

### **P** BIRD NEWS

Great White Egrets first nested in Britain as recently as 2012, but they have been very successful and in December there were three records from the Kenn area. Jeff Naish reported one from Nailsea Wall and a few days later I was sent a phone photo taken by a passing motorist in the same area. Then after the heavy rain mid month I spotted one on the Yatton side of the Blackditch near Moor Street Bow. Jeff was able to report that he had seen several Kingfishers recently in different parts of the area. John Croxton also saw a Kingfisher by Kenn Pier, along with a Grey Wagtail and six Little Egrets. The winter pen level in the rhynes and rivers makes feeding much easier for Kingfishers and Egrets.

John also had a sighting of a Green Sandpiper, a bird that is mainly a passage migrant but a few do overwinter. Again the muddy edges which appear on the water courses when the level is lowered is to their liking. There were other birds on the Congresbury Yeo and Oldbridge River.

The wet weather has also produced good conditions for roosting Snipe and the Yacwag Reserve on Congresbury Moor held 20 mid month. There were eight on the Kenn Moor Reserve near Yatton but with the bonus of a Jack Snipe a much rarer winter visitor and a bird that only flies when it is about to be trodden on.

A pair of Peregrines have been frequenting the local pylons and what were probably the same birds were at Clevedon on Boxing Day, the female perched near the top of one of the Radio Masts all morning and the male hurtling into a flock of Dunlin, unsuccessfully as far as he was concerned. Nearby four Goosanders were on the sea just off Clevedon Pill. They (or others) have also been reported on the Blind Yeo and the Yearling Ditch.

The farmer in Wemberham Lane, Yatton reported a Barn Owl in the farmyard one evening and Jill heard a Tawny Owl on Christmas Eve from our garden, the first that we have heard this winter.

Christmas morning was heralded by a singing Song Thrush and he has been singing each morning since, no doubt enjoying the calm dry weather. There were 24 Teal on Blackditch on the 27th, a good number for this site.

And to end the year a note from Scotland. In a railway magazine there was a report of a visit to Chapelcross Nuclear Power Station (it has an unusual private railway) and the Station guide pointed out where Peregrine Falcons had raised two young on the Heat Exchanger building in the heart of the Station. Peregrines were until not too long ago associated with wild and remote cliffs (where reducing numbers still nest) but seem to be adapting well to using human built 'cliffs'.

### **Broadband – again...** A reminder and an update

First the reminder. Andy Moore from Truespeed will be hosting a drop-in session at the

### Village Hall Saturday 12th January 6-8pm.

Truespeed are a fibre based broadband supplier already building fast internet networks around Langford and Churchill and can do the same for Kenn if we can demonstrate sufficient interest to make it worth their while.



The threshold to enable Truespeed to consider installing here is a minimum of 30% of potential customers. So far we have nearly 20 signed up and need to double that.

The purpose of Andy's visit is to give everyone an opportunity to ask questions and find out more. It will be very informal so just pop in. There won't be a hard sell and if we can get it organised there might even be refreshments.

Secondly an update. Gigaclear are the other broadband company of interest to us. They have a measure of funding from the government via Connecting Devon and Somerset (CDS), a body set up by the government to oversee contracts for broadband in rural areas. Sadly Gigaclear have over-committed and now withdrawn previously published timescales for installation in Kenn and Kingston and told CDS they may be up to 4 years late in completing their contracts.

Neither CDS nor Gigaclear come out of this with much credibility and many feel CDS has failed dismally to demonstrate effectiveness or any degree of competence.

Anyway the result is that we have no timescales at the moment for anything from Gigaclear/CDS for Kenn but if you drive round the area you will see that Gigaclear have installed some ducting for cables by the Craft Centre and plan to do work along Nailsea Wall/ Davis Lane in Jan/Feb.

Note that this will mean road closures and diversions. Some information is on the Gigaclear.net website and roadworks.org website but don't get excited.

Finally, the Village Broadband Committee and the Parish Council are doing everything they can to improve the broadband facilities in the village although it does at times seems to be an exercise in frustration. The Truespeed event is something we have organised so please encourage us and come along.

If you do have other questions then Chris Blake, John Ball or myself may be able to help.

#### SPECIAL MEETING - 4 December 2018

### To consider the North Somerset Local Plan 2036 and its implications for Kenn

The North Somerset Local Plan is a planning policy document which identifies where new housing, jobs, and infrastructure such as roads, schools, parks and health services will be built over the next 20 years. About 25,000 new homes are needed by 2036. Just under 14,000 are already earmarked, so just over 11,000 still need to be allocated. Two new villages and extensions to others are proposed. Brownfield land will be used for new houses and apartments. Sites for a further 1,000 houses will also need to be found elsewhere in North Somerset.

Kenn Parish Council considered and commented on the following:

- <u>Settlement Hierarchy</u> A settlement hierarchy is a way of classifying an area's settlements and their different roles and functions. Grouping together those settlements that have similar characteristics.
- <u>Settlement Boundaries</u> Settlement boundaries defining the edge of a town or village in order to direct development to those locations. These boundaries prevent sprawl and concentrates development within settlements in a form which is appropriate to the scale and needs of that community. They also define the areas where housing policies apply. Land outside these are 'countryside' and different policies apply.

In both cases the Parish Council preferred the status quo - Option 1

 Holiday Accommodation in the Countryside – New permitted development rights in 2015 now require a review of policies DM45: The conversion or re-use of rural buildings to residential use and DM57: Conversion, reuse and new build for visitor accommodation in the countryside.

Kenn Parish Council commented that existing licensed holiday park owners who are permitting their holiday home to become permanent residences, should not be able to circumvent the planning process and have existing enforcement notices disregarded.

28 January 19 – Road Closure, Kennmoor Rd (junction of Nailsea Wall to junction of Kenn Street) anticipated to be of 8 days in duration for work by Gigaclear Ltd to install fibre optic equipment.
