

Bird News

Our summer visitor warblers have arrived in force and at the time of writing are \overline{V} enjoying the warm sunny weather. Swallows, House Martins and Swifts have \bigvee done less well although surprisingly there was a party of about 20 House Martins over the new houses at North End, Yatton. A few migrant Wheatears also put in an appearance with three in Yatton on the 14th, one would you believe, photographed in Wheatear Road.

🏹 Bryan Thompson recorded a Sparrowhawk capturing a Magpie, but then, resumably having second thoughts, releasing it immediately. John Croxton also To noted a Sparrowhawk albeit without the Magpie element and another bird was calling on Kenn Moor. But the prize for raptor spotting in May goes to Mr and Mrs Porter Senior who saw a Red Kite over the Hanging field in Kenn. Kites were also spotted at Yatton and Claverham.

Sarah Clark had been informed of a Cuckoo calling at Cadbury Hill and Jon 'Hobbs heard one from Duck Lane. What is likely to have been the same bird has been calling near Sandford, Congresbury and Yatton. I have heard this bird twice and seen it once and according to my records there has been the most Cuckoo activity locally since 2007. That said it does seem to be one very wide ranging individual. Another was calling near Wick St Lawrence and reported from the sea wall at Kingston Seymour. This is almost certainly another bird.

Sarah also reported two Green Woodpeckers feeding in her garden and one was calling in the Littlewood Reserve. Barn Owl sightings came from Congresbury Moor and whilst the warm settled weather will be beneficial to them lack of rain and grass growth could stifle vole numbers, their almost exclusive prey species.

And finally, a semi albino Blackbird has been frequenting Arnold's Way, Yatton. Quite an exotic looking creature, it has a white head and neck with a normal black body.

The 26 times round the field walk.

I was watching young Frank Mills bravely doing his walk for charity when I wondered what I could do to raise some money for Weston Hospicecare.

I racked my brain, which didn't take long, for something I could do which meant I did not have to leave our land as we needed to follow government guidelines.

The field attached to our house is approx. 5 acres so I decided to walk 26 times round the field sticking rigidly to the boundaries.

Rain was in the air but the BBC weather forecast showed me a 6 hour gap in the afternoon. Off I set walking boots on, rainproof top (I didn't trust the forecast), long trousers and a hat.

The sheep were alarmed at first as I set out on this epic journey but after a while they just ignored me showing suitable disdain.

In the end it took me 4 hours and 20 minutes with a 5 minute "comfort break" and a quick cup of tea.

Lockdown - in the life of a Swan

The morning of Tuesday 17th March seemed a fairly 'normal' day for the time of year. I had been happily accompanying students for their Advanced Level Music Theatre exams in Bristol, but on returning home I found that all my adult students had cancelled their lessons for that day... and beyond. From then onwards, teaching, and life as I knew it, suddenly stopped!

One positive thing came from the 'new normal' and that was, time for exercise! In a bid to escape the isolation of being in a house alone, I resurrected my old bike and started cycling along the Moors.



It was then that I discovered Swans! Two pairs of beautiful birds had built their nests very close to the road and didn't seem at all worried about traffic, or people stopping to take photos!

Over a period of 6 weeks I was fortunate enough to follow these Swans. The first pair were starting to incubate their eggs (6), so I

had some idea when the Cygnets would hatch. It's usually between 35-42 days. The second pair had 2 eggs, laid precariously on a bank at that time. It takes a while for the nest to be built, and it continues to be built and maintained by both parties while the eggs are continuing to be laid, and there after.

An egg is laid about every other day



and the male (Cob) is responsible for finding a suitable nesting spot. He will also pull out vegetation close by for his 'Pen', who will then add it to her nest.



Regarding incubation, it's only when the Pen finally sits on her complete clutch of eggs that the incubation process begins. The Cob will take over 'sitting duties', allowing her to go off to feed, but it's her higher body temperature which starts and maintains the incubation process.

