Dear friends,

July has been a month of weddings which is wonderful. They take quite a bit of planning and preparation so it is good to have them spread out if possible but a bit like buses they do seem to come along all at once!

The two in Kingston and one in Kenn that I have been part of have been a real joy and it is a privilege to be part of such a milestone in people's lives. These days I am just grateful that some folk still want to get married in church but in some respects, it means these services have evolved into even more joyous occasions because you know that couples have had choices and they are there because they really want to be rather than because it is the only place they can be married. It was a wonderful occasion here in Kenn on July 15<sup>th</sup> for Abbey and Dave and a privilege to be involved.



I'm also feeling very grateful for a study group that I have led of over the last couple of months with people from Kenn and Kingston Seymour. We have gone back to basics to explore our faith and journeyed with a few relatively new to our churches or exploring Christianity in more depth for the first time and, as someone reflected in the group, it has been 'food for the soul.' Many people express views about Christianity, sometimes with very little understanding of what it is about, so when someone actually asks to know more and is willing to give some time to that I get really excited. As a teacher of 20+ years before going into ministry I get even more excited when they then say they want to know even more!!! So, not wanting to lose the momentum, we are beginning a course in September which is going to look at the big picture of the Bible storyline from Genesis to Revelation and on the way pick up tools and skills to help us read it for ourselves.

How do you begin with a book that was written by more than forty authors over a period of 1,500 years by various authors including kings, peasants, philosophers, fishermen, poets, statesmen and scholars? This is a lifetime's work but we are going to have stab at a quick 6-week overview to discuss how important it is to realise that before we can start to understand whether it has any relevance for us today it is important to look at what it meant in its original context. It covers hundreds of controversial subjects yet it has an underlying harmony and continuity from Genesis to Revelation. Be in touch if you want to know more. Always happy to talk!

So, if ever I feel a bit overwhelmed by the challenges of being part of a parish in vacancy or wondering about how we are going to manage with one less full-time priest I have a 'Pollyanna moment' and count my blessings! Lots to give thanks for and lots to look forward to.

With many others, most recently, I give heartfelt thanks for Mike Callow, who was a devout and faithful member of St John the Evangelist, a gentleman, who also left his mark on the communities and people he loved and served. As well as being a weekly attender at church he also joined the group that met twice a week on Zoom for morning prayer and I will miss him very much, sat there finishing off his breakfast in the catch-up chats we had before we started at 8.15am!

May he rest in peace and rise eternal.

Memories and special occasions and opportunities continue to arise, other chances to be part of the bigger picture and I'm sure you'll find a few in this magazine! Supporting the Foodbank, meeting with others for coffee or lunch and this month our five churches are coming together for a Summer Party at Yew Tree Farm on August 16<sup>th</sup>. Looking ahead, again at Yew Tree Farm in Kingston Seymour, our community is invited to attend the Ploughing match there on September 3<sup>rd</sup>. There will be a service at Kenn at 8.30am that day but we will not have a service at All Saints at 11am as many of us will be involved in the event at the farm. BUT we have the exciting opportunity to be part of the blessing of the plough at about 3pm that afternoon. I'll be on site encouraging children and others to write prayers throughout the day for us to tie to the plough as part of that service and I do hope you can join us.

Finally, I do hope that for those who have planned their summer breaks in August that the sun will shine!

## Bird News

Jo Manning reports hearing a Little Owl in Kenn Street and an exciting visitor in the form of an Elephant Hawk Moth in her garden. Another, or the same, Hawk Moth was spotted by another resident in Duck Lane.

July is a quiet time for birds as many have finished nesting and are quietly hiding away moulting.

Skylarks were singing up to mid month and Blackcaps started up again.

Swallows arrived late but seem to have prospered as there are good numbers of young and plenty of ongoing nests.

Young Blue Tits, Great Tits and Long tailed Tits are now independent and visiting our feeder regularly.

It will be interesting to see if we get any large Swallow roosts in August.

Swift numbers seem to be low in Yatton but better elsewhere with some sizeable flocks reported.

Barn Owls have experienced a below average year with small broods, thought to be due to low vole numbers caused by unfavourable weather in late winter and dry periods in Spring. But Kestrels which have a similar diet have produced young in reasonable numbers.

Red Kites were noted over Kenn Moor Road and the Co-op in Yatton.

Not many unusual species were seen but a Hobby was chasing Swallows near Congresbury and a Whinchat was seen on Congresbury Moor.

I estimated the Jackdaw pre-roost flock in Yatton to be about 400 strong towards the month end.

**Thelma C. Blake - 29.11.1932 — 18.07.2123**

Aunty Thelma aged 90 sadly passed away on Tuesday, the 18th of July after a long struggle with Parkinson's and Alzheimer's.

She was born, 29 November 1932, in the City of Bristol to a Military Family, one of six children. She trained as a seamstress from the age of 14, a skill she passed on to many over the years, her creations showing her flair and eye for the detail.

Thelma moved to Wharf Farm as a land girl in 1950 aged 18 and it has been her home ever since.



She married "Blakey" Gilbert Blake in 1964, a love and devotion she held throughout her life, dying on his birthday.

Aunty Thelma has been a long standing member of the Shorthorn Cattle Society, breeding and showing both Dairy and Beef animals. Her achievements among many include 6 gold cup winners for milk yield in the Western Region (Six Counties), she received the Farm Service Award, (to win this award a contestant must have worked 10years on not more than 4 farms and been in charge of entries at the Dairy Show not less than 5 years in succession), showing since the 50's, concentrating on the Beef Shorthorn after the death of her husband in 1988.

Thelma and the team had continued success with beef Cattle I particularly remember 'Stonmour Thunder Cloud', winning over 100 championships, and world-wide sales of Semen in excess of 10,000 straws.

This amazing trail blazing lady was Aunty to Family, extended family and respectfully by all in the show ring.

Aunty Thelma you are loved and will be greatly missed. RIP.

## Our Monthly Missive from The Limes

## KENN PARISH COUNCIL

Dear Parish Council Chair and Clerk

At the Airport Consultative Committee on Wednesday 12 July 2023, the noise complaint telephone line was discussed due to issues being experienced. Recently the recorded message system has been misused and was being used to record messages unrelated to noise complaints. This resulted in residents wishing to record noise complaints being unable to do so, due to the line being 'blocked' and full of messages. This caused obvious frustration to residents wishing to make legitimate noise complaints and being unable to do so.

From the data over the last few years, the majority of residents use the online portal for reporting noise complaints, with a small minority of residents using the telephone recording line. After discussions, and to continue being inclusive and providing residents an alternative way of reporting noise complaints for those not wishing to use the internet.

From **Monday 7<sup>th</sup> August 2023** the telephone line will be removed, and a postal process will be introduced.

The two ways of logging noise complaints will be:

- Click on the link via the website and record the complaint using the online noise complaint portal (this remains the same).

Or write to: *Bristol Airport, Noise Complaints, Lulsgate House, Bristol, BS48 3DW*. Residents will need to provide the same information including name, address, date, time of incident, and relevant information as per the previous noise reporting telephone line.

\*The website will be updated with the above information.

All complaints are responded to and recorded, with statistics being publicly reported to the [Airport Consultative Committee](#) and within Bristol Airport's, Annual Monitoring Report.
