September Family Service in Kenn

St John's September Family Service was taken by our curate Jo Slade, who was assisted by her son Tom.

The reading, from Ezekiel, was about the Valley of the Bones, as in 'Dem bones, dem bones, dem dry bones'.

The story describes how piles of dry bones, blown by a miraculous wind, gradually reconfigure themselves, taking on sinews and skin and a new life.

Grownups have spent years and untold energy trying to figure out this story. Relax, we weren't there, all we need to know is that something amazing happened.

From this, Jo took the theme of New Life, and preached how new life can come from old situations.

Scattering old leaves which fell into new patterns she asked us to write our prayers on new leaves (which she handily had with her) and hang them on her prayer tree.

Many thanks to Jo for her lovely service, and to Tom for getting up early on a Sunday morning to help us in our worship.

The church had been beautifully decorated with fruit and flowers, and posters coloured by the children of Kenn, we were pleased to see some of them in church. The talk came from Mary Davie Martin, a New Zealander staying with relatives in Kingston Seymour.



She spoke of her life as a missionary in Papua New Guinea. Originally Mary had only a small amount of training in childcare, but over the years, with training and experience, built up clinics all over the region, bringing medical care to thousands of people.

Symbolic gifts of corn, vegetables, flowers, fruit and bread were brought up to the altar, to enact the Old Testament instruction that we should give back the first and best fruits to God, in thanks for our bountiful harvest.

A theme running through our harvest prayers was that we should be mindful of our good fortune to have food available every day of the year, while so many have their food supply jeopardised by war, unfair trading and natural disaster. A big 'Thank you' to everyone who helped in the service:)

Our Harvest Evensong took the form of a Songs of Praise, with hymns chosen by the congregation. Fr. Reginald Gray gave the talk which was greatly appreciated by the large congregation and we were delighted that Fr Reg was able to join us at the Harvest Supper.

E BIRD NEWS

lacktriangle The stormy weather during the first weekend of September brought two Wrynecks to lacktrianglea garden in Yatton (overlooking Kenn Moor). They were present for around 15 minutes feeding on ants. Around the same time Bryan Thompson had a visit from two Wheatears on their way south.

September proved a productive month for birds on Kenn Moor; John Croxton recorded nine Whinchats (a record number?) on the sixth as well as an early Snipe, a Little Egret (they generally disappear from the moors in the summer), a Kingfisher and a couple of Wheatears. The next day two Hobbies were hawking dragonflies over Littlewood, there was an altercation with a Buzzard which provoked strident calling from the adult Hobby. Hartley Staples saw one perhaps two Hobbies over Claverham and Rob Treble reported one over Kenn. There is a family with two young on Kenn Moor (they will be en route to Africa by the time you read this) and they are probably the birds that have been spotted. It's three years since I am aware that the Hobbies have been successful in the Kenn area.

Towards the end of the month two Little Grebes ('Dabchicks') had returned to the River Kenn still in their fancy summer plumage and a few Linnets and Meadow Pipits were other indications of Autumn. Small numbers of Mistle Thrushes were on 'Woodspring Wings' airfield with Stock Doves also noted.

Jackie Huxtable has found the remains of a Sparrowhawk, which I think was a recently fledged juvenile that had either starved or met with an accident. Breeding Swallows are still active (23rd) and on some days large numbers have been feeding up over Kenn Moor, but most House Martins seem to have left. October should witness the arrival of Finches and wintering Skylarks with perhaps Fieldfares and Redwings at the end of the month...



Those of us who arrived on the day spent a most enjoyable summer's evening weeding, strimming, brushing and generally tidying and were then



Somme Remembrance

On Friday, 9th. September, Iris and Mike visited Meriden to remember the Centenary of the death of Mike's Uncle Louis on the Somme.

After a short service in St. Lawrence church, Mike lit a candle which he carried, in a lantern, to the village War Memorial, about a mile away.



There, the vicar led an act of contrition, which has been used in Coventry Cathedral since the November, 1940, blitz, followed by the Lord's Prayer and a blessing.

After that moving ceremony the small party enjoyed picnic tea and biscuits before departing. This ceremony has been re-enacted for all the dead recorded on the memorial, on the date of their death.

Maxine Streat (nee Padfield), passed away peacefully on Sunday 14th August 2016. Rest in Peace.

The Funeral Service was held at South Bristol Crematorium on Friday on 9th September with family flowers only.

David Hope Glasson 12th June 1934—13th August 2016

David was born in London, over the years he with his family moved many times. In 1950 David joined the 'Locospotters' special from Paddington to Clevedon (via Bristol) then walked to Clevedon Pier.

In 1958 he met Brenda and they were married in 1959. In 1965 Clare was born, followed by Christine in 1966. In 1970 David started working at B.A.C. Filton on Concorde design and in1971 the family moved into Kenn Post Office.

Whilst they were living here, the M5 Motorway was built and the workers used to come into the shop to buy food and drinks. Brenda ran the Post Office and mum, Eva, ran the shop. Dad, Henry, used to deliver the papers in his Austin 1100 while David worked at B.A.C.



The Glasson family left Kenn Post Office and moved to Clevedon in 1976 and in 1979 purchased Riverside Cottage at Kenn Pier by Auction at The Walton Park Hotel. On 31st December they moved in. In 1992 Brenda's mum Phyllis joined them at Riverside Cottage.

Sadly Brenda had cancer and passed away on 5th February 2001. David was blessed with two granddaughters, Georgina and Plum. Clare, in her tribute, noted that the ambulance rushing Christine to hospital after Plum's birth, was delayed by Cyril Willcox bringing in his cows for milking.....

David was a quiet man, who had many hobbies, plane-spotting, bird watching and he regularly contributed bird news for Kenn News and Views.

Later he moved into Hope Cottage, All Saints Lane, Clevedon.

His funeral service on 31st August at St. John the Evangelist, Kenn was conducted by Revd. Warren Williams, with Robert Rideout playing the organ. The flag was flown at half-mast.

The flowers in church, and floral tributes on the family grave were prepared by his daughter Clare and the gathering afterwards was held at The Drum and Monkey.

We send our deepest sympathy to Clare and Mark and to Christine and Bill, Georgie and Plum who were supported at the funeral by friends and family.



Do you have an ' i phone '??

If so you should have an app called



In the bottom right hand corner of the screen is



press this

You now can enter relevant data that can be accessed by the Emergency Services without using your confidential pass code. Without unlocking the phone.

Information you can add — Includes:

Medical history
Medications
Personal details
Next of kin with contact number
A picture of you to confirm the phone is yours
Allergies and other useful data for the emergency services

At the top of the page where you enter the data is a slider alongside the Message "Show when locked" this needs to be Green

To view the data get to the page where you enter your pass code - in the bottom left corner is the word Emergency press it - then on the next page is * medical data this opens the data for the emergency services.

The Emergency Services can use this when available.

If you would like help programming your phone either ask a youngster or John Ball.

There are other apps, but I believe this is the only one which can be opened without the password.
