


Altar Guild Flowers



The first half of the month was extremely mild so few winter birds arrived. Those that did soon moved on probably heading to France or Spain. Z Large flocks of Redwings were in the Wemberham area on two days, on each $\overline{\nu}$ occasion following heavy overnight rain. The first time they were with 150 Fieldfares and a single Mistle Thrush. A pair of Mistle Thrushes were in Yatton churchyard when we were cleaning out the bird boxes there. Speaking of which neither of the boxes in St Johns churchyard had nests this year but one did have a number of ladybirds in it.

The other box was damaged and has been replaced.

I hadn't seen the local Peregrine for a few weeks but he turned up on his Y favourite pylon on a calm bright Saturday morning. The new pylons are being ᅏ erected nearby and perhaps the disturbance prompted him to find a quieter 7 perch. A surprise visitor in Wemberham Lane was a Black Redstart for one morning only, a Kestrel and a pair of Magpies may have persuaded it to move on. Cetti's Warbler, Chiffchaff and a Blackcap were all heard singing. Warmer winters allow the last two species to stay rather than migrate south.

K Skylarks were still passing over during the first half of the month and at least 40 were at the sea wall where a Short Eared Owl was a surprise and welcome k sighting. Despite falling numbers the winter Curlew flock seems to be holding \widetilde{V} its own whilst at least 400 Redshanks were present. Dunlin were few and far between but Shelduck, Wigeon and Teal were present in high numbers... Lapwing numbers built up and a flock of at least 200 was over the motorway by Kingston Seymour on the 24th.

 \bigstar Despite the low numbers of winter Thrushes, Waxwings and Blackbirds as well k as Redwings and Fieldfares are still arriving in north east England so we may k see more locally in a month or two after they have eaten their way south west.

The rain in the second half of the month provided ground suitable conditions 🟹 for a few roosting Snipe.

It was a joyful occasion and everyone was careful with the pointy sticks and candles – thanks go to the team who prepared the Christingles on Saturday.


Towards the end of the service Jo, our musician, played Happy Birthday for herself and others in our monthly

Council Meeting held on the 31 October 2022

Items arising from minutes of the previous meeting were updated or considered:

- Heritage sign at the junction of Kenn St and Kennmoor Rd Cllr Treble was still trying to progress this.
- 20mph Kenn Street a review of the discussion following the meeting with North Somerset Council (NSC) on 4 October. Documents from information gathered on criteria etc. for 20mph zones were considered.
- 20mph Kenn St Working Party it was agreed to form a Working Party to try to progress this project.
- Hedges/verges Cllr Humberstone provided a quote from a local contractor for this annual work.
- Wildflower Planting it was agreed to pay the contractor's invoice for this much appreciated work.

Planning Issues

- Advising interested parties when planning applications are to being considered at meetings Between meetings members had deliberated on how such a procedure could be administered but felt it would be difficult to progress and be sure all aspects were covered.
- 22/P/2418/FUH & 22/P/2419/LBC Moorgates Kenn St Proposed Replacement of existing timber windows and doors with new double glazed timber windows and doors. KPC had no objects to this.
- Changing Condition Status of North Somerset Levels & Moors SSSI's NSC had provide a copy of this new document. It was felt there was a need for this with the increasing impact of storm water. Especially with the large housing developments proposed in Nailsea and no improvements to the disposal of foul water.
- Clevedon and District Community Land Trust details of this had been supplied. It was thought their aims were worthy but they may encounter problems.
- Highway Improvements NSC had provided details for Parish Council to report issues.
- EV Charging Points Information on a company that are building a network of EV charge points across the UK that are robust, reliable and easily retrofitted using existing infrastructure. Helping local authorities install at pace and scale. They are backed by the government's Charging Infrastructure Investment Fund (CIIF), so have access to significant cash reserves to fully-fund EV charging network. deployments UK wide and were looking for area to make installations
- Finance Grant Application Policy & Grant Application Form this was considered and approved.

20 MPH Working Party met on the 2 of November 22 to consider the following:

- 1) Difference between: 20mph Limits (Signing & lining only, used where speed limits are at or below 24mph, self-enforcing) and 20mph Zones (Physical traffic calming (speed humps, cushions, chicanes) used where speeds are over 24mph, up to 30mph)
- A document prepared in relation to Kenn's situation arising from the above DfT document. Some points discussed: Kenn is not part of a strategic network, there is a strong case for a 'Zone' with the inclusion of Kenn St and Duck Lane, which are are residential roads. Agreed a document for the

Parish Council to approve and consider completing their part for forwarding to NSC.
