
Women's World Day of Prayer 2015

Bird News

No sooner had I written about the lack of Redwings and Fieldfares (KN&V last month) than a spell of cold weather brought an influx to the mild(er) South West and reasonable flocks have remained in our area. The berries have gone so they are feeding on invertebrates on wet fields. They are often in mixed flocks with Starlings and falcons Peregrine Falcons have been regular on Kenn Moor and the Wemberham area of Yatton predating them (mostly Starlings I suspect).

A Black Redstart has been visiting gardens in Kenn Street, reported by both Chris Blake and Simon Pascoe. These are quite rare winter visitors albeit occasionally a pair nests in the Bristol area.

I haven't received a single report of a Barn Owl seen in daylight this winter but several instances of night time sightings including along Claverham Drove.

There is still a high population of field voles to the extent that the owls can find plenty of food in the hours of darkness and if this continues, it bodes well for the 2015 season.


Ravens been noisy in the last couple of weeks, but do not seem to have returned to last year's nest site on the pylon on Congresbury Moor. I have noticed that a new nest has appeared, this one on a large pylon north of Lampley Road.


The pools at Dowlais Farm hosted 120 Lapwings mid month along with a single Common Gull (which are not common in these parts and are now called Mew Gull......) Possibly the same Lapwing flock was over the Severn Estuary a few days later with some smaller birds, possibly Golden Plovers, but too far out to make a positive identification.

Finally, 53 Snipe and a single Jack Snipe were present on YACWAG's Kenn Moor reserves, the highest count of the winter.

Corn farmers are starting to plough and get next years corn sown, just hope the weather lasts it makes life so much easier.

Mrs Christine Malet -

Known to Kenn School Pupils as Miss Bond from 1935/1940?

Miss Bond taught at Kenn school in the late thirties, as a support teacher; that is 'unqualified'. It was here that my late brother John and I passed through Christine's hands.

From those early years we did not meet again, until Ray Naish organised the first reunion for former pupils at Kenn.

After this I intended to visit her at her home, but did not pursue this, as I am not good at finding my way around Bristol. How wrong I was; when I rang to say I would like to make contact, Christine immediately remembered me and a number of my contemporaries of that time. She lived next to Bristol Zoo and each time I called on her she would ask after Ray. When I relayed this to him he would express surprise, since he had not been taught by her.



Miss Pilgrim is likely to have been Ray's earliest teacher. Miss Pilgrim lived at Kenn Court Cottages with her spinster sister. Ray probably figured in Mrs Malet's mind as being the mainspring of the reunions.

At the outbreak of WWII Christine joined the ATS and was subsequently offered a commission which she declined, saying that she did want 'to leave my girls' as she put it to me, This was typical of her nature and at her funeral I spoke to a number of people, from all walks of life from education, past parishioners and acquaintances all of whom attested to her loyalty and affection.

Christine had a happy facility of bonding with people to lasting effect. She told of visiting her best friend Mrs Fishley-Holland (the wife of Mr. Fishley-Holland the potter of Court Lane). As her friend lay dying, she visited twice a day. I suspect this was a period when she taught at East Clevedon, giving her the opportunity to visit at both ends of the school day.

After her military service, Christine then formally trained to be a fully fledged teacher.

This career path took her to Merrywood Grammar School, Bristol where she taught alongside my cousin for a time, All Saints, Clevedon and as Deputy Heatdat Portishead with 1400 pupils.

Some years ago, when I re-established contact with Christine, her home was on Clifton Down, a superb flat where she was very happy.

Each time I took my wife to Southmead Hospital, I would call as I had two hours to while away, we would discuss all manner of subjects, all of which she would be 'up to speed' with; on one occasion saying that if she were younger computers would appeal very much to her.

Over the period of Christine's passing, I learned of her affection for Scotland. We never debated this, however, I remember she loved to watch the Edinburgh Tattoo.

Another thing we did not discuss was her husband, whom she described as an old rascal. I did not ask her to enlighten me, but at the wake, a parishioner described him as a most interesting genuine person.

Talking of things not discussed; at the funeral I met a relative who told me of Christine's interest in cars, mentioning she first bought a second-hand MG followed by a brand new one. I can really visualise that car suiting her.

During her time at Westbury Fields, Christine was wonderfully cared for. I believe that Christine had fallen while out walking and fractured her pelvis. From then on she needed full nursing care.

At that time I lost touch, but having done a trawl of the Clifton church offices, I got lucky. Christine told me that since entering Westbury Fields not a day had passed without a visitor, except Christmas Day. This was so that her friends and family had the freedom of this special day.

Towards the end Mr & Mrs Hurrell of Clevedon were kind enough to keep Ruth and myself briefed on Christine's condition, pneumonia, followed by low blood pressure, but she would not allow staff to send her to hospital.

When talking to Mr. Hurrell about the coming funeral, he told me that Christine had left complete details of her funeral, chief among them was no tributes, no flowers, no fuss.

