

Kenn Village Hall - Kenn Village Hall, now some sixty-five years old, continues to be cared for by willing helpers, some being grandchildren of its founders, so that it is always available for the enjoyment of Kenn people. How many readers and those who enjoy parties and events in the Hall at very modest rents ever pause to think what it costs to maintain such a building? A copy of the accounts is always kept on the notice board in the Hall; I wonder if many people when enjoying themselves at a party or working to raise money at events pause to read and digest the figures:

Just to keep the Hall in operation costs £252, i.e. rates, insurance and service charges. Electricity for the year to March 31st 1989 amounted to £222 and the installation "Frost Watchers" and electrical maintenance cost £418, painting £210 and the purchase of a secondhand polisher for the floor £60.

The Hall Committee during the year raised £625 from jumble sales, dances and cheese and wine parties and income from rents was £461.

At all times the Hall Committee has to conform with certain regulations, i.e. music and dancing licence which indicates music must cease at 11.45 p.m. on Saturday evenings, and

11.59 p.m. on weekdays. We are now advised by the Environmental Department improved washing facilities are required, hence more expenditure.

We hope to arrange a dance in September, a jumble sale on August 16th at 7.00 p.m. and a Grand Christmas Draw, the prizes of which will be drawn at a wine and cheese party on December 2nd. A volunteer has offered to arrange a Halloween party on October 28th, which the Committee has gladly accepted.

To everyone who has helped with cleaning, painting, polishing, washing tea cloths, moving rubbish throughout the year, a warm thank you - to anyone who would like to help, a warm welcome. R. M. Dyer

The best 'English Country Garden' I have seen this year belongs to Mrs. Edith Tripp of 'Riverside', Kenn Pier. Although Mrs. Tripp is an octogenarian and is not very mobile, she does a bit of gardening each day. KENN WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

At the beginning of the May meeting members stood in respect for the memory of Mrs. Pearce's son, David, who died recently. A collection was made for the Radiotherapy Unit at the B.R.I.

Final arrangements were made for the trip to Worcester in June. As the Denman Bursary has not been taken up this year it has been decided to spend the money on an educational project for all members. From THE WHITE TOWER, ALDWICK ROAD, BOGNOR REGIS, SUSSEX

I've been asked to write a little bit for the Kenn mag. and as John Griffin started the ball rolling about Moorgate House I can continue. I have read with great interest the new Kenn mag. and enjoy it very much - Lucy kindly sends me a copy with the Church mag. each month. I read it, enjoy it, have a laugh and then send it on to Canada to Aunt Velma and Uncle Jim Stowell. They enjoy them also. Uncle Jim is still very interested in Kenn, Moorgate House and the Stowell family. Yes, he's 98 years old, lives in a nursing home and very well when Richard visited him at Christmas. Has anyone an old photo of Moorgate House I could get a copy from for him please? Miss Pinder kindly sent some snaps which he enjoyed.

Dad, Mother, Hugh (Boy) and Kate Stowell also lived at Moorgate with Granny Stowell (known as Jo Stowell in Canada). They were married at Wraxall on 18th September 1917 and lived at Moorgate before moving to Portbury House on 1st January 1919. I've heard Dad talk about the pigs -they mostly went to Bristol to the butchers, Hodders.

I also remember staying at Moorgate. John and I stayed there with Gran Stowell when Mother was ill. We slept in the front bedroom, road side. I was about 6, John about 4. I had just started school. Kathleen Hale and Iris Stone from Kenn Pier took me. I remember the lovely flowers Granny S. used to grow, pink and red tulips, narcissi and geums. I also remember the loo down the garden.

Aunty Flo Ogbourne used to live where Mr. Donald Staples lives. Aunty Polly Harris lived with her and Uncle Fred. I stayed with them many times. She used to keep a little shop and sell Bluebird toffees, so many for an old penny, done up in a little bag like a kite. She also kept a slate and woe betide anyone who didn't pay up end of week. Some lovely cases of stuffed bird and a squirrel she had in her hall. I loved those birds years ago, wonder what happened to them.

Uncle Fred Stowell, another of the Stowell brothers, wounded in the first world war, caugi TB in the Navy, lived with Aunty Flo and she looked after him till he died. I remember visiting him on a Sunday evening with Mum, Dad and John and thinking when we came out, what a long walk home to Portbury House.

Many years later, Mrs. Baker, Lucy and myself used to walk up from The Laurels, always used to be foggy then. We used to wonder about the ghost that was supposed to be in some ground opposite Mill Farm. She must have settled or never been, I haven't heard of her for years.

My husband Tom Hawes and his brother George lived with Mrs. Woolley at Moorgate for a shorttime. Later Tom rented the garage from Mr, and Mrs. Cox when he lived with Mr. and Mrs. Griffin at Mill Farm. Tom also has memories of THAT ENGINE and over the years I've heard a lot about it. Also the nights he used to cycle up Kenn Street back to Mill Farm with no light. Funny how P.C.Cloxton always knew. He had a habit of telling you about it a few days later. Uncanny - made you think - I wonder whose doorway or gateway he was in. Favourite place was behind the Vicarage hedge by the little latch gate now gone. Happy days. Kathleen Hawes

FROM THE POTTING SHED

Dear Kate, I suppose you will not be doing much in your garden now. However, just in case, now is a good time to take cuttings of pinks, carnations, etc. Also bulbs should be lifted, dried and stored ready for replanting in the Autumm.

Looking even further ahead, wallflower and sweet william seed cannow be sown outdoors in a nursery bed ready for blooming next year after replanting. Outdoor tomatoes can also be put out now. In fact there is so much to do that there is little time to do mything else. Did you know that salt is an excellent weed killer and safe? It is especially good with weeds such as those large flat thistles which are so difficult to lift. Just sprinkle a little salt on the centre and leave. It will die and then can be easily removed.

Dear Uncle Freddie - Things are rather at a standstill in the 'Concrete Jungle' now. Having completed the first deck of slabs and made borders around, we are now saving up for the next deliveries. We are off on holiday on Saturday 27th but I have a tried and tested method for my houseplants which doesn't disturb the neighbours. Fill the kitchen sink to half full with cold water and soak a bath towel. Drape half the towel across the draining board and leave the other half in the water. Stand all the houseplants (obviously without saucers) on the draining board. After a week, even a fortnight, my plants usually look better than they do the rest of the year. Yours Kate

RECIPE OF THE MONTH Marion Atkinson's Brandy Cake

5	oz butter) oz caster sugar) oz S.R. flour)	Cake mix	
3	eggs)		
3	oz sugar)	
Ł	pt water) Hot mixture for pouring	g
3	- 4 tables. brandy/or rum) over cake when cooked.	_
3.	Tables. coffee essence (Camp))	

by pt. double cream, few chopped walnuts - for decoration

Cream butter and sugar together. Gradually beat in eggs one at a time add 1 tabls. of flour with last addition of egg. Fold in rest of the flour.

Pour mixture into cake tin - large tin (I use a quiche dish, then I can serve the cake direct from the quiche dish, thus saving all the brandy juice). Cook for about 35 mins. depending on oven.

Skewer cake all over - make lots of holes virtually all over the cake. Pour the hot mixture over the cake while it is still hot.

Hot Mixture

Heat together sugar and water, until the sugar has dissolved. Remove from heat and add the brandy (or rum) and coffee essence.

Leave cake to stand for at least 10 hours so that the mixture thoroughly soaks through the cake.

Just before serving - whip $\frac{1}{2}$ pt double cream until thick, spoon over the cake. Sprinkle with walnuts.
