

KBIRD NEWS

🕻 A Barn Owl was heard by Jo Manning in the Duck Lane area but a Tawny Owl by the motorway bridge was dead. Bryan Thompson checked it but found it to be unringed so we don't know its history, very likely to be a local bird.

After a dearth of Blackbirds, lots, mostly males, appeared mid-month many no doubt winter visitors from the continent.

Similarly Song Thrushes started singing with several at Cadbury Hill and a particularly strident male by Stowell's in Wemberham Lane. Fieldfares and Redwings arrived in fairly small numbers.

There were a few Kingfisher sightings but they seem to be scarce generally.

Snipe and Jack Snipe were roosting at the YACWAG Kenn Moor Reserve and a Woodcock, a much rarer cousin, flew over the road by the Cadbury Garden Centre at dusk.

Nearby 20 Siskins were at Cadbury Hill. Buzzards appeared on bright days Labut three Peregrine Falcons together at the Kingston Seymour sea wall was kexceptional. They almost certainly comprised a local pair with one of their voung from last year and a pile of feathers indicated that they were sharing a 🗶 kill.

I was more pleased to see one perched on one of the new T pylons. This is the first local record of this that I am aware of, it seems to have taken them two years to accept these different perching posts.

Two Great White Egrets were seen from a train at Backwell but a field with **L** cattle at Kingston Seymour held 16 Egrets, eight each of Little and Cattle Egrets.

Our Monthly Missive from the Limes

"Christmas is coming and the goose is getting fat". So says the old song. (For younger readers who haven't come across it, the full words are: "Christmas is coming and the goose is getting fat, please put a penny in the old man's hat. If you haven't got a penny a ha'penny will do, if you haven't got a ha'penny God bless you").

Also not only is Christmas coming but so is a reminder from our editor that its time to get writing again. This month I thought I'd pre-empt her but before I do that let me thank the two people who told me this month they read my articles. One of them even said she enjoyed them.

Last month I recycled a couple of past KN&V articles at a Poetry and Prose evening. It was a little embarrassing as for the next couple of days people said "I saw you at the Poetry and Prose evening," and you haven't a clue who they are.

Anyway this month I thought I'd do the reverse and the following is the script of a talk I gave at my church Luncheon Club, so do bear that context in mind. Most of the diners were very elderly but with a little mental adroitness you can still apply it to your situation whatever your age.

Here goes: "When I mentioned to my kids that I had been asked to give an epilogue they said "What is an epilogue?" I can't say I was impressed. For anyone in their mid-forties not to know what an epilogue is seemed a poor reflection on their education.

"When I explained what it was they said "Oh it's a God Slot", which is probably a more accurate descriptive term, but as I pointed out to them 'epilogue' sounds more cultured and I prefer that term.

"On the basis that most of you don't have a clue who I am let me introduce myself. I am Stephen Brain and a member of this church. I used to be a beekeeper and people seem to typecast me with that hat but for a variety of reasons I have downsized and I don't have bees anymore myself, although I still have stocks of honey. I also still teach on our beekeeping courses, take candidates for exams and fellow beekeepers still ask my opinion from time to time so I am still sort of active.

"I must also say that I have spoken here before but it was quite a few years ago. I gave a talk on beekeeping and after the meal and before I spoke I put on a bee suit in order to add a bit of realism and authenticity. After the talk I took it off and returned to my table and someone said, "You've just missed a talk on beekeeping!"

"This time I'm not talking about beekeeping and certainly not dressing up.

"So why have I down sized my beekeeping? Quite simply life has moved on. I have done it for over 30 years.

"What I have found it that as you go through life your interests and habits do change. What you do in your twenties or thirties is not necessarily the same as forties or fifties or later and it probably reflects the fact that we are not the same people as we were a few decades earlier. Of course other factors come into play such as health or jobs or family. What it does mean is that life is subject to constant change. Some of us like that and see it as a challenge they can rise to and others hate it and don't want anything to change.

"I have friends who, every few years took up a new interest. It wasn't as if they dropped the previous interest although occasionally that did happen but each new interest was pursued in depth and so they became highly proficient in a number of different areas.

"In my case, a few years ago some friends persuaded me to take up a musical instrument again. I had last played it at school, which you will appreciate was a long time ago. When I went to university I dropped it because I was nowhere near the standard that those doing music courses were and then life and family took over. It was only in my mid-sixties when life had changed that I went back to it.

