Countless astronomical calculations have been made about where and exactly when this journey began, but as a camel can only plod about 15 miles a day, the Magi must have been on the road a while before Jesus was born.

Thus the animated film that made up the main part of the Crib Service was fronted by Melchior, and Mary, Joseph and the faithful donkey, the shepherds, a whole flock of lambs (24), the angels and then the Wisemen themselves were all called into the story. Everyone coming into the church was given a knitted character, and when their time came, took it up to the table to make the Nativity Scene complete.

The film stopped at intervals for carols and discussion, and chocolate!.

Finally, everyone was there and Christmas at St John's had officially started.

BIRD NEWS

K

📡 The month started bird wise with a Barn Owl in the box at Chaseside. Remarkable in that K the box was erected around nine years and this was the first owl recorded on the camera K there. Even better news is that the bird paid another visit on the 21st. The field vole K population seems to have recovered quite markedly since the summer and this should help V over wintering Owls. A Tawny Owl was calling near the church and the 'One Elm bird Solution with the church of a flock of a dozen Mistle Thrushes passing over.

K It was almost like old times at Littlewood on Kenn Moor with a mixed flock of Siskins and K Goldfinches and a Woodcock along with a Sparrowhawk for good measure. Hundreds of K Redwings and Fieldfares were on Kenn Moor and Kingfishers were on the Black Ditch and 🗶 at Kenn Pier. But the star bird was a Short Eared Owl. A stake out looking for the Owl a K few days later was unsuccessful but a Grey Wagtail and a Peregrine perched on one of the 🗶 new pylons was compensation enough. On the 6th three Lapwings flew over the Moor, a 🗶 notable record these days. Four Stonechats were also present. The Snipe count at the YACWAG Kenn Moor Reserve turned up 60 Snipe and a Jack Snipe, our best count for K four years.

K Elsewhere Goosanders and Kingfisher were on the Congresbury Yeo along with more 🗶 Stonechats and a regular Kestrel nearby.

🗶 A Great White Egret flew in and ¥ upset a hunting Heron but the Y Heron soon saw the Egret off. Photo by Mark Savage

More Siskins frequented the Alders 🗶 in the Moor Lane section of the K Strawberry Line and towards Yatton several Chiffchaffs and Goldcrests k were hunting frenetically. 🖌 Two Water Rails called loudly at Weach other there.

 $\swarrow$  Finally, it has been a Waxwing winter in the north and east of the UK but on the 23rd k seven turned up in The Avenue in Clevedon so let's hope for sightings of a few more of these stunning birds locally.

Prebendary Neil MacGregor 18th September 1935 - 7th November 2023.

From 1974 until 1980 Kenn & Kingston Seymour were blessed to have Neil MacGregor as our Vicar

His funeral service was held at St. Lawrence's Church at Ludlow on Monday 4th December . (a copy of the Order of Service is available from the editor..)



Neil was deeply loved by many in Kenn, popping from village to village on his bicycle. Our sympathy goes to his children Lucy and Paddy, and their families. Sadly his wife Margaret passed away in 2019.

He started work at Wade Deacon School in 1948, did his National Service, studied at Wells Theological College, was curate at St Mary's Bathwick, Rector at Oare and Culbone, before coming to us as Vicar. In 1980 he became Rector of Wem and Lee Brockhust, in Shropshire, finally becoming Rural Dean of Wem and Whitchurch 1995 till 2001. (Prebendary Lichfield Cathedral 1997).

The Clergy presiding at his funeral were The Reverend Kelvin Price, The Venerable Dick Acworth, The Reverend Wayne Davies and The Reverend John Perry.

# **Our Monthly Missive from the Limes**

It's a week before Christmas and a period of relative quiet for me although I recognise for others it may be a time of frenetic activity. Have I posted or delivered all the Christmas cards? Have I got presents sorted and where did I put that one? – I'm sure the list goes on. I know it sounds awful but I must say that December is not my favourite month, there seems too much to have to organise on one's own and the real meaning can easily get eclipsed. However as I think I am on top of most things I thought I'd give KN&V some attention and make a start. I'm sure I'll get an email in the next 24 hours with our editor's reminder.

Anyway by the time you read this Christmas will be over and we'll be looking forwards into the New Year.

Or will we?

Six years ago I wrote a piece which made people cry. I'm not going to reproduce it here except for one sentence. I said "I can guarantee the year will not go as you expect". Certainly that proved true for me although in general I think the year went better than I expected, but at the time I was not looking forward to it.

However I do know that for some the future is not an attractive proposition. World events apart, we may face situations we would rather not, or suffer from fears that hold us back. I have two bits of advice. Firstly, don't hide yourself away (and yes I know that can be hard). Seek company. Secondly for the rest of us, watch out for others. I think as a village we are pretty good, but as my school reports usually said: "Could do better."

I've just come back from a breakfast with a number of friends who meet up regularly and when someone asked for a summary of what we had done as a group I realised we can so easily forget what has happened and I really had to think.

Here at home, I'm pleased at what has been achieved, not just by me but with the help of many others and that got me thinking of what has happened in 2023 in Kenn and its surroundings. Several areas came to mind so this article is really a potpourri of unconnected stuff and a look back via some of my writings.

First, the pylons. Every time I look out of my kitchen window I see them. The most exciting part was watching the towers being lifted and getting assembled with a couple of men inside ready to put the bolts in as soon as the crane got the parts in position. I've made a number of treks to the towers and for those who haven't I can tell you they are BIG! They have stairs inside and we found a shipping label that said they were made in China so they have come a long way.

Early in the year Kenn had a visit from the project team itself which I wrote up for you. It was a useful evening but would have been more useful if all the information given was correct. There were one or two technical items that didn't seem right and their timescales were way off. According to my reckoning I think they are about a year behind. At the moment they are building scaffold where cables will cross roads so hopefully they will be pulling cables through soon. I hope I'm around at the time and can watch.

