## **Neighbourhood Watch**

#### Received 21st December

Christmas drink/drug drive campaign is underway targeting drink and drug drivers. Police are asking for your help with this. To tell them about a drink or drug driver in progress, call 999. Officers ask you to take care over the security of parcels being delivered. If you are not going to be home to receive them, try to find an alternative where they will be home. If you are buying on-line then many companies use a `click and collect' service with other more local businesses which can be convenient.

On 16 December a garage at a property in Kenn Road, Kenn was broken into and a lawn mower stolen.

Received 7<sup>th</sup> December - Vehicle Crime - Over recent weeks there has been a large increase in vehicle crime. Variety of vehicles targeted but in some areas theft from vans has been particularly high. The majority of these are privately owned or contract vans (as opposed to the corporate image vans). Unknown offender (s) have been breaking into the vehicles, mainly by smashing a window and stealing power tools. We have also seen an increase in theft from cars. Items such as satellite navigation accessories and handbags have been targeted because they have been left on display inside the car.

We urge members of the public to follow the below advice :-

- 1. Make sure your vehicle is locked and secured before walking away if you have an alarm on the vehicle make sure it is set .
- 2. Remove ALL valuable tools and powered equipment from vehicles.
- 3. Do not leave any valuables on display no matter how small or insignificant they are.
- 4. Remove the sat nav holder from the windscreen and wipe away the sucker smudge.

Register any property which has a unique serial number (I.e. mobile phones, laptops, power tools, sat navs etc.) As always, please ensure you report all suspicious activity to 101, or 999 if crime is in progress.

#### BIRD NEWS

Following on from last month's note about the Kingfisher at Chestnut Park, North End, Yatton, Shane Pannell who was working there spotted a Black Redstart.

The new houses have bark mulch on their gardens and Black Redstarts like nothing more; that is to say that they are attracted by the insects in the mulch. A few days later Shane saw a Merlin chasing Meadow Pipits over the course of the old Yatton to Clevedon railway. This bird and a Short Eared Owl seen in Wemberham Lane, Yatton (but not by me) may have been driven out of Wales by the heavy snow and freezing temperatures there.

Two Green Sandpipers were on the Congresbury Yeo soon after the water levels had been lowered. This also attracted Little Egrets, I counted nine on part of Nailsea Moor. There have been plenty of Kingfisher sightings across the Moors too. A few Teal, and Little Grebes are present with the occasional Grey Wagtail.

Redwings and Fieldfares seem to be in short supply, but there was a mixed flock of a thousand by Claverham Drove on the 16th but only 150 the next day. These too were probably moving away from snow and cold and they may well head down into southern France or Spain. There are few Hawthorn berries around and these winter thrushes use berries as a back up food supply when the fields are frozen and they are unable to reach invertebrates.

The cold spell brought Blackcaps, Bramblings and Reed Buntings into local gardens so keep an eye on your feeders One or two Siskins have been reported but no Redpolls so far.

Our Bullfinches (three) are appearing daily and a Mistle Thrush has been seen regularly in Duck Lane.'

I haven't seen many Lapwings on the Moors, but there was an impressive flock of 600 at Kingston Seymour sea wall. The YACWAG fields by the Strawberry Line held 24 Snipe and the fields were crisscrossed by vole runs so the Barn Owls should find the living easy barring very bad weather. A Cetti's Warbler was singing and a Water Rail was squealing along the Strawberry Line.

Wednesday 20th December, the flag was at half mast for Cliff E dwards, and when I arrived at St. John's for mid-week communion the bell was tolling for Cliff.

Mike Callow, who rang the bell explains the meaning of the "Nine Tailors"

"Nine tailors (tellers) make a man" goes back to earlier times., when there was little traffic noise.

When villagers knew that someone was ill, or dying, and they heard the bell tolling, they knew who had died by the number of strokes chimed on the bell (usually the tenor, or heaviest bell).

Three strokes for a child, twice times three for a woman and three times three for a man, followed by the number of strokes to indicate the age of the deceased.

So I chimed three times three and ninety-four for Cliff.

We hope that our regulars will be able accommodate the change and that some others for whom Fridays are difficult may like to come along for the first time.


As always there will a warm welcome to all who turn up and share with us in this time of worship, spiritual renewal and support.

#### Good News About Broadband in Kenn

(a report from the Broadband committee)

Two options are beginning to seem viable

Both BT Openreach and Gigaclear are in the planning stages of schemes to service Kenn

The BT Openreach design is Fibre To The Premises FTTP.

This is better than has been provided by BT in Clevedon. We understand

that the design will be completed by the end of December and will then go to the BT costing team.

They hope to have a proposal to present to us during week of 8<sup>th</sup> January.

This proposal will probably involve the community making a contribution for the infrastructure work as BT Openreach have stopped working with `Connecting Devon and Somerset` CDS the Government roll out controllers for this area.

The second proposal which is in the planning stage, is the Gigaclear scheme which is subsidised by CDS, this scheme, we have been told by the engineers surveying the project, will stop on the curtilage of your property. Leaving the responsibility for the last leg between the curtilage and your router down to the householder or their contractor.

