BIRD NEWS

The cold weather mid month brought lots of Lapwings, escaping the even colder weather further north. 350 flew south west over Yatton on the 15th.

In the days before TV weather forecasts, country folk seeing such movement would know that cold weather was on the way. 200 Lapwings were on a big stubble field at Wemberham along with 800 gulls a few days later. The area also produced four Green Sandpipers, a Redshank and a few Snipe the latter two species being traditional cold weather birds there.

At the beginning of the month the YACWAG field on Kenn Moor held 31 Snipe and a Jack Snipe. Numbers were down from last month no doubt due to the high water level.

Littlewood by Claverham Drove had a Green Woodpecker, a Treecreeper and 25 Siskins on the 6th and a Kingfisher was on the Black Ditch.

A remarkable 40 Siskins were feeding on Alder seeds along the Strawberry Line (24th) - the next day I could only find half a dozen in a feeding flock, with Great, Blue and Long Tailed Tits, a Chiffchaff and a couple of noisy Goldfinches. Nearby Barn Owls were recorded on Congresbury Moor.

A bright morning persuaded a couple of Cetti's Warblers to sing, while Water Rails called and a Bullfinch showed well. Song Thrushes were also singing there as were Greenfinches, hopefully now recovering their numbers.

From The Limes

Thinking about what to say this month and coming up with not very much I started pondering on the title our esteemed editor gives to my rambles. Let me say I did not coin the phrase "Monthly Missive from the Limes". It implies you will get something every month – (no pressure there) – and that what you get is worth reading – which may be a matter of opinion.

Anyway I thought here goes, this month you will get something from The Limes itself and you can share in my ups and downs, and if you feel like giving me sympathy for the downs it will be gratefully received.

It has been a very wet winter and now at the time of writing we are (hopefully) finishing a cold spell. I was outdoors this morning and it was bitter, and typing this article this afternoon my fingertips still haven't recovered. I'm also trying to keep warm and for reasons I'll come onto later I've been running a fan heater in the kitchen which is where I tend to spend my time. It's nothing to do with being the kitchen I hasten to add, but it's usually the warmest room in the house as well as the largest and has a table I can work on. The fan heater is extremely old but has survived all our other heaters and in fact came with Heather when we got married. The fact that this year would have been our 50th wedding anniversary gives you some clues about its age.

A few days ago I noticed an "aroma" in the kitchen. It smelt like gone off fish and the fan heater was extremely effective at blasting the smell around the house. At first I thought it was from when I cooked some fish fingers but although my cooking is basic it's not that bad and cooking smells quickly go.

Anyway I had a sniff around the kitchen and just could not find a source for the smell. After a week I was getting desperate and about to give the dog a good sniff when I realised the smell was worse when the fan heater was on. Sniffing that gave no results other than a hot nose - and then for some reason I unplugged it and saw the socket was charred and the insulation on the plug all burned.

It was clearly the source of the smell. Only a small part but a large effect. There's a moral there somewhere. The other moral is that I knew the socket was a bit iffy and I should have sorted it years ago. Anyway I replaced the socket and the plug and the heater is quite happily whirring away as I type.

Mentioning weather brings me thoughts of the garden. It has been difficult to do much outdoors and the excuse that it is too cold is very effective. The lawn has not been cut for ages. We had wet weather in November and December and so the cuts I wanted to do before winter never happened and certainly won't happen for a few more weeks.

I suppose I could borrow a sheep or a lamb but it would need too much fencing for the main lawn although it would work in the orchard. Some of you know we raised lambs many years ago. Quite often we see deer in the field behind, happily munching away and I wonder if they could be asked to do some selective eating of my grass but that's probably rather ambitious and it might be best if they stay in the field. You may be interested to know that we have more wild deer than in the Middle Ages and they can be a bit of a pest. Unfortunately because of the many restrictions on shooting it is difficult to control their numbers, which is a pity as they are a good food source.

That reminds me of a story I heard many years ago of a restauranteur in London being fined £400 for catching and serving pigeons to customers. Apparently it was not allowed. When you consider this could be a great solution to the pigeon problem in towns and cities, the ability of government to avoid neat solutions is depressing.

The few fallen apples left in the orchard have survived on the ground, much to my surprise. I think from time to time the dog may munch the odd one or two on the basis that an apple a day keeps the vet away but I've not see them dwindle significantly. The other day with friends and professional help we pruned the apples and pears and now have a large bonfire pile. We'll have a go at lighting it next week and will try not to annoy the neighbours. I don't want to leave it until it is too dry however or it will go like blazes (ha ha) and scorch any trees nearby. Smaller is better in this case.

I have other trees in the orchard – plum, damson etc and we'll prune them later in the year once they are growing. I do try to keep the trees in good order and productive. Its blindingly obvious I can't eat all the produce however and the bulk gets given away across the area. I have good friends who help pick and distribute the crop each year but extra help is always welcome. I'm told that last year 60lb of grapes from my vine and 150-200lbs of plums were given away. I've no idea about apples and pears, they just seemed to go on for ever. We also had some walnuts but they weren't a great crop.

A fruitful crop was rhubarb. Being low-lying here, my rhubarb can rot and a year or so back I was given a couple of rhubarb crowns to replace some that had died. This year they were amazing and so prolific that in the end I had to stop picking earlier than I normally would. They were also crowding out my gooseberry and blackcurrant bushes so I will need to address that this year and might have to move them.

Just before I close you will recall I mentioned my fan heater. Usually the kitchen is kept nice and warm by the Aga. Sometimes I even cook on it. Unfortunately over Christmas I noticed a smell of oil and it turns out I have an oil leak so have turned it off. My usual heating engineer was tied up so I was referred to a local heating company. I have never had a good experience from this particular outfit and I wasn't very hopeful this time but I tried. A rather bored sounding man at the other end of the line took my details and said "We'll come on Wednesday". Needless to say no-one turned up and no message or apology received. I'll get the leak fixed elsewhere but am not impressed. In the meantime I'm probably saving a fortune on heating bills.
