Bird News I

Cliff Edwards mentioned to me that he had not seen any House Sparrows in his garden recently and I was able to tell him that in the Bristol area they have increased in numbers (by about 30%) in the last ten years. There is a colony of very active House Sparrows about a hundred yards from our house, yet it is unusual for us to see one in our garden – it seems that they have fairly definite favoured places.

Sarah Clark reported a Barn Owl and whilst checking the box on the YACWAG reserve (at the Yatton end of Kenn Moor Road) we found a couple of Barn Owl pellets, so perhaps the bird she saw has paid a few visits to the YACWAG fields.

John Croxton and myself have been involved in survey work for the National Bird Atlas and in the course of this we visited Cooks Lane and Clevedon Moor towards the end of November. This was quite productive with 7 Mistle Thrushes among the Fieldfares and redwings in the orchards and 23 Snipe in a (very) wet field.

This was an area visited by one of Ray's walks in the summer when John got a welly-boot full of water – I got a boot full of even colder water this time! Sightings of a couple of Little Grebes and a Grey Wagtail provided compensation though.

A flock of 50 Siskins was feeding on Alder catkins in Littlewood in early December and Green and Great Spotted Woodpeckers, Chiffchaff and Goldcrest were also present. On the adjoining moor a Peregrine was on one of the pylons and a Kingfisher flew along the icy rhyne in Claverham Drove.

A flock of Starling around 2000 strong was near to Kingston Seymour and we recorded a Woodcock (flushed as always) by Plantation Lakes.

Along the Strawberry Line, a flock of 35 Chaffinches was feeding on seed in hay put out for horses and a few Siskins and Redpolls were active at the Congresbury end of the line. The frozen ground brought a Water Rail into the open – it looked like a small clockwork toy as it crossed a drove on Congresbury Moor.

For the first time ever I failed to register a single Snipe on the monthly count of YACWAG and Congresbury Moor fields, but there was one Jack Snipe and the Barn Owl was still in residence.

Finally, I have not seen any Lapwings on the moors this winter, but there were 3,700 at Slimbridge on the 18th; a fantastic sight. Winter is the best time to visit Slimbridge with all the Bewick's Swans, White Fronted Geese, thousands of ducks and waders as well as the collection birds and a very nice café.

P.S. 30 plus Waxwings seen in Yatton on Christmas Eve (not by me!!!). If you have any ornamental berry laden shrubs near you – keep a good look out for these exotic visitors.

Bell Restoration News – 27th November 2008.

The report by John Ball & Julia Bush (any more J.B.s out there???) in the November "News & Views" gave little

idea of all the frustration suffered by all three of us, and the hard work carried out by those two, to get to the position they described!

I can only say a very great 'thank you' to them and our vicar for getting the paperwork together and in front of the Diocesan Advisory Committee (DAC) in time to get the faculty application posted on the church door in October/November despite all odds.

The 'stumbling block' has been our church architect. I feel particularly peeved because when he eventually revisited Kenn on 4th August after months of absolute silence he apologised personally to me, and quite convincingly, since he had been, in his own words "very re-miss in not getting on with the job sooner". Then he went away and again we have been unable to get any response from him at all! In the absence of the architect's specification, John Ball produced the specification we intended to work to, and the reason for the work being required, himself, in a very well illustrated document. Julia, our vicar, and myself tweaked it slightly where we considered necessary, and off it went to the DAC. He even sent a complimentary copy to our architect, but again, no response.

We were very rewarded, and somewhat surprised, therefore, to get a good response from the DAC. The first requirement, as I understand the position, was to display the notice of application for a faculty to carry out the work, on the door of the church for 28 days. This has now been done and no objections recorded. We now have to await the final authorisation and so it will most likely be in the New Year before the Whitechapel Bell-Foundry can re-schedule Kenn on their work list – they had asked if they could come

back in August! (Also, our team treasurer, having made the first down payment to the Foundry, believed the bell was already there in August

– I had to disillusion him!! I regret that we shall not be able to have the newly hung bell ringing for Christmas services – well we might have, but it will be Christmas 2009 at this rate! (Also our Chalice Handbell team, though very well supported now by new helpers from Yatton, may not be able to put in an appearance at the Kenn Carol Service as it clashes with the one at Yatton, which some wish to attend.)

One requirement of the DAC is causing us a bit of confusion - they require that the bottom ladder, to the first new landing in the tower, must be fixed. Our architect, and us, in August decided it would be best to have it removable so that it could be locked against the wall and no one could ascend the tower unauthorised. Also, it would leave the tower tidier and not obscure the 'Bishop Ken' West Window. The DAC then say we must work to the agreement of our architect having expressly disregarded his requirement themselves!! Wait for our next report to see how we overcome that obstacle! (As he seems very unwilling to answer us at all it may be left to our decision.)

In the meantime, John Ball's hydraulic platform sits patiently in the bottom of the tower awaiting the time when he has the "go-ahead" to start removing floors and making ready for the Bellhangers to move in. This will now most probably be in very cold weather, whereas had the architect got on with the job when promised, it could have been done in the relative warmth of the Autumn. (Sooner them than me up that tower in Winter!!)