What next? Well the Village Hall continues with its programme of improvement and better insulation. The side nearest the road has been nearly done so perhaps in the spring it can continue.

It is a laborious job and thanks to those in the village who have helped.

The Drum and Monkey refurbishment continues to make progress although not much is visible from outside. The café work which is the bit that really affects the village is a little delayed but they hope to get that sorted by spring. Anyway here's a little update from them:

"We have managed to get the main office open this week. Still working on the other rentable offices and hot desk area upstairs as well as the cafe and bar area. As you know there were several challenges including a lot of extra structural and insulation work, however most of the major work has been completed."

What else in Kenn? We held a litter pick in the summer – again thanks to all who helped. Also the wild flowers this year looked lovely.

In May we had local elections (you recall I put in a large plug for the Parish Council in February). I didn't stand this time and there weren't enough candidates to warrant a vote so we don't know what you think of them all but the good news is that all the positions are filled and they seem to be managing without me.

Looking at my list of articles for 2023 (which I finally got around to retrieving and filing – not in the bin I hasten to add) I see that in April I gave you a history of the Village Hall and a couple of months later I had a stab writing about gardening. That was followed by my rather pushy dog twice slagging me off and I had to put her in her place. At the moment she is asleep on her cushion (and coincidentally the radio is playing Away in a Manger) and soon she will nag me for her afternoon treat — I give her a dental chew so I kill two birds with one stone. In fact I'll do it now – she has slept long enough. Earlier today a squirrel darted from under her nose and beat her to the tree so she is probably a bit miffed.

So what else? Clevedon? The sea front? B&M car park? The less said the better so let's quickly move on....

On a wider front, the government Boundary Commission have decided that in the future we will have no local MP for Kenn, Yatton etc. and will come under Wells!

This is despite protests and comments from local Parish Councils (ours included) and from individuals, who have all pointed out how nonsensical it is. Despite acknowledging our comments, the Boundary Commission said it did not receive many of them and clearly ignored those it got.

In March I warned you about the need for roads to be dug up for various needs and roadworks are continuing and anyone who has shares in companies providing portable traffic lights should do well.

What I didn't realise was that further afield, work on "Bus Improvement Lanes" would make life even more difficult for motorists. I did write a letter to the paper pointing out that the North Somerset anti-motorist policy in rural areas was unrealistic, although if we had buses going frequently to useful places we might be tempted, - but they didn't publish it.

I assume they thought it either too accurate or not PC. Clearly not everyone appreciates my writing.....

North Somerset Council's Recycling & waste collection dates over festive period will change as crews are not working. Recycling centres are also closed on the bank holidays. The revised dates are below. Please note: collections will take place on Sunday 31 December to help with the catch up.

Wrapping paper should go in the general waste, not recycling. Advice for reducing, reusing and recycling at Christmas can be found at: <u>https://www.n-somerset.gov.uk/christmas-recycling</u>

Avon and Somerset - Police and Commissioner's Crime Prevention Fund Grants are available to local not-forprofit groups delivering projects that promote community safety and reduce crime and antisocial behaviour in their area. More information is available at Commissioner's Crime Prevention Fund -Quartet CF.

<u>Music for All</u> - Community Project Funding Grants are available to UK-based community groups that aim to bring musical projects to their local communities. More information at Music for All | Music Charity in the UK.

<u>North Somerset – Where recycling goes</u> initially items collected from recycling boxes and recycle centres are taken to the NSEC Waste Transfer Station where they are bulked then taken to different destinations to be processed and recycled.

Metal packaging Household steel and aluminium packaging is sorted using magnets. Aluminium waste is sent to multiple destinations such as Novellis in Warrington, SWM in Barnstable, and Alutrade in the Midlands where it is recycled into new aluminium cans. Steel tins and aerosol cans are sent to a facility in South Wales where they are recycled into new steel products.

Paper is taken to Palm Paper in King's Lynn. It is turned into new paper for use by the newsprint industry.

Textiles are processed by Packaged Group Ltd who are committed to reducing landfill and have a strict ethical trading policy and do not process, or ship any unrecyclable waste overseas.

Cardboard and cartons are taken to either DS Smith in Kent, Edwards Waste Paper in Essex, and Smurfit Kappa in Tamworth and recycled into new cardboard packaging in 14 days – reducing the need to cut down trees.

Glass glass goes to URM (UK Ltd) in Knottingley, West Yorkshire where it is cleaned and sorted into raw material and then sent to UK glass manufacturers.

Batteries Household batteries should be placed in a clear plastic bag in the recycling box to keep them together. They are sent to G&P Batteries in the West Midlands to be sorted by battery type. The sorted batteries are sent to be recycled to recover the metal and be made into new batteries.

Plastic packaging All plastic recycling collected in North Somerset is processed in the UK.

Food waste from food caddies is taken to an anaerobic digester in WSM where microorganisms break it down to produce biogas used to generate electricity and heat homes in North Somerset. Also natural fertiliser is made.

Electrical items are collected by Sims Recycling Solutions. Some items are disassembled and some are shredded. The different material is separated and recycled. Chemicals, such as lead, are safely disposed of.

Garden waste is taken to Enovert in Gloucester for composting, after about 10 weeks it is used as a soil improver. Rubbish Around 80% of household waste should be recycled as above. The 'non-recyclable' waste put in bins is collected and taken to ETM in Ashton Gate, sorted and any items that can be reused etc will be sent for recycling. The rest is sent to Energy for Waste. Only a small percentage goes to landfill.

Well done to everyone who makes the effort towards trying to achieve Zero Waste.