"With discipline and practice I have done quite well but I do envy those who have decades of expertise under their belt and can play pieces I can currently only dream of and I think if only I had found a way to carry on when I was younger or found a way to go back to it earlier. It is only too easy to regret the past and missed opportunities and at times I feel frustrated at the opportunities my grandchildren have and which they don't appreciate.

"Of course there are reasons why things didn't happen in the past and one juggles those good reasons with a realisation of how much better I would be now if I had been playing seriously for longer.

"You have probably heard the expression "You are not too old". We often say it to someone when discussing some change of direction in life. I thought the expression had been around for years, and that may be true, but there is a slighter more detailed expression which I looked it up recently. It was in a 1992 book "Live Your Dreams" by Les Brown. The quote he had was:

"You are never too old to set another goal or to dream a new dream".

"Les Brown then recounted this conversation: "A gentleman nearing retirement age once approached me after I'd given a speech. He said, "You know, that was real great motivation for the young guys, but I've done all my work. There is nothing else for me to do." "I replied, "Oh yes, you have a lot to give.

The fact that you are still here on this planet means that your business is "NOT DONE."" "That is a powerful quote. In fact it could almost have come from the Bible but it didn't. I think it should be heeded by everyone and especially us more mature people. We can so easily get stuck in a rut. Even worse, as we get older (and I bet even now) we can think we have nothing new to do or anything to offer.

"It doesn't have to be true. My music teacher has one pupil learning saxophone in his 80's, which is older than some of you.

"Obviously I'm not suggesting you take up karate or motorcycling but why not look at something new you can do? I can tell you it will also keep your children on their toes if you do something different. I shocked my grandchildren the other day when I sent them pictures of a record evening I'd held.

"I used to run a Seniors group in this church and we did a little series seeing what the Bible said about old age. Nowhere does it give a cop out and say now you are old you don't have to do anything or have anything to contribute! In fact it expects us to bear fruit in old age.

"Whether you are a Christian or not, God has a plan for your life and assuming your heart is beating and blood is flowing round your body — which it should be after a good lunch, then he hasn't finished with you on this earth. If you are not in that plan you are never too old to become part of it.

"Finally, if you want to learn Beekeeping we are running an Introduction to Beekeeping course over the winter, although it books up very quickly. If you want to learn an instrument I can put you in touch with a music teacher, I know a karate teacher, but if you want to take up motorcycling you are on your own".

Parish Council Meeting on 6 November 2023

Discussions took place during the meeting and actions taken on the following items:

- St Modwen Development Site North Somerset Council (NSC) Councillor advised there was not much progress so far on the recent planning application.
- Kenn Road up toward the Motorway Bridge concern about the litter and overgrowth.
 Efforts were being made to get this cleared.
- Christmas Lights and Tree agreement for the purchase of this and to cover the cost of the electric for the festive period.
- Heritage Sign on Kennmoor Road unexpected problems encountered relating to the fixings.
- 20 MPH Kenn Road NSC are developing a new system for recording, prioritising, testing, consulting, designing, delivering and monitoring all transport improvement requests received. Kenn's request was added to their Schemes at Stage 1: Long List in November 2022. [It is one of over 900 scheme requests (internal officers, ward members, town/parish councils) recorded in this new process. NSC advised the Kenn 20mph scheme has passed through Stage 1: listing and passed to Stage 2: the Policy Checker. Now in Stage 3: Officer Assessment awaiting evaluation and prioritisation. It is hoped to undertake this within eight weeks. But the volume means a high proportion are unlikely to be get funding for ultimately delivery/progressing.
- Hinkley Connection Project Representatives will be attending the January 24 meeting.
- Planning Application three had recently be received and were considered:
 - Yeo Bank Business Park, Kenn Rd; Phase 2, six offices in two blocks.
 - Kennmoor Rd; proposed retention of vehicular access for agricultural vehicles use.
 - Duck Lane; single story front porch.
- Also considered NSC's consultation on Biodiversity Planning Document, Highway improvements info, Bristol Airport's new public transport interchange & multistorey car park.
- Fly tipping All householders and businesses have a duty of care to ensure waste that they
 produce is disposed of correctly. Poster giving details to be displayed on the VH noticeboard.
