Dear friends,

The door to 2023 is open, Spring is on the way, challenges ahead but off we go!

BIRD NEWS

A Great White Egret was seen by Jackie Huxtable and then by Rosie Treble at the beginning of the month. Then I saw what was probably the same bird on the Blackditch by the hump back bridge on Kenn Moor Road. Seven Teal were on the Blackditch during the cold spell along with two Little Grebes and another on the River Kenn. Seven Snipe were roosting on Kenn Moor while the early month count on the YACWAG Kenn Moor Reserve produced 28.

Good numbers of Goosanders were present at Clevedon Pill and the Blind Yeo with an over wintering Common Sandpiper at the latter site. But star bird was a juvenile Spoonbill seen flying over Clevedon Craft Centre and a few days later at Kingston Seymour.

Barn Owls were noted at Kingston Bridge, Claverham Drove, Kingston Seymour and Congresbury Moor.



They seem to have survived the December cold spell, the January rains and subsequent cold fairly well.

Little Owls were calling and on territory at Congresbury.

There were several sightings of Kingfisher in the Wemberham area of Yatton, along with a Green Sandpiper, a Jack Snipe and a party of 20 Lapwings. Impressive but perhaps less welcome was a gathering of 1,100 Herring Gulls with 500 Black Headed Gulls.

Some winter thrushes appeared in gardens but generally numbers were low there and on the Moors. Small birds were very scarce, presumably most decamped to gardens in December and have stayed put. That said three Marsh Tits on Cadbury Hill provided a welcome sight as did two winter Chiffchaffs on a manure heap on the outskirts of Yatton.

When we moved into the village 35 years ago, the Kenn community not only had our church and village hall, but also a thriving pub and post office.

If you walked into the post office you could not have had a warmer reception, because it was run by Barbara, with Jean Fenwick often helping out. Besides post office service, Barbara kept a range of useful groceries for those who found it difficult to get into Clevedon.

Best of all, if you wanted to catch up on village news, the post office was a pretty good place to go!



Barbara gave our son Dan his first job, delivering the papers before school. She would be there every morning with the papers sorted; we knew he was in safe hands. Dan and Amy also have fond memories of calling into the post office after school, to buy sweets and Chelsea buns.

Barbara lived at the post office with her family for 17 years, but sadly her husband Jim passed away during that period, in 1990.

Barbara came from a large family herself, and she and Jim had 3 sons; Nigel, Mark, and Kevin. For some years before leaving to join the army, Mark helped Barbara run the post office. A second great sadness in her life was that Mark passed away as a relatively young family man, unexpectedly, in 2010.

Something to be greatly admired in Barbara, however, was her positive spirit and zest to make the most of life. She was a naturally warm, friendly and bubbly person. When you met her she would always have a smile on her face.

She was often seen out and about enjoying life with her friends Janice, Jean and Julie. Every Wednesday night she joined Margaret, John, Jean, Jenny and Richard for Mike's quiz night at The Drum.

When Barbara left the post office she went to live in Clevedon, but remained part of the Kenn community and always returned for village events.

In later life she suffered but overcame several serious illnesses.

For the last six years she has been wonderfully cared for by Lorraine Waterman in her home, as well as by her loving family.

It is lovely to hear from Heather that just before she passed away, Barbara had spent a happy Christmas surrounded by her family. We bet she would have been smiling!

Our Monthly Missive from The Limes

Back in March 2021 I wrote an epic article about local democracy and what Parish Councils and Councillors do, which I thought was very good. In fact so did our editor because she said nice things about it.

Anyway I want to revisit the subject again but for space reasons I'm not going to reproduce it all here. I do recommend however you dig out your old copies of KN&V and take another look at it.

"What!" You exclaim, "I don't keep back copies!"

I'm not judgemental so no comment, but I'm sure a request to the editor accompanied by a suitable consideration would result in production of said article. A request to me accompanied by an even larger consideration would produce the same result assuming I could find it. You may be surprised to know I do not automatically keep copies of my articles so in a few years when my articles are an eagerly sought after commodity you may find your old copies of KN&V worth lots.

Alternatively you could try the Yatton Moor team ministry site. There are some back copies of KN&V but the site is a bit buggy so I'm not sure what really is there. I did also notice they say own the copyright on all material on their site, which is a bit naughty as they don't.

So why talk about local democracy? Firstly because this year, coming up, we have a once in a four year event – LOCAL ELECTIONS !!!

Secondly it's about time I had a bit of a moan and this is an opportunity to say a few (rude) words about North Somerset Council.

