


K BIRD NEWS

The cold weather brought lots of reports of Lapwings feeding on the moors (as well as Hangstones playing field, Yatton!) and also flying over heading south.

Just prior to the coldest days there were a thousand Dunlin and 350 Redshank roosting on the old Kenn Estuary at Khigh tide. A single Golden Plover there 🗶 was a surprise, a Peregrine less so. 🗶 At least 16 Goosander were at Clevedon Pill, they don't seem to have $\overline{\nu}$ moved on to the rivers yet (23rd).

A frozen Kenn Moor yielded 20 Snipe, visible because of the harsh conditions.



Redshanks at Kenn Estuary photo Jon Thobroe 🗶 A Kingfisher and two Grey Wagtails were on the river with three Little Grebes on the

🖌 Blackditch. There were few Redwings and Fieldfares but about 75 of the latter species were in an orchard by Kenn Moor Road. The usual wintering Stonechats were present.

A Little Owl was a surprise find by the Little River south of the Chestnut Park estate and two Little Owls were calling to each other by the Strawberry Line at Congresbury.

Tawny Owls were also duetting in Kingston Seymour churchyard. \bigvee The cold weather concentrated 20 Little Egrets around the Little River.

The River Yeo attracted a record count of seven Green Sandpipers, as well as 19 Teal and four Shovelers. Kingfisher and Grey Wagtail were present and a Water Rail was nearby.

K More unusual was a Great White Egret and even more of a surprise was a male Merlin with prey in its talons.

It all calmed down when the temperatures climbed but a flock of 150 Lapwings went over Wemberham on the 20th and 30 Meadow Pipits were feeding by the new pylon works.

Generally there were few Fieldfares and Redwings, many may have pushed on further south.

We could get the older children to do the washing up. There are a lot of young adults around. Get them used to the hall and how it functions. This cuts down on a lot of work and coordination.



Our Monthly Missive from The Limes

At the village market: -

"Are you going to the concert tonight?" - "What concert?"

"The one on the front cover of Kenn News and Views." - Ooops.!

Actually I did know about it and I do recollect seeing the front cover and thinking what a nice smile the lady had. Just so you know, I do read the KN&V each month all the way through, although often I skip the last two inside back pages.

The moral of the story of course is to have a quick brush up on KN&V contents before you go to a village event so you don't look a complete plonker.

Anyway that brings me nicely onto this month's topic which is an update on the aptly named Hinkley Point Connection Pylon Construction Project. Some nice people from the project came along one evening to the Village Hall towards the end of November to show us lots of charts and maps and answer questions we had about the project.

I said I would write it up for KN&V and it could actually have appeared last month except for two reasons. The first was that the deadline for submissions for December was almost upon me so it would have been a rush.

The other reason is that Peppa had already pipped me to the post and sent an article herself several days earlier to "that nice lady wot does KN&V" and "that nice lady" had accepted it. (Peppa's grammar isn't great and I see the editor did change her original copy. Apparently KN&V has its standards). That dog is in danger of getting too big for its boots and I may have to have words with her. "That nice lady" also had the cheek to say Peppa's article was brilliant and what a clever dog Peppa is, "almost as clever as her master".

Not sure how to take that. I suppose it's a compliment. At times I don't know if I am seen as a genius or the village idiot. Not sure about the dog however.

Speaking of plaudits, there was a stream of them. Well, three actually (which is three more than I usually get) plus one comment that Peppa is a better writer than her master. Ouch. I don't normally name names here but am very tempted on that one. Unfortunately Peppa did get to hear of the comments and is going around with a big smile on her face. I've also been told she has been seen on Facebook but I'm not telling her that. At this rate she will want her own email account. Unusually, she is behaving more affectionally and paying more attention to me. It reminds me of the husband who come home with a bunch of flowers for his wife. She took one glance and said, "What have you done wrong?"

Anyway, enough of that. Now for some facts about pylons.

For those of you who don't have a life outside Kenn (and why should you?) or who have missed out on an earlier article on the topic let me remind you what the pylons are all about.

The new Hinkley Point power station does not connect directly to the National Grid (no, I don't know why either). The current (ha ha) connection takes power from the existing plant to just beyond Avonmouth where it joins the National Grid. The new power station will (eventually) produce more power and need bigger cables. Hence a whole new construction project is in place.

