her home in Wraxall, she tells me that the Kestrel is still around her house and pitches on the window sills looking through the window.

March 26<sup>th</sup>, Miles Naish has just reported seeing 10 Swallows hunting for flies among his sheep near the Seawall at Kingston. This is probably the earliest sighting I have ever heard of.

Jeff Naish has told us that he had seen a Barn Owl, almost daily, flying around the Nailsea Wall area, unfortunately he has recently found it dead in a field. Jeff also reports several Wheatears in the same area.

Margaret Ball has a pair of Jays regularly visiting her garden, drinking at her bird bath – Jays are not as shy as they were years ago.

#### Love is where you find it:-

Is it possible I wonder, for a person to come to admire, even love, an inanimate object; a thing? I think it is, especially if you are a seafarer. Let me explain.

Many, many years ago, I volunteered for the Royal Navy. There was a war on! I joined the Navy, not out of a great surge of patriotism, but mainly because a lot of my friends were already in one of the services and I didn't intend to be left out.

I chose the Navy because the thought of lying in the mud in some foreign field, or scrambling around in arid desert, or even flying, didn't much appeal to me. So the Navy it was.

After about three months shore training, I found myself standing on the quayside of a dock in Belfast, by my side was my kitbag containing all my worldly belongings and on my shoulder, my hammock. At that time in the Navy, sailors always carried their hammock with them whenever they joined a ship. Also there was a ship, my ship. She was new and an escort vessel. Her name was that of a small Cornish holiday resort. Painted a dull grey, she looked cold and cheerless. Once on board, with the rest of the crew, this atmosphere was confirmed and there was a strong smell of paint, oil and cordage.

By the end of the next month and now flying the White Ensign, we set off to the Hebrides for sea training. It was February and very, very cold. At last, after many travails, mistakes and some humour, together with many bouts of seasickness, not to say homesickness, we were declared fit for war. So off we went, but it was no holiday.

Fast forward now by more than a year and much action.. We are rocking gently at anchor in the shimmering heat of an African port recently vacated by the enemy. The sun is hot on our backs and beaming down on the steel deck plates.

It's the same ship, but she looks different, her paintwork is scarred and worn, there are streaks of rust along the hull and damage to the bridge and funnel, but, she is still there. Shore leave has been granted to the whole of the Port Watch, so I venture ashore myself. On shore, the locals eye us with a mixture of curiosity and awe, the men with suspicion and the women, heavily veiled, cast only furtive glances in our direction before looking away again. We had been warned not to go along into the warrens of alleys that is called the casbah, but the souk, the souk is different. Colourful sights, sounds and smells are everywhere. There is fruit aplenty, along with stalls selling ornate leather, brass and jewellery and cheap red wine.

From a high point ashore, I can look down into the bay and there she it, still at anchor in the sparkling blue water.

The ship, she is everything to us now, a bit of home and our provider. We get shelter and protection warmth from the cold nights and stormy seas. We get companionship, a tot of rum at 11.00 every day and hot food. We even get a little money from her. It is true that we take her into danger, but we're still here and from the Captain down, we're all in the same boat.

Fresh orders arrive and we go to Gibraltar. From Gibraltar, we are part of the escort of a convoy of some thirty ships and are homeward bound.

Crossing the Bay of Biscay, the bows of the ship plunge into the lengthening swell of the Atlantic, sending clouds of spray over the foc'sle head and tons of green water crashing back through the scuppers.

After about three days steaming at eight knots, one day of which was spent chasing off a U-boat, we arrive in the safety of home waters and the convoy disperses. Our destination is familiar Belfast where the ship is due for a refit and the crew for three weeks leave. Some to their bomb scarred towns and others to quiet villages, but all to see Mums and Dads, family friends, wives and lovers.

The three weeks hurry by and I find myself not too unwilling to return. The war is still raging on and we are part of it. Destined for now to spend our time away from home, on board ships and at sea. So I'm back, standing on that same quayside and there she is. This time, all repainted and repaired – I'm sure she is waiting for us, like a girlfriend showing off her new outfit. As I gaze, I think to myself, she is lovely, she is mine and I love her.