Assuming enough candidates stand, there will be two local elections in Kenn in early May 2023. One for Kenn Parish Council councillors (KPC) and one for North Somerset Council (NSC). NSC is the next governing level above us and has the greater resourcing (in theory) and makes the big (and often unpopular) decisions. Kenn Parish Councillors you already know and love, but you may be unaware that NSC provide a couple of their District Councillors for us. They usually attend our Parish Council meetings and we tend to use them as our "way into" NSC to find out what is going on and to get things done. KPC is non-political but NSC is organised along political party lines so occasionally it can be interesting, but on the whole the various district councillors we have had have worked fairly well together for us even if they represent different parties.

I have no idea if my fellow Parish Councillors will stand for re-election. Unless anyone else stands in addition, there will be no Parish Council election and all candidates will be automatically elected. Personally, and possibly perversely, I would love to see several others standing, partly because it would be good to get fresh blood into KPC with new people with ideas and energy, and secondly because in a vote we would find out what the village really think of us. In case anyone wants to ask, I haven't decided if I will carry on but I will say we have currently have a good team on the Parish Council.

Now for North Somerset Council.

I do find it hard to be positive about them. Over the years, functions they have been meant to provide to our communities have been cut back, with Parish and Town Councils now having to pick them up and of course pay for them. A simple example is that KPC now pays for extra cutting of hedges and verges because if we relied on NSC it just would not happen.

In return we get nothing back. Perhaps that is a bit strong. We seldom get anything back. If we mention the state of our roads or drainage issues to them you might get a response.

If you are lucky someone might even take a look and probably decide that it is not an issue and they can't see a problem. If you are really lucky you might get on a list for 2026 or something. NSC Highways have historically been the least helpful and just don't get some members of the village started on what they think of the Highways department. In addition, general comments from NSC that we should walk, cycle or get the bus show how out of touch they are with the realities of life.

From personal feedback from Clevedon Town Council members I can't say their experience of NSC is great either. Liam Fox also seems to agree. NSC have come across as dictatorial and lacking in both compassion or understanding. The Clevedon sea front and Hill Road disaster is an example where the Town Council was totally overruled by NSC. I have been told that at least one of the conversations was quite threatening. The sea front issue is so bad that the debacle reached the national press. Overall I can't think of any major decision by NSC I would feel comfortable with but you may take a different view and I'll try to limit my comments.

What I can say however is that at the last Council elections four years ago, the parties then running NSC received quite a pasting by the electorate and there was a major turnover of councillors with a number of Independents coming in. I have no idea what the views of the electorate will be in May but if I was an NSC councillor and responsible for some of the decisions in the last four years I would decide it was time for a career change.

OK. Moan over. I have 400 words left. In the rest of this column I'm coming back to election timings. Firstly please consider if you would like to stand as either a NSC councillor or a KPC councillor. In both cases you have to be prepared to work with colleagues who you might not normally choose to do so. If you can't cope with that, don't even consider standing. Also don't stand if it is only to get your pet project through. Bear in mind a North Somerset District Councillor role will consume a fair bit of time and I do respect the commitment of those who take it on.

The NSC website has information about the electoral process as does the Electoral Commission website. From them you can also get information about duties and responsibilities of Councillors. I will make the point that Councillors are NOT volunteers. As I was told firmly once on a course, we are "Elected Holders of public office". Also you don't get paid! I think there are expenses payable by NSC but on KPC we don't pay.

If you decide to stand you will need to get your application Hand Delivered to W-S-M Town Hall by the beginning of April.

This KN&V comes out beginning of February so you have nearly two months to look into the topic and decide. (This is assuming you have eagerly pounced on KN&V as soon as it comes through the letterbox and immediately read it cover to cover, starting at the front).

Also don't forget my KN&V article in March 2021 which tells you what we do. If you have any questions about the whole thing feel free to discuss it with any of the Parish Councillors whose contact details are on the back page of KN&V. They will be helpful and probably less caustic over some of the issues than I have been.

Finally, whichever Council you end up on, you will be performing a valuable service to the community despite my acerbic comments above. Once on, just understand the issues, be competent and try and make the right decisions!

At last, North Somerset Council are considering the Concept of 20 mph in Kenn Street and reducing its attractiveness as a through route. The Parish Council have identified through traffic as a key issue. This is Concept only at present.

The Kenn scheme is included in the list of 20mph proposals and Cris Fletcher (North Somerset) tells me (Tony Parker) that the prioritisation will take place depending on the <u>responses received to the Consultation</u>. Obviously, the PC will respond but it would be worthwhile publicising the need so as many local individuals do so as well.

There are other topics in the Action Plans, which are of interest to Kenn - notably improving walking and cycling links into Clevedon, which should also attract comments.
