Caroline Holden has arranged a most interesting and varied programme for us and we all look forward to it very much indeed.





K BIRD NEWS

November is often a quiet month for birds with winter visitors slow to arrive. There were a few Redwings and Fieldfares around early in the month but later a few cold days with easterly winds brought a mixed flock of 200 to the Strawberry Line, near Congresbury, along with 80 Goldfinches.

The Peregrines have returned to their pylon perches both near Yatton and on Kenn Moor. Two birds on separate pylons on Kenn Moor one afternoon were perhaps waiting for birds flying to roost in the hope of a kill.

There were precious few birds on the moor other than a line of eight

Cormorants perched on the old footbridge over the Blackditch.

Another winter returner is a Kingfisher by Wemberham Lane; they like the winter pen water levels which makes fishing easier.

A Grey Wagtail was feeding nearby.



During nestbox maintenance in Littlewood we put up a Woodcock and a check of the nestboxes at Yatton school produced a Sparrow nest. It is quite unusual to find Sparrows using conventional boxes.

Finally, Hartley Staples reports an unusual visitor in the form of a Ring Necked Parakeet. This is fine as long as there is only one.. They have become quite a pest in London.

Broadband in Kenn

The broadband committee have attempted to expedite the installation of faster broadband in Kenn, with little success, so far. Some people who have 4g mobile broadband (as a stopgap), would welcome a fixed line service. The value of houses can appreciate by approx. £2,000 when fast broadband is available. House sales can and often do fail when fast broadband is not available.

BT Openreach – April 2018 indicative commercials (funding shortfall) of £374,915.00 will be required from the village for a scheme for Kenn.

Gigaclear, who promised dates, have now deleted the timescales for Kenn from their plans, some areas will not be done till 2022.

BUT we now have a possible light at the end of the tunnel......... **Truespeed** If 30% of the properties sign up, Truespeed will attempt to serve Kenn. This contract is limited to six months – if they do not provide in the agreed time the contract is not binding. So, in the Broadband Committee's opinion, there is nothing to be lost by signing up.

This first 30% will qualify for FREE installation

Their package for an 18month contract will cost £47.50 per month (£855 total) which includes one phone line and 200Mb/s broadband (100 times faster than the average speed of Kennites current service.)

Truespeed will be having a briefing session at Kenn Village Hall on 12th January 2019 from 6.00pm to 8.00pm to which all are welcome.

They did not care that their freezer was already full of food or they could have bought ready meals from Marks and Spencer Food.

We are now a group of 14. Once you have the 'Meals for Mums' you become part of the group. It is easy to fetch up 7 people do to a week of meals. Plus, we always have someone in reserve. Via Email we sign up for which day we want and let the group know what we are going to cook. The meals are varied and delicious. As most people say they would be cooking anyway, so just make two.

This year there were no new babies born in the village. So, 'Meals for Mums' has been dormant.

We will be in action next year. Lise and Robert's second child will be with us by mid-February.

Caring in Bristol....Xmas 2018

Homelessness in Bristol has risen by 128% over the last three years. I often (mis)quote "A prophet is not without honour save in his own country" as to our record of being asked to ring handbells, though I must admit that our new organist of one year, Rachel, at St. Mary's has said "Welcome any time" - it's just a case of getting our elderly group up on a Sunday to start at or before 9am, or at Christmas to be available after 12 midnight!

We started very well (after many practice sessions) with old song tunes, carols, and a bit of Betjeman poetry, at Somerset House on the afternoon of Thursday 8th November, and then a fortnight later we are due at Derham Court, Yatton on the 29th November.

Our bell at St. John's

Recent Kenn News and Views have shown pictures of young people being given an opportunity to chime our church bell but so far we have not had any of them offer to learn to ring it "full circle".

Bell ringing can be a fascinating hobby and commitment especially where there are a larger number of bells in the church, and there are numerous churches in this country alone which have 3 or more bells. In my opinion a ring of 6 (as I was taught on at Durleigh, near Bridgwater) or 8 is the ideal, but rings of 10, 12, or even 14 bells exist in the British Isles and obviously need at least the same number of ringers to ring them.