I was wrong footed by this as I hoped to learn material for this missive. And also to send a posy from the Class of 37/40. As it was, we contributed to the new organ fund at All Saints, at her request.

The funeral at All Saints, Clifton was quite high church, by our standards.

The coffin was already in place surrounded by candles with no adornments.

On seeing this and Christine's love of flowers, I am sure that thinking of a posy would have pleased her. At the conclusion we took communion.

There was a good congregation and the wake was held on site in the function room.

Some years ago, John Griffin told me of visiting a dying parishioner and he said to John "I am not afraid" which I thought was quite a nice place to be.

On this note, I feel that Christine will have passed from us with every hope of such comfort

KENN BELL, again!

At the bottom of page 3 in February's KN&V was a short item about John and Grace Griffin "ringing in" the New Year, 2015.

Thank you both from me (as that saves me going out late on a winter's night!) and also, I am sure, from all Kenn residents who seek to keep up such old traditions.

What the item didn't say was that 2015 brings the 200th anniversary of our bell being cast and installed in St. John's Church tower.

The exact dates we do not know but it is sufficient to know that the date of paying the bill, in the Churchwardens' accounts of that time, was 25th. October.

This year that date falls very conveniently on a Sunday so I am hoping our service on that day might somehow be "themed" around this very special anniversary.

If enough people are interested I am prepared to show visitors up the tower and explain what I can of the history of this bell and the earlier one which it replaced.

Hopefully this can be done on the previous day, Saturday 24th October, and possibly the following Saturday too if enough book with myself on 01934 834550.

Only one or two can be taken up at a time and we will have to have a steward on three floors.

Visitors would have to be responsible for their own safety and that of any children accompanying them!

I have not yet had chance to discuss the above with Warren or our Churchwardens so it is all dependent on their approval...and on my health and capability at the time for the tower visits!!

Reflections of a (newish) Parish Councillor

Recently I realised with a shock that it is about two years since I was co-opted onto Kenn Parish Council (KPC) and in view of the looming General Election and Council Elections I thought I'd share some personal reflections on being a Parish Councillor.

Firstly I must say how much I have enjoyed working with the other members of KPC and have appreciated the courtesy and respect that they have shown me. Meetings are well chaired (I even chaired one once!) and we have excellent and dedicated support from our Parish Clerk. Generally we have a harmonious relationship but needless to say there are times I haven't agreed with everyone and when one is out voted at a meeting I have tried not to take it personally. I know no-one is getting at me – I just accept they are wrong! Usually we do agree and I'd like to think we work well together. Most of us have our own areas of interest and expertise and that brings strength to the team.

When you become a parish councillor you immediately find people expect you to be able to sort out all their problems and of course this is just not possible. No councillor has any more power or authority than anyone else in the village and parish councils themselves have well defined responsibilities and boundaries within which they have to operate.

Cameron's Localism does not mean that we can take on everything at local level. It simply does not work like that and for many things we rely on North Somerset Council anyway.

One of the shocks on becoming a councillor was the frustratingly slow pace of trying to achieve anything. North Somerset Council is probably no better or worse at getting things done than any other, but having come from the fast moving hi-tech microelectronics business it was a culture clash.

When you see the same issues crop up a year later you do feel like asking why? On one issue I asked how long it had been going on and the answer was 14 years! That is not a criticism of the Parish Council but more a comment on the scenario in which we have to operate.

Another shock was the amount of routine stuff we had to address. I've learned a lot about drains, hedges and garden planters!

On the other hand there are some areas where we can just get on with things. A couple of examples come to mind which also show that councillors do literally get their hands dirty. In my case one was mending the (soon to be removed) dog bin at the end of Kenn Street and the other was with another villager clearing a vast number of drinks bottles that someone had tipped into a foot of (cold) water by the side of the road. I also look after the village defibrillator in the old phone box and ensure it is checked regularly.

We have had some articles in KN&V about standing for the Kenn Parish Council next May. My advice would be to go for it if you are interested BUT do consider the following points first:

- You must have the interests of the village at heart. Remember that Kenn is not a museum and whether we like it or not, change is inevitable and it should be managed appropriately.
- Be prepared for people to be disappointed that you aren't fixing their problem or sorting out their neighbour. You have to work within the constraints of the local government system and relevant legislation. Also some things are outside your remit.
- You must be prepared to attend the meetings and do your homework beforehand. If not don't bother standing. Meetings are every two months with additional ones as required
- You must be prepared to work as a team, make sensible contributions and not get emotional if things don't go your way.
- Do have a chat with a councillor beforehand. Most of them have far more experience than I have.

So why become a Parish Councillor? Within our democratic society someone has to do it! With continuing council cutbacks and the pressure on North Somerset for housing, Kenn Parish Council needs people with energy and vision more than ever. You have an opportunity to give something to the community and influence life for the better. Despite some of my comments it is possible to get things done and improve our village!

Finally, will I stand in May? I don't know. Probably.
