Last year I did a sponsored 200 mile walk for the Royal Commonwealth Society for the Blind, a society which helps blind people in the more underdeveloped Commonwealth countries. I raised £316.42, of which £200.36 was raised from Kenn residents. A few days ago I received details of how your money was spent.

It had been divided equally between a hospital bed in Bhopal and an eye camp in Bangladesh. The eye camp was held in the village of Suzanagar in Pabna District, Bangladesh. Surgeons performed 26 operations for the restoration of sight and 2 operations for the prevention of imminent blindness. 255 patients were treated in all for various eye disorders.