From call changes, where a conductor tells the band what sequence is next required, to very complicated "scientific" ringing of 'methods' for which the rules adhered to have to be committed to memory, all the ringing has to be done by moving the bells position in the sequence of striking after one another.

This takes a lot of practice to get the sound sent outside over cities, towns, and villages to a precise 'ripple' of notes, rather than a jumbled clashing and crashing as sometimes heard on the Continent.

Ringers have to be aware that they are putting on a free but loud 'concert' for their great audience and so it should be as precise as humanly possible. Often, those young ringers leaving their local area to go to College or University find a number of friends immediately they enter a new church tower, friendships which can last for ever, as I can testify (although I seem to have outlived a large number of mine!)

Here in the Yatton Moor parishes we have 'chiming only' single bells at Cleeve and Claverham, a single 'full-circle light ringable bell at Kenn, a rather heavy and long-draught-of-rope ring of 6 at Kingston Seymour (requiring even more skill than usual perhaps), and a glorious and much proclaimed ring of 8, (the lower tone ones being again quite heavy but very melodious). **All the full-circle rings would welcome new recruits with open arms** – the more ringers we have, the less of a weekly commitment it becomes to obtain a full band each Sunday and for special occasions such as weddings which are, in the main, the only occasions where the ringers charge for their services. All three towers can provide teaching totally free of charge.

Back to Kenn where I can nowadays only feel confident to ring due to health problems. We can teach a recruit on a $5 \frac{1}{2}$ cwt (reasonably light for Somerset bells!) how to 'raise' and 'lower' a bell to and from the full-circle normal ringing position.

Anyone from 10 to 70 years old is welcome to learn or even just have a trial 'go'. Learn how to control the pace and positioning of a bell within a larger number – just you controlling a huge weight safely through 370 degrees without breaking the Ash wood stay in the process!

We do urgently need one or more ringers at Kenn – please do give me, Geoff. Marchant, a phone-call on 01934 834550 if you can help or learn.


(Tuition ringing is generally done with the bell clapper silenced by being restrained in the centre of the bell so that discordant 'clanging' is avoided, not heard, and not publicised!)

Neighbourhood Watch - Received 11th November

Message sent on behalf of the Police & Crime Commissioner: - Residents across the Avon and Somerset Constabulary area are being asked whether they are prepared to pay an additional £1 a month towards policing from April, 2019. Last year the Government unexpectedly gave all Police and Crime Commissioners (PCCs) across the country the flexibility to raise the policing part of the council



tax by £1 a month for the average band D household. Sue Mountstevens is hoping that PCCs will be given that flexibility again this year, she said: "With last year's £1 rise we were able to start an ambitious programme of recruitment and commit to employing up to 300 police officers. We were also able to protect neighbourhood policing, the police officers and Police Community Support Officers (PCSOs) in your local area, all thanks to your support for the rise. "The Chief Constable and I have agreed that next year's focus will concentrate on serious violence. The threat from serious and organised crime has changed rapidly, increasing in both volume and complexity and preying on the most vulnerable in society. "If we are able to increase the policing part of the council tax by £1 a month next year and the Government grant for policing stays the same and there are no additional surprises we are committed to a new focus on burglary and drugs. We must continue to dismantle the recruitment of vulnerable young people into 'county lines' drugs gangs. It's clear that this leads to an increase in knife-crime and serious violence, including stabbings and gang-related disorder and it must be tackled and given the right resources. "I absolutely recognise that any increase in household bills will be felt by residents and it's not easy to keep asking local people to contribute to the issues that we are facing in policing and as a society. It's really important that residents tell me what they would be prepared to pay. These are difficult decisions and I need to be sure that I have heard from as many local people as possible."Sue Mountstevens is asking for people's views in an online survey on her website http://www.avonandsomerset-pcc.gov.uk which closes at midnight on January 14, 2019.