This is why the eggs all hatch at the same time.

She will continually turn her eggs, so they all benefit from her body heat. She'll also pull out some of her feathers underneath (her 'brood spot') - which means the eggs will receive her maximum body heat.

The 'Courtship display' was something that I was really lucky to witness, not once, but twice! It was akin to a Ballet! The pair began by looking at each other (alternately turning their heads to admire their partner). They then started ducking their heads in and out of the water, up and own....until they eventually synchronised their actions.



After some time, their breasts

met and there was more appreciation shown through 'looking'. This was also when the famous 'heart shape' of necks was formed.

Following that, the Swans draped their necks over each other, before copulation. The Cob then mounted his Pen from the side and held her head under water with his beak for several seconds (which could have looked like a drowning!!) but having witnessed and researched this behaviour, I can honestly say that it's perfectly normal!

Also, our 'Mute Swan' is anything but 'Mute'. Both male and female have quite a vocabulary - and definitely let out a 'groan' after copulation!



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It was purely by chance that I came across these Swans, but they became (and still are) an important part of my life during 'Lockdown'.

They are a reminder that life goes on, regardless. The first pair were fortunate enough to have 6 healthy Cygnets, and have since moved on.

Tragically, the second Pen and her almost-hatched Cygnets were taken by a Fox.

It's heart-breaking, but it's also life. That Fox needed to feed itself and probably its own babies.

I have since come across another Swan's nest....and so it goes on....

It is said every cloud has a silver lining. How about using this period of lockdown as an opportunity to review your hopes and dreams and then list and plan how you will actually bring them to pass ?


And finally, do you have any dreams for Kenn? One of mine is for safe roads. I have been hit by cars five times since moving to Kenn so I have a vested interest.

HATHOR AND THE HEAVENS: The wonders of Dendera temple

With Lucia Gahlin & Dr Bernadette Brady Saturday 30th May & Saturday 6th June ONLINE Room apens from 1.30, lectures from 2-5 (with a break)

One of the most spectacular temples to survive from Ancient Egypt is the temple of Hathor at Dendera. Lucia will take you on a tour of the iconic monuments that make up this Graeco-Roman Period temple complex, dedicated primarily to Egypt's most important goddess. We will explore the architecture, alongside the extensive reliefs and inscriptions carved on the walls. We will discuss these intricate scenes and texts and find them to be a window into ancient Egyptian belief and daly life: rituals, festivals and the mythology of Hathor, one of the most important deities in the

Egyptian pantheon. Linked with the richness of Hathor's mythology is the cosmology and cultural astronomy of the temple, a jewel in the crown of Egyptian astronomy. Here the Egyptian cosmology and mythical descriptions of the heavens meet and combine with the emerging Greek view which was destined to dominate the western world's images of the sky. Bernadette's first lecture will focus on the ceiling of the Hypostyle Hall and its mixture of the mythology of the Sun and the Moon blended with the Greek zodiac and the elusive imagery of the Egyptian decans. Here we will see the sky through Egyptian eyes. In the second lecture we go up to the roof for the round zodiac, a Rosetta Stone where Greek and Egyptian astronomy blend and where also we find a series of unique and breath-taking Egyptian cosmological maps.



Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 - Section 14, Notice of Temporary Traffic Regulation Order Kenn Street, Kenn, North Somerset

Temporary Prohibition of Use by Vehicles

Ref: T20-31

2020

Date coming into force: 6 July 2020

Notice is hereby given that North Somerset District Council in pursuance of the provisions of section 14 of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984, as amended, intend to make an order the effect of which will be to close, temporarily, to vehicles the lengths of roads specified in the Schedule to this Notice. This order is required because of carriageway drainage works and will become operative on 6 July 2020 for a maximum period of eighteen months. However, the closures may not be implemented for the whole of the period but only as necessitated by the works which is anticipated to be of five days in duration, between the hours of 08:00 and 16:30, not including weekends.
