## OVERSEAS VISITORS

August 28th. A large party from the village of Kenn in Germany arrived in Kenn hoping to be able to buy souvenirs from Kenn. The Post Office Stores was invaded in force and many photographs were taken of the shop, our local, our church and Village Green.

August 30th. A Mrs D'ARCY from Australia visited Kenn hoping to discover where some of her late husband's family had lived.

Information she gave in her search was her late husband Norman D'ARCY's grandmother Isabella, better known as Jessica, daughter of Henry John PLUM-LEY and his wife Ellen PARSLEY was born and lived in Kenn, suggesting they lived for a period at least in Kenn Cottage. Did this refer to the old thatched cottage, now demolished, at the end of Kenn Road?

The eldest son Arthur Henry died in Clevedon in 1934 and is buried in St. Andrew's, Clevedon. His wife's name was Gladys.

Referring to Kelly's Directory of Somersetshire 1894 under Ken (Kenn) it states John PARSLEY was a market gardener; no address given. Was he the father or relation of the above Ellen PARSLEY? August 29th. A large posse of police searched land adjacent to the M5 after an elderly motorist had left his wife in his car and caravan which had broken down near the Kenn M5 bridge. Despite an extensive search in fields, ditches and farm buildings the missing man could not be found. However some hours later he was discovered at home in Twekesbury having forgotten he had left his wife, car and caravan on the motorway!!

## "A VILLAGE HARVEST"

After all the planning, meetings and hard work of the last 6 months, the idea of doing the whole thing all over again really took my breath away.

In the early Spring the Cleeve, Nailsea and District Flower Arranging Society approached Kenn W.I. and the PCC about holding a flower festival. The small committee met regularly and gradually more and more people were involved (most volunteered). All Summer we watched the weather, surely it couldn't rain much longer. #### BOTHY IN SCOTLAND

Although there was some very (greeny-grey lake in a greeny-grey valley with dull green mountains and permanent grey clouds), was not the most tourist industry alive. inspirational and I left sooner that I had expected.

This gave me two weeks to do whatever the heck I liked, so I visited Inverness, Fort William (where I stayed but was unable to climb Ben Nevis as intended because of the weather), and finally Tongue.

Tongue is my ancestral home, and the graveyard there was unique in my experience. Just as Kenn graveyard has certain recognised names in it (DYER, for example), so this consisted almost exclusively of Robert MACKAY, Dougal MACKAY, Angus MACKAY, and spookily enough, James MACKAY. It was a funny feeling to look at that one, I can tell you!

Then across the sea again, this time to Handa. There I spent a week shepherding. tourists around and being attacked by 'bonxies' (a.k.a. Great Arctic Skuas), as

well as the little jobs like stacking the fire and cutting the peat. It was a nice end (with lots of gales thrown in) to a brilliant holiday, but all the same I'm glad to be home and - literally - dry!

## MARKET MOANS

A few months ago a planning application was submitted to Woodspring District Council for an open air market to be held on the car park of Clevedon Town Football Club, which is in Kenn. The permission has not yet been granted or even considered as the applicants have not furnished Woodspring with sufficient details of the number of stalls or when these markets would be held. In spite of not having the necessary planning permission the car boot sale went ahead. Since then a similar advert has appeared in the Clevedon Mercury. I know I'm not alone in not relishing the prospect of Kenn being the venue for the 'number one car boot sale in the West'. With open air markets and car boot sales every week Kenn will never be the same again.
