I'm pleased to report that the logbook, terrier and inventory are up to date and all the items therein are in good order.

We are due for a quinquennial report in the near future.

This year we have not had to do any major repairs inside the church, the week by week cleaning and general care being mainly carried out by the ladies of the Altar Guild, to whom we are very grateful.

The churchyard has seen considerable activity. Some long overdue tree surgery was performed and with the archdeacon's permission an invasive shrub was removed. This means that when we leave the church and lift our eyes unto the (Mendip) hills the view is uninterrupted and a joy.

We have an ageing and faithful congregation, of whom a large proportion travel some distance to attend. Our attendance numbers have held up well.

Sadly we do not have many children crossing our threshold despite personal contact, both verbal and postal, with particular emphasis on the 'special' services. Thus we greatly value the youngsters who have joined us and we were thrilled to have so many little ones at the Christingle and Crib services.

Re our 'New Room and Loo Room', the wheels of progress turn exceeding slow. The next significant date is 29<sup>th</sup> April, by which time the plans will have been seen by the relevant august bodies. Don't hold your breath.

Finally, I would like to thank all the people who quietly and calmly do their bit to keep St. John's alive and well.

It's dangerous to pick out anyone in particular but Mary Holmes and Jean Naish must be in line for a special mention for their tireless contributions.

# Parish Council Matters

At the last Parish Council Meeting we were all very saddened to receive the resignation of Mr. Naish on the grounds of ill health. In accepting his resignation and thanking Ray for all his hard work Mr Griffin wished him a speedy return to full health.

Ray joined the Parish Council in 1961 and has been Chairman twice in that time. It is unlikely that Kenn parishioners will ever again benefit from the wisdom and experience gained by Mr Naish over the years and so willingly given to his community.

The proposed development for Smart Systems at Yatton evoked a great deal of lively debate. The Parish Council was not minded to oppose the application but has written to the Planning Department in the following vein.

- The proposed development is outside the Yatton village fence and sets a very dangerous precedent.
- The B3133 is totally unsuitable for the volume of traffic that would eventually use it and should be resurfaced and maintained to a high level.

The speed limit should continue right though Kenn and be enforced.

The stretch of road from Kenn Street to Kenn Estate and beyond is lethal to people on foot and with prams etc. and some thought should be given to providing a footpath all the way through the village.

3. The whole matter should be decided by the Planning Committee, which the public can attend, so that the reasons for whatever decision is made are in the public domain.

Kenn is again taking part in the Best Kept Village Competition. The village is being divided into sections with someone responsible for tidying each part. The Parish Council will be grateful for any help they are offered.

Mrs. Ball has worked out a splendid programme for the Jubilee celebrations.

The world is such a terrible place at the moment, let's support her and her helpers and let our hair down and enjoy ourselves. Please.

# News from The Limes, Kenn Moor Road

I rushed out quickly with the camera to take a photograph. It was an example of Geo-Textiles that I teach my A level group about. They use fabrics in unstable road conditions to stabilise the road. It's often used on desert roads. We now have our own example right outside my front door so I will be watching the road with great interest to see how it copes with out moorland conditions.

### BIRD NEWS I

By early April a good number of Chiffchaffs had arrived and a few Blackcaps were singing. Generally the run of northerly winds restricted migration until the 19<sup>th</sup> when the winds swung to the south. On the weekend of 20<sup>th</sup>/21<sup>st</sup> two separate friends reported Redstart in the Clevedon gardens and a Pied Flycatcher was at Poets Walk on the same date. An Alpine Swift (a very rare vagrant) was seen over Sand Point at Weston-super-Mare.

There were reports of Cuckoos from the reservoirs on the 21st and Hobbies on the Somerset Levels. Also by this time Swallows seemed to have arrived in force but our local House Martins were still to put in an appearance.

An evening stroll along Middle Lane, Kingston Seymour produced a Cetti's Warbler. This was a real surprise as they are generally confined to reasonable sized reed-beds – this bird was in a cut low hawthorn hedge with a few strands of reeds. A small party of Swallows came over, a Green Woodpecker called loudly, as did a Chiffchaff and there were Goldfinches, Robins, Wrens and Dunnocks all in song.

Many migrants will continue to arrive in May – the best month for birds in my opinion.

On Sunday 26th there is an Open Day at Shapwick Heath with lots of attractions and all free. I will be pleased to provide details.

# Yvonne Elizabeth Ayres

On Thursday 18th April Kenn Church was packed with the friends and family of Yvonne Ayres, who had come to say their last farewell to a former Kenn resident. Who although she latterly lived in Clevedon never seemed to have entirely left the village.

Mark and Yvonne Ayres met through their mutual love of light opera and choral music.

They came to live at Mendip View in the 60's. There they raised 3 daughters Jane, Beverley and Rowena and would have stayed in Kenn Street far longer had ill health not forced them to move to a bungalow in South Clevedon.

Sadly, Mark died in 1999, but Yvonne, though a wheelchair user, maintained her independence by staying on in the bungalow, confident in the support of 'her girls', which she treasured but never took for granted.

Yvonne and 'her wheels' were a regular feature at Communion and Family Service and she was the first to volunteer when a Cake Bake was planned.

I had recently rekindled my friendship with Yvonne and was impressed by how well organised she was in her house, and how cheerful. I don't remember a conversation with Yvonne without a smile or an anecdote, even when we were talking about something serious like 'accessibility' in the church.

# WHEN THREE MEN WERE HANGED AT KENN

An article by Ronald Bailey

This is an extract from the Weston Mercury and Somersetshire Herald of August 13<sup>th</sup> 1954.

If you should ever venture down Kenn way - that no-man's land of flat moorland between Clevedon and Yatton - you must ask a few questions about the public hanging of three men at Yew Tree Farm.

It happened a long time ago - in 1830 to be exact - but the grim event so impressed everybody that fathers have handed the story down to their sons, and the sons have passed the story to their own sons.

In the course of the years the story has gathered various embellishments, and today I doubt if few people can separate fact from fiction.

The popular version of this story is that three local men were convicted of sheep stealing, in those days a capital offence, and at Wells Assizes they were sentenced to be hanged at the scene of their crime.

The three men, tied hand and foot, and sitting in their own rudely fashioned coffins were brought, it is said, in a horse drawn waggon from Shepton Mallet Gaol to Kenn.

In every village that the grim cortege passed through the bells were tolled, and at Congresbury, where it happened to be Fair Day, the crowds broke up and followed the procession to the place of execution.

At Kenn, gallows had been erected beneath which the waggon and its victims were drawn. Fifteen thousand people were looking on and many of them clambered into trees for a better view. One tree collapsed throwing the sordid spectators into the river.

The three condemned men, each with a Prayer Book in his hands, were noosed and, at a given signal, the waggon was withdrawn and the trio were left suspended in mid-air, writhing in their last gasps. It is even told how the hangman swung on the legs of the victims until their necks 'snicked', and the whole ugly business was finished.