Gigaclear is an open network, but very few Independent Service Providers ISPs are involved with them at present. The current retail ISPs are :-

Intelligent Telecom solutions - Orion - Redline Tele com - RM education - Triangle networks - Voneus - Amatis - Broadband bonding - Cotswold wireless - EXA networks

have signed up to provide service over the Gigaclear network

## Thoughts, Reflections and Thanks

I guess we all have mixed reactions when we look back at 2017.

The world would make us think that we gladly dismiss and forget all that happened in the previous year and assume that the next year will be wonderful and exciting, that all our dreams will come to pass and that our New Year resolutions will make us into the perfect person.

It is as if we are leaving a field of trampled snow and mud and moving into a new field covered with virgin, pristine snow, a blank snow-scape of untouched purity and great opportunity.

## If only it was true.

I've just had the worst year of my life and do not see as 2018 as being the wonderful utopia ahead of me.

At the commencement of 2017 I had no idea that it would rob me of my wife of 42 years of marriage and only 62 years of age. Yes, I could envisage my father, age 91 or my father-in-law, age 94, not surviving the year, but not Heather.

Many in our village have been there before me. They have experienced the power of grief to take over their lives. Tears are a constant, unwelcome companion.

The future does not exist, just a day by day or hour by hour survival. You have entered the university of grief. It's a steep learning curve. You suddenly have an unspoken bond with others who grieve. The brain cannot take it in. It is a mistake, it will be all right. The lump of lead in your heart tells you otherwise.

Time passes. Pain subsides a little. Your identity has been ripped apart and a new one will emerge in time. You learn a new routine. You learn how to cook, how to wash the laundry, how to clean. You turn the radio on. People surprise you with their kindness. I have had more hugs from married women (and a few men) than ever before. You find who your real friends are. People you hardly know ask how you are and are interested in the answer. They check up on you. They have you round. Your children complain you have more meals with friends than with them.

Sadly other friends become distant. There's an elephant in the room. They don't know how to handle the situation, they may be grieving as well and you are too distraught to help them, so they withdraw.

Never, ever, pretend someone's grief does not exist. If they don't want to talk about it they will say so but you hurt them more by ignoring it than by facing it. Never give platitudes either. They don't work.

That's the last 8 months for me. Heather's death was very sudden and friends in the village, in church, further afield, were all shocked. From preliminary diagnosis to death was 11 days and she was only conscious for the first five of them. She left behind incomplete conversations and unfulfilled dreams.

People in Kenn have been fantastic. I want to give a big thank you to people in the village for their support and understanding.

Thank you to all those who have allowed me to drop in and let me offload. Thank you to those who have sent cards or texted or called. I really appreciate it.

So what about 2018?

To me it is still scary. None of us knows what it holds. I can guarantee that it will not go as you expect.

Good advice was given by King George VI in his Christmas address in the dark days of World War 2:

"I feel that we may all find a message of encouragement in the lines which, in my closing words, I would like to say to you:

I said to the man who stood at the Gate of the Year,

"Give me a light that I may tread safely into the unknown."

And he replied, "Go out into the darkness, and put your hand into the hand of God.

That shall be to you better than light, and safer than a known way."

May that Almighty Hand guide and uphold us all".

(The words were by Minnie Haskins (1875-1957). They came from a poem of hers called "God Knows", in a collection, The Desert, published in 1908 and the whole poem is well worth reading).

That's what I will be doing. How about you?

NATIONAL **GRID TREE** PLANTING SCHEME



INFORMATION FROM NATIONAL GRID: One way we are seeking to reduce the overall impact of the new connection and enhance local landscape and biodiversity, is to plant trees and hedgerows in the local area. We'd like to hear from landowners interested in receiving free tree and hedgerow planting. (Please note that the scheme is not intended for private residential homeowners)

We're already engaged with landowners closest to the route; we're now making the scheme available to landowners within 3km of the new connection.

Wherever possible we will use native species, e.g. Oak, Willow, Hazel, Hawthorn and Maple, and plant:

- Young, single stem trees
- Larger, more mature trees with a trunk 16-18cm in diameter
- Hedgerows (including filling gaps in existing hedges) and protective fencing

National Grid will maintain trees and hedgerows for five years to ensure successful establishment, after which time the landowner will take full responsibility for them.

Known as the Off-Site Planting and Mitigation Scheme (OSPES), this initiative was agreed as part of the planning process and is in addition to the significant planting we're doing to replace trees and hedgerows removed during construction, and to screen parts of our development.

As outlined in our Section 106 planning agreement with the local authorities, any planting undertaken as part of this initiative must comply with its 'Planting Principles', i.e. planting will be carried out in a way that:

- contributes to local biodiversity;
- is consistent with local landscape character;
- 3. does not conflict with or cause potential damage to known or potential archaeology or the settings of heritage assets; and
- does not conflict with planting secured by other existing planning consents.

Landowners that meet the criteria will be approached by Bruton Knowles, who will meet them at the suggested planting location to discuss the scheme and draw up a planting plan.

National Grid will agree the plan with the local authority

before a formal agreement is made.
