After a very dry Autumn it was all change in mid November with six inches of rain in as many days.

Generally it has been a quiet month bird wise - my only really unusual sighting being a Black Redstart at the farm in Wemberham Lane, Yatton. This coincided with an arrival of these birds - there were 14 on Scilly.

Unfortunately the resident Sparrows were giving the Black Redstart a hard time and I wasn't surprised that I didn't see it again.

The nearby electricity pylons hosted a Peregrine on a couple of occasions when there were good numbers of Starlings around.

There were two Peregrines at the Sea Wall including the small bird which was present a couple of years ago. Other than that the Sea Wall hasn't turned up much, but the Dunlin flock had reached 700 by mid month.

Kingfishers are still in evidence but the heavy rain and swollen watercourses won't have done them any favours.

A drake Tufted Duck on the Blackditch near Claverham Drove was unusual. A flock of 70 Goldfinches was in the same area but I think that most of them are in our gardens now. Fieldfares and Redwings have arrived in reasonable numbers to feed on the plentiful berries. I have seen a couple of Mistle Thrushes but no Song Thrush for weeks now.

Finally, Snipe have been scarce on the YACWAG fields. It was probably too dry and now it's too wet for them. When splash flooding occurs they spread out to find areas with the best conditions for them.

During the first two weeks of November there was no end of activity at Chapel Cottage. The house was used as a film set.

A film company, with a very small budget, had based themselves in Clevedon for the duration of casting, finding locations and filming. The director, Tom had been talking to Jon Earl ('Songs from the shed' fame) about what they were looking for. He put Tom in our direction.

The film is an adaptation of a children's book, 'Dead Man's Cove' by Lauren St John. The book belongs to a series 'The Laura Marlin Mysteries'. The basic plot is Laura lives in a children's home. (The Clevedon Community Centre). She discovers she has an Uncle Calvin and goes to live with him. After observing her uncle's strange behaviour Laura then learns that he is an undercover detective. She helps him solve his mysteries.

Our house was Calvin's home. The film company used both inside and outside the house. Our front room and kitchen his interior and Rebecca's bedroom was Laura's bedroom. Most of our furniture was moved into other rooms. Our three rooms were transformed into film sets. We did not have to move out. Although I think if there was a bigger budget we would have been put up in a hotel.

We were also largely free to come and go as we pleased. We met some really interesting people who we welcomed into our home.

The film was a pilot. If it is bought by a distributor the rest of the series will then be shot. The company will then return to Kenn!

I am going to give a talk for the W.I. on the 8th February 2017. The subject is; 'the experience of having the house used by a film company.' I will then go into more detail. Combining my insights into the fascinating world of the film industry while at the same time maintaining domestic life. Caroline.



When he retired be became a driver for St. Peters Hospice—driving patients to and from daily visits, the patients enjoyed his gentle conversations.

SOMME THOUGHTS

On the 14th November we visited College Green, Bristol, to view the shroud display. The impact of the 19,240 six inch shrouded figures (representing the fallen on the first day of the battle of The Somme laid out in ordered rows, was profound.



More than 120,000 of the British Army went 'over the top' that 1st

of July morning, now a hundred years ago.

(Their attack was preceded by a week-long artillery bombardment in which one and a half million shells were fired). On a front some 15 miles long.

The Battle of The Somme was to last 141 days from 1st July to the 18th November 1916, by then the allies had lost 600,00 men and the Germans almost as many and the British losses of that 600,00 were at least 124,000.

A shocking fact we learnt regarding this figure, was that of the 124,000 fallen more than 70,000 were never recovered for burial, they remain to this day on the battlefield.

Two History Notes;

1. The bombardment had been largely ineffective for two reasons, firstly the quality of the shells was very inferior and many proved to be duds, not exploding.

The other point was that the Somme was a chalk shelf into which it was very easy for the Germans to burrow down, as much as thirty feet.

This provided good protection for their forces who, once the bombardment had ceased, came to the surface with machine guns and were in a strong position to commit what was in fact carnage on the advancing British.

2. The Battle of The Somme is generally considered to be the epitome of incompetent Generalship and pointless sacrifice.


Colin Albert Webb

PARISH COUNCIL MEETING – 1 November 2016

Public Participation:

 Police Support Officer gave an update on new arrangements for attending 2617 meeting.
 North Somerset District Councillors provided information on; the progress of St Modern Councillors and Councillors provided information on; plans, former Mill Farmhouse plans. Also that the 14 dwellings identified in the North Somerset Plan for Kenn Street had been deleted from the Plan.

Resident advised on an article in the North Somerset Life about action on derelict properties

Agenda Items:

- Broadband update on the letter sent to Connecting Devon & Somerset. Extract of reply the exchange and some cabinets being connected to fibre by the private market it has emerged that many properties in Kenn could not take advantage of the new infrastructure when original intentions was for them to benefit. Now these properties will no longer be served by the private sector they become eligible for consideration in our phase two programme.
- Verges had been cut but there were still some issues. These would be investigated.
- Signs various signs needed to avoid visitors mistakenly going to the wrong locations.
- Parish Recycling Events both had been successful. The first one had handed out information and lots of free items and the Active Gym's health checks had been popular. The second one had resulted in a reasonable sized collection of items - more than the Clevedon eventl
- Oakland Automotive concern had been expressed during the recent site development that highway land had been removed and the pavement is too narrow. Information received; no highway land was taken and the site has been finished as per the plans. Also there is no links to the pavement (only grass verges either side) so there is no need for this to be wider.
- Airport Parking North Somerset Article 4 Direction information received.
- Audit of the Council's Accounts for 2015/16 The Auditor had approved these subject to two items of procedure. It was requested these are carried out for future years.
- •Grant Request from the Home-Start organisation, however members could not recall them providing any assistance in the village so did not provide a grant.
- Calendar of Meetings for 2017 was considered and agreed (see above).
- •Kenn Parish Council Policy Documents a review was carried out on procedure for; agenda item requests, Planning Committee remit, and policy on reporting Planning Enforcement (will only report High or Medium issues as defined by North Somerset Council.)
