KENN HISTORY.

Do readers recognize how lucky we are in Kenn in that none of our historic farmhouses have been demolished? They include Kenn Court, Manor Farm, Walnut Tree Farm, Kenn Pier Farm, Carpenter's Farm, Latcham House, Lake Farm and Colehouse Farm. Lake farm house is not occupied at the present time. This is a very ancient building and fortunately it still has a good roof so hopefully it won't deteriorate any further.

The only farmhouse that has disappeared in modern times was Poplar Farm.. This was situated in Kenn Street on the site near the Village Hall where the six modern houses now stand. This house had probably not been occupied since the last century.

Kingston Seymour also still has its ancient houses still intact but like Kenn it has lost some old cottages which were mostly pulled down because they were unfit to be lived in.

Yatton has faired badly. Many of the historic buildings have disappeared in the last 30 years. They include the old Yatton Vicarage, a fine three storey building that faced the church on the end of Well Lane. Another tragedy was when the old Court Farm, a lovely old thatched farmhouse, was pulled down to make way for the Gateway shopping centre. Cherry Tree Farm was also demolished, to make way for the new houses in Cherry Grove.

Clevedon has few of its old farmhouses left. As recently as 1976 the ancient Tutton's Farm was pulled down. But the greatest tragedy of all for that town was when the Directors of St. Brandon's School had the ancient Salisbury Farm bulldozed to make their playing field larger. This was a magnificent historic farm - the house and farm buildings were all thatched. There is probably no other farm house and buildings of that quality for many miles around and sadly there are few photographs of those beautiful buildings.

KENN VILLAGE HALL

On Monday 21st January, 1991 a meeting of the Hall Committee was held in Kenn Village Hall.

A great deal of discussion ensued, following a letter received from a firm of solicitors acting on behalf of Miss L. Baker. It put forward a complaint of 'excessive noise' at the Disco held on Saturday 15th December, 1990, both during and after the event. The letter continued to point out that Miss Baker had already made an earlier complaint to the Hall Committee regarding damage to her health following the Disco held on 6th May, 1989 and that she could not be expected to tolerate the situation any longer. Therefore, Miss Baker felt that her next available option was to bring an Action for Damages for Noise and Nuisance. Whilst being loathe to do this owing to to her lifelong interest in the village and her many friends, she also felt that her views had so far been ignored by the Hall Committee.

The meeting was told that Mr. Laken, Assistant Director for Building Control, had been informed of the fact that these Discos numbered 3 per year and did much good in fundraising for both charity and the Hall itself. Several Committee Members pointed out that they had shown express concern after earlier letters and had spoken to Miss Baker accordingly. Also that on 15th December the organisers had gone to great lengths to contain and reduce the noise, keeping all doors and windows firmly closed.

At the close of this meeting it wad agreed that until further information was available, all Discos would be banned.

An Extraordinary Meeting of the Hall Committee was held on Monday 28th January 1991 when Mr. Hitchcock from the Environmental Health Department was present. Mr. S. Pascoe was in attendance as an observer and interested party.

Mr. Hitchcock's personal opinion was that there were 3 views of the complaint:

- 1) There could be a case for Statutory Nuisance for the Local Authority to deal with.
- 2) The events in question 3 per year were so infrequent they would not amount to a nuisance.
- 3) Only one person was affected, therefore it amounted to a Private Nuisance. The Local Authority would not be involved and it was for Miss Baker and the Hall Committee to resolve.

Mr. Hitchcock said our case could fall into any one of these categories. With regard to Statutory Nuisance the following applies:

- a) Infrequency of events.
- b) Some sort of effort at noise control is made.
- c) The event is terminated at a reasonable hour.
- d) Efforts are made to encourage people to leave quietly.

He went on to say that if an event ceased and everybody had left by midnight - that would be reasonable and that should the Local Authority take action within these provisos, the courts would offer little sympathy in regard to Statutory Nuisance.

The subject of Governors was raised - a device that can be set to cut all power to the Disco equipment if the agreed volume is exceeded.

It was asked how the noise was actually measured and in reply Mr. Hitchcock said that so far the noise had not been measured mechanically but he had found it to be "intrusive" when answering the earlier complaint from Miss Baker. If invited he would measure the noise with a precision meter.

The question arose as to what would happen if the number of bookings for Discos was exceeded in favour of Private requests. Mr. Hitchcock said the Hall Committee would then have to weigh up the pros and cons of Local Authority Action. In the case of a Private Action it would be for the aggrieved party to seek an injunction from their Solicitor.

Several Committee Members expressed their concern that events other than Discos were in jeopardy and that overall there was now a deep anxiety amongst the Community.

As the meeting drew to a close it was proposed that a letter of reply to Miss Baker's solicitor be forwarded with the following points.

- 1) That Discos be limited to 4 per year.
- 2) That all efforts be made to control noise, including the fitting of a Governor and the subsequent effects measured.
- 3) That all events finish within a reasonable time.

The motion was seconded and carried.

On receipt of a reply from Miss Baker's solicitor the Committee will consider all future events accordingly.

Some may need repotting but do not be tempted into overpotting as this will encourage too much root at the expense of the blooms.

On any dry days it is a good idea to get started out of doors. Tie up the perennials, remove any dead bits and pieces and prune anything overgrown. This would be a good month to test your soil with a kit obtainable from garden centres.
