**Green ideas:** Grow plants and vegetables and trees, an allotment, walks, keep as a

#### BIRD NEWS I

The snow during the first half of the month drove more birds into gardens and we were rewarded with visits from a male Blackcap and both Great Spotted and Green Woodpeckers, which are all unusual species for our small garden.

Kingfishers seem to have survived the cold spell pretty well, as I have seen them recently at Yatton, Kingston Seymour, Wemberham and three on the Kenn River. The common Tits, Robins and Dunnocks seem to be thriving but I have only seen the odd Stonechat and a Water Rail calling on Congresbury Moor was the first that I had heard this year.

The YACWAG field here yielded 26 Snipe and a Jack Snipe, whilst on the 12<sup>th</sup> a Barn Owl spent at least two hours looking out from one of the nest boxes.

A survey walk around Kingston Seymour produced an overflying Peregrine, a flushed Woodcock and 150 Fieldfares. Nearby around 2000 Lapwings were at the Yeo Estuary (probably including the flock - or part of it) reported by Miles Naish last month. Our visit coincided with a very high tide and around 2000 Dunlin were trying to seek a dry roost until the tide ebbed. With them were a few Knot, Ringed Plovers, Grey Plovers and Turnstones. About a dozen Golden Plovers were with the Lapwings and a Barn Owl posed for us on one of the nest boxes at Blake's Pools.

#### **BIRD NEWS II**

Mrs Michelle Hill, who lives at Wraxall Court with her daughter Olivia, and keeps her ponies at Nailsea

Wall Farm, found a hen Kestrel in distress at West End Nailsea. She picked it up and took it home and fed it with lambs' liver for five days. It became so tame it would feed from her hand. After five days it had become stronger. Michelle then released it, the bird flew into a tree. Within a few minutes a male Kestrel appeared and immediately mated with her. At the time of writing these notes the hen bird is still flying around the area. Michelle also reports Bullfinches feeding at her bird table, which I think is very unusual.

Swans are again congregating in the Nailsea Wall area as they do every year at about this time. They seem to favour one of two particular fields to feed in. They graze on grass.

Jeff Naish reports that around St. Valentine's Day lots of birds seemed to be pairing up. Sheld or Burrow Ducks are arriving in pairs, much earlier than they usually do, also Black Backed Gulls are appearing in pairs in this area.

Sarah Clarke has reported that when her husband Tom was driving her to Yatton Station early one morning when the snow was deep, they saw about six Little Egrets standing on the ice near the Hump Backed Bridge in Yatton Moor. They must have found it cold, because until a few years ago they were normally only seen in the Mediterranean area.

Miles and Sheila Naish report very large numbers of wild birds feeding at their bird table during the very cold weather. Where they live on the edge of Russ is a marvellous place for all sorts of wild birds.

### Revd. Derek Evans and Revd. Frank Stevens

On Friday 20<sup>th</sup> February, Grace and I represented St. John's at a Service in Wells Cathedral of Thanksgiving for the life of the Revd. Derek Evans.

Some years ago, Derek took the occasional service in our church. Those of us who came to know him, were impressed by this classic country priest. A gentle, caring optimistic man, whose catch phrase was "we have so much to be thankful for"

Derek served the whole of his ministry in the diocese of Bath and Wells. First as curate at St. Mary's Taunton 57/61. Then as Vicar of Trull 61/77. Following this he was Rector of Street with Walton 78/94, including Greinton

81/90. Also Rural Dean Taunton South 72/77 and Glastonbury 79/82.

He was a Prebendary of Wells Cathedral 77/94, a truly outstanding ministry from a dedicated "people's man". He loved nothing better than a chat to find out "how are things with you?"

The attendance at the service was an indicator of the high regard in which he was held. We understand there were about 900 of us.

Following his death on 30<sup>th</sup> November last. His widow Joan and family received over 700 letters and cards.

The Service of three tributes; readings and six great hymns was an event to be remembered.

On the previous day, February 19<sup>th</sup>, Marianna, Robin, Grace and I had attended the Thanksgiving Service for Frank Stevens (see my tribute in February News & Views). This again had been a happy and joyful event, remembering a long life, lived to the full and touching for good, so many other lives.

Frank had many gifts, including poetry and we reproduce here one of his poems, written when he was eighty. It tells us a lot about his character.