For technical reasons the voltage on the new lines will be 400kV instead of the 132kV on the existing lines. You don't want to be anywhere near that voltage so the new towers have to be higher. Thirty five metres high to be exact. They are also designed to look nice (a matter of opinion) but apparently a design based on the old lattice style would be even higher at 48m.

If you go out onto Kenn Moor you will see pylon towers slowly sprouting like reluctant daffodils in a cold spring. Further north towards Tickenham more are in place. In the Kingston Seymour direction not much is visible yet.

When complete, the towers will have a diamond shaped cage on each arm. For technical reasons, each point of the cage will have two cables (not three as in the model they brought to the presentation) and there will be two earth cables making a total of 12 conductors plus 2 earths plus a fibre optic cable on each tower. These cables are large, the project engineer reckoned each has a diameter of around 85mm. That is a lot of copper or aluminium – probably the latter for cost reasons.

You may be interested to know that the existing cables have been switched off and power is routed via an alternative route. These older towers are expected to be demolished from March 2023, cut into small pieces and recycled.

Overall, the engineer reckoned the project was on schedule, which is not what we heard some months back. Cabling of the new towers will be March/May 2023 and a switch on in 2024. The engineer was keen to state that initially it will be carrying electricity produced by wind power in the south west. I think they are trying to emphasise green credentials but if you look at the amount of reinforced concrete under each tower it's a bit of a weak argument. I asked if the old lattice design would use less materials but after a long pause to think, was told it would have been "about the same".

As an aside, the project has been giving grants to local communities along its path. I think it is to show they are nice guys although it doesn't help those directly affected most such as the landowners, so why Clevedon got £10,000 for its Christmas lights from them beats me as Clevedon is nowhere near the pylons. Note that landowners do get some compensation but it is not straightforward.

Apparently our moors have "been a challenge" for the tower constructions. Most of them are built on concrete piles going 20 or 30 feet deep and then a huge reinforced concrete cube on top, half the size of Kenn Village Hall and as tall. On top of that is a cylinder of concrete, ending roughly flush with ground level on which the tower is bolted. There are two designs of tower. Both look similar, one is for changes of cable directions where the insulators are horizontal and the other for everywhere else where the insulators hang vertically, a bit like a gunslinger about to go for his guns in a cowboy western.

In some areas the towers are built on a concrete raft because of the peat.

The anticipated life of the towers is 80 years and the cable will need servicing after 40-50 years so some form of future access for large cranes will be required. The days of a man climbing up a ladder are over. That will affect how the reinstating will be implemented - which is due to start in early 2024. Discussions are also in place with the Environment Agency about the details. I got the impression that reinstatement is not going to be a simple topic.

More information can be found if you Google "Hinkley Point Connection". Overall it is a long, drawn out project.

Information from North Somerset Council:

Collection date changes

All recycling and waste collection days will return to normal from Monday 2 January.

No wrapping paper in recycling

No wrapping paper of any kind can be put out for recycling this year. Wrapping paper is difficult to recycle because there are so many varieties and most are mixed with unrecyclable items such as foil,



glitter, ribbon, and tape. Instead, please put wrapping paper in the black non-recyclable waste bin. There are lots of eco-friendly alternatives to wrapping paper including brown paper which can be decorated with stamps - this can be recycled with cardboard if the tape is removed.

Cardboard recycling

Each year from the beginning of December we begin to see a rise in cardboard tonnages. To help crews manage this increase in cardboard we ask residents to ensure all cardboard has the tape removed and is presented flattened and folded to the size of a recycling box. We also ask residents to store what they can and put out a little each week if they have excess. This helps crews complete their rounds and collect from each property.

Additional crews will be helping with collections, so some collections of individual materials such as cardboard or glass may be done using different vehicles and at different times.

+ Food Waste

Christmas is also a period of high food waste. Last year, we collected 94.25 tonnes more than we would normally. Advice on reducing food waste and some fantastic recipes can be found at: <u>www.lovefoodhatewaste.com</u> A reminder that food waste for recycling should be wrapped or bagged. Any plastic bag will do, residents do not need to purchase special compostable liners any longer.
